# Threats thwart SU nominations

Although elections for UNB Student Council are just around the corner and signs advertising the open positions have been posted, there has been a surprisingly low turnout for council positions.

When nominations closed on Wednesday, March 11, all executive positions except President had been acclaimed. Of the 14 positions available, only the Business Administration seat was contested. The positions for Arts Representatives, Law, Science and Engineering have all been acclaimed; while the remaining eight positions have been extended because of a lack of nominations.

The SU President, Larry Hansen, feels the lack of turnout for council seats is undoubtedly related to the threat of lawsuits which have plagued SU councillors and executive for the past year.

A source who prefers to remain unidentified, supports Hansen's view. This person told the Brunswickan that the reason that he did not run for an executive position can be attributed to a statement made by John Bosnitch. John Bosnitch threatened that if the individual ran for election he'd "be slapped with a lawsuit so fast, it would make your head spin. How do you think we got Corinna Goulding (past VP External) to resign?"

# Elections threatened

Although they have been threatened with disciplinary action by Dr. James Downey, President of the University of New Brunswick, the Student Union Inc. headed by John Bosnitch intends to go ahead with its slated election from exile in direct competition with the UNB Student Union elections on March 25.

In a hand delivered press release dated March 10, 1987, Lana Grimes (VP Administration) informed the Brunswickan that the final date for nominations to Student Union Inc. elections will be March 19. Further, Ms. Grimes included in a separate release the following resolutions which were passed at the last executive meeting of the Student Union Inc. Council:

## Resolution 1

That the executive determine that these following six questions be considered as Substantially Important Referenda Questions in the upcoming March 25th General Elections.

- Do you support the Universi-

ty policy of not including free birth control pills as part of the health insurance plan?

- Do you support the University refusal to make condoms freely available on campus as protection against sexually transmitted diseases?

- Do you approve of your Student Union fees being spent for personal legal defenses?

- Should UNB President Jim Downey have the power to lock out and replace elected student government at will?

- Do you approve of the new "Foundation for Students" which gives UNB President Jim Downey a veto over all student finances?

- Do you believe that the \$30 Student Union fee should be increased?

Bosnitch/Grimes Carried unanimously with the recorded consent of all Executives and assistants.

In a further note, Barry White, a former member of the Board of Governors who was removed from the Board in January due to a conflict of interest, will not be allowed to re-offer for the position in the upcoming Student Union elec-

tions because he does not meet the "eligibility" requirements.

Eligibility for the Board of Governors is based on two criteria. Under Section 4(a) of the Regulations, a candidate for a two year term on the BOG "may be enrolled in any year of a program, other than the year in which the candidate is to graduate." Secondly, he must not be on Academic Probation.

Despite the fact that White fits both requirements, he has been informed by James Woodfield, University Secretary, that he "is not an eligible candidate" because of the nature of his previous offense.

Also, it should be noted that Tony Tracy, who was finally allowed to claim his seat as SU Comptroller this past week, has announced his candidacy for Student Union Inc. as VP (Services) along with, Lana Grimes (President); Micheal Bennett and Paul Micheal Lord as VP (Academic); Susan Forestall as VP (Administration); and Rachel Pelletier and Tony English as VP (Finance).

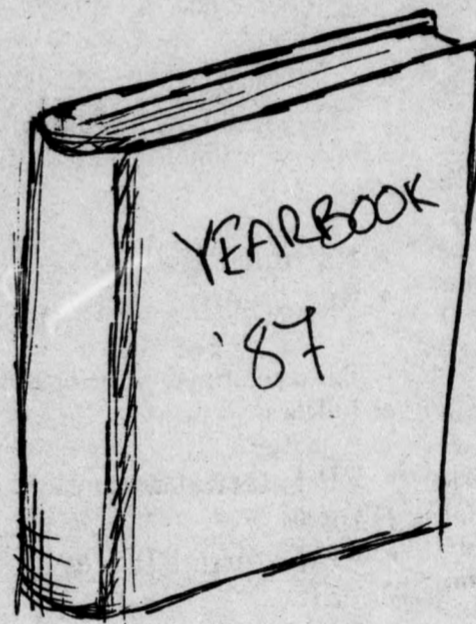

## Killed in the line of duty

A suspect in the March 8th murder of Harvey New Brunswick Highway Patrol officer Emmanuel Aucoin is now being held in Boston jail. Aucoin is the third New Brunswick law enforcement officer to be killed in the line of duty this year.

The body of Constable Aucoin was found in his patrol car parked on a remote stretch of highway near Fredericton. He had been shot in the head by a high-powered rifle. Anthony Romeo, 24, of Locust Valley,

Constable Aucoin did not believe in capital punishment.

