CRISIS WILL PASS AWAY.

London, Oct. 26.-Lord Selborne's speech at the Pilgrims' dinner vesterday evening is accepted as revealing the precise nature of the British demands, namely an ample apology, generous compensation, the punishment of the guilty, and an adequate guarantee against a repetition of the offense. Apart from the admiralty's announcement that precautionary orders had been issued to the fleets, there are practically no signs of anything in the nature of warlike preparations, thus confirming the opinion held in all well-informed circles here that the pledges given by Emperor Nicholas and the Russian Government will be loyally fulfilled, and that the crisis will pass away without serious, consequences.







FEWER APPEALS THAN A YEAR AGO

Oaly Eight From West London This Year, and But Two of These Against Realty.

It is a significant fact that although

the city's assessment was increased by over a million dollars this year, the

assessment appeals total only 154, against 249 last year. 

Oct. 26.—The suggestion of a 'United States of Europe," a confederation to resist the industrial conquest hreatened by the United States of america, has given Edouard Loceroy. story of the real weight of his own alliance like that proposed, he says, the Gallic power would sink and the Teuton would rule.

"In shore," to quote from the essay, 'Germany would become Europe.' "France," say Loceroy, "is admired and loved. Since her disasters she has remained a refuge for the oppressed and persecuted. She is a precious agent of civilization and peace, necessary to the intellectual life of all the world. But our nation never will dominate Europe again. France has been con-"Germany (in the event of a cor

federation) would sway the destinie of Europe. Her influence extends north. south, east and west. Italy resists, but remains her ally. Austria obeys her and seems almost like an annexed province. Fear draws Sweden and Hungary toward Prussia."

Loceroy notes that the German Emperor has named one of his sons Attila Eitel), and that this prince visits Budapest often and speaks the lan-

guage of Hungary. "That name," remarks the essayist, is still popular on the banks of the Danube. When one speaks there of he conquering Hun it is with the comment: 'He was a good Hungarian.' Roumania, he goes on to say, speaks French, but has a ruler of German blood, and has laws that divert trade o Germanv.

Turkey "belongs" to Berlin. is the sworn friend of the Kaiser. Gen. Van der Folz reorganized the Turkish army. Germany disputes with France for influence in Palestine and Syria. The Queen of Holland, Loceroy adds, married a German prince, and her

country approved. Belgium loves France, but Flanders is hostile. The Flemish call a Frenchnan a "Franquillon." Denmark is already half under Gernany's economic sway. Norway is well disposed to the Kaiser, who visits that land once a year on his yacht. The Norwegians aise monuments of granite along the oads he traveis.