N.Y. is being held in Boston jail as the suspect. He is also wanted for questioning in New York state in connection with a murder which took place there in 1985.

Aucoin was shot on Sunday morning and RCMP investigators have located a sawed-off rifle and two shell casings at the scene where Aucoin was shot while filling out

a speeding ticket for the accused Romeo.

Constable Aucoin, 31, was a graduate of the Atlantic Police Academy in Charlottetown and graduated in 1984. The circumstances which led to his death have raised a full review of NBHP procedures. Aucoin's wife made some poignant pleas during her husband's

memorial service. She stressed that capital punishment is not the answer, but rather she asked for two man patrols and an improved radio communication system for the highway patrol as the solution. She knows her husband would not want capital punishment for his killer. She said, "Manny did not believe in capital

punishment." She also added, "My husband believed in the Highway Patrol 100 percent and was proud to be part of it. We all loved him and we will miss him terribly."

Improved patrol procedures are now under review. Aucoin is the fifth N.B. Policeman to be killed in the last twelve years and methods to prevent

such horrifying incidents from occurring in the future must be implemented.

Justice Minister David Clark promised Tuesday a comprehensive review of operating procedures of the New Brunswick Highway Patrol in the wake of the fatal shooting of patrol officer Emmanuel Aucoin.

## Ads promotes casual sex?

The Telecaster Committee of Canada, an umbrella group which screens commercials for 20 private broadcasters including CTV and Global networks, rejected Tuesday a request to air 3 of 4 federally sponsored television advertisements about AIDS. The 3 ads, which encourage the use of condoms in the prevention of AIDS, were apparently rejected because they condone casual sex. The fourth ad, the only one that was accepted, is family oriented, promotes monogamy, and never mentions the word condom.

Pat Beatty, a spokeswoman for the TCC explained the decision by saying "We don't know whether the public would accept it (the ads) or not... We want to make sure we offend as few people as

possible."

However, in a time when people worldwide are become aware of the fatal dangers of AIDS, public awareness campaigns via the media appear to be the only solution to the spiraling number of AIDS victims. Critics say that public sensitivities hold little relevance as these numbers continue to grow.

Nevertheless, the TCC insists that the wording of the current ads give the impression that it's OK to have casual sex with multiple partners as long as you use a condom. They base their decision on the fact that condoms are not 100 percent effective in preventing the transmission of the AIDS virus.

Two of the three ads say (more or less) "you've got to avoid it (sex with multiple partners) or use a condom for protection."

Meanwhile, Robert Burr, a spokesman for the Canadian

Public Health Association, which developed the ads under contract from the federal Health Ministry, said his group has no intention of revising the public service announcements.

"We're not condoning this activity or condemning it," said Burr. "We're just saying it's happening" and that people have the right to know how to protect themselves.

In a major policy document released Tuesday, the Vatican ruled test-tube fertilization and other methods of artificial conception are "immoral" and warned scientists that they should not attempt to usurp God's power over life and death.

Considered by many to be the most damning church pronouncement on "bioethics" in life's early stages, the document, called *Instruction on Respect for Human Life in its Origin and on the Dignity of Procreation*, condemns sperm and embryo banks, experiments in human cloning or in human-animal hybrids, and the implantation of human embryos in artificial or animal uteruses. It also says that surrogate motherhood, artificial insemination and selecting the sex of children are against human dignity.

Approved by the Pope, who was consulted at every stage of its formulation, the document is considered to be the most important policy decision since Pope Paul VI's 1968 encyclical *Humanae Vitae*, which banned contraception.

Vatican officials warned that Catholics who violate the new policy directives will be committing a sin.

The Secretary of State for External Affairs, the Right Honourable Joe Clark, has welcomed as a positive development the statement of General Secretary Gorbachev indicating the willingness of the Soviet Union to conclude a separate agreement on intermediate range nuclear missiles in Europe.

Canada has actively supported the idea that an INF agreement should not depend on agreement being reached in strategic arms or on defensive systems. This support flows from Canada's belief that allowing achievable progress to be consolidated in concrete agreements is the most effective means of moving forward the arms control process and improving East-West relations.

Mr. Clark cautioned that an agreement was far from assured as important related issues such as shorter range intermediate nuclear weapons and verification need to be addressed. However, he urged both the USSR and the USA to negotiate in a constructive spirit.

An early INF agreement and a revival of the Summit process would assist the further improvement of East-West relations and provide an important impetus to other arms control negotiations.

A former adviser to the International Monetary Fund (IMF) will discuss monetary reform in a seminar at the University of New Brunswick in Fredericton today.

Subimal Mookerjee, now an economics professor at George Washington University, will speak on Aspects of International Monetary Reform. The seminar begins at 3:30 p.m. in Room 240, Tilley Hall, on the UNB campus. Admission is free and the public is invited to attend.

Dr. Mookerjee worked for the IMF for nearly 30 years. He is noted for his contributions to changes in the Bretton Woods agreement which, in 1944, created the IMF. As well, some of the impending reforms in the international monetary system will clearly bear his imprint.

A graduate of the University of Calcutta and Harvard University, he taught briefly at both institutions before joining the IMF. At Harvard, where he obtained his PhD, he studied under well-known economists such as Galbraith, Haberler, Schumpeter, and Leontief.

Dr. Mookerjee's published works are in the fields of currency stabilization, factor proportion, and sterling area.

The seminar is sponsored by the department of economics at UNB.

# EDITORIAL

On Tuesday afternoon, the memorial service was held for Constable Aucoin, the highway patrol officer shot earlier this week, while performing his duty. This year, three law enforcement officers have been killed in the line of duty; last year seven were killed. On each occasion, various groups have used the opportunity to call for the re imposition of the death penalty. This time it was different.

At a time when it would be natural to expect a cry for retribution from a bereaved family, we received instead a statement of peace. The priest conducting the memorial service read an appeal on behalf of Aucoin's widow. The message was simple: Aucoin had volunteered for his job, fully cognizant of the risks inherent to it; further he was personally opposed to the death penalty. Aucoin would not want his death to be the rallying point for those who seek the return of the death penalty, rather he was concerned with the circumstances that left him and his fellow officers exposed to unnecessary risk. Moves are now hopefully underway to address his concerns.

His widow's statement deterred the usual cry for the death penalty. Let's hope this peace officer's message continues to be heard during the debate on capital punishment.

## Bennett's Complaint

Dear Mr. Hansen:

I always find it "interesting" to receive letters from your group because it usually indicates that some malevolent

action is to follow.

This letter acknowledges receipt of your letter of March 3, 1987 which was hand-delivered to my home, apparently by the same member of the Campus Police who ejected me without cause from a January 16, 1987 meeting in which agents of UNB President Jim Downey and his "student governing council" purported, without lawful authority, to take over the Board of Directors of CHSR Broadcasting Inc. and to unseat the duly authorized representatives of the UNB Student Union Inc. on that Board. This takeover proceeded after you sent a letter to Dr. Downey on January 7, 1987 complaining about the refusal of those representatives to accept your demands.

The same Campus Police member also delivered a letter to me on January 26, 1987 in which I was "cited" to appear before you and a Kangaroo Court styled "Committee of Inquiry" on some trumped-up charges.

You earlier wrote letters to Dr. Downey falsely complaining about Barry White and myself. Dr. Downey attempted to use your letter to justify the suspensions he imposed on Barry White and myself on January 30, 1987, you indicated that you felt the suspensions were justified and deserved.

I did nothing to warrant admonishment or suspension and I don't appreciate the repeated attempts by you and your associates to penalize me for taking part in the legal action against those individuals who, with your active support, purported, without lawful authority, to takeover the UNB Student Union Inc. on April 17, 1986.

The April 17, 1986 actions of members of the "student governing council" (which are supported by their successors, your present "council") in alleging to dismiss the lawful officers of the UNB Student Union Inc. and in violating the Union's corporate bylaws clearly demonstrate that your group does not respect the electoral choices of the student body. Any "election" called or organized by such a group would, by definition, be unfair and illegitimate. As a result, I decline your request and will not be running in your "election" as it is being held without lawful authority.

Even if I were to give up my legal claim and run in your so-called "election" and win, I

would probably meet the same fate as Tony Tracy: being denied my seat, being seated on threat of court injunction, and then being impeached without cause after only a few days in office by the self-perpetuating clique that has entrenched itself in the bowels of Downey's "student governing council".

## Hansen's Reply

Sir:

"... an earlier Council which had totally and incompetently and perversely managed the students affairs of the Student Union in such a way that it almost totally destroyed its financial viability the year earlier... that Council was put out in April, 1986"

Today I received a rather vitriolic letter from Michael Bennett, a student at UNB, who was once a Vice President of the UNB Student Union. I believe it will be published in this week's *Brunswickan*.

His letter, written in response to my request that he cease his legal action and participate in the upcoming Student Union elections, is full of inaccuracies and distortions. Briefly, I wish to address some of these.

First, he refers to the organization which I represent as "Downey's student governing council." No such organization exists. I was elected president of the UNB Student Union, the same organization Mr. Bennett formerly represented, and this body was incorporated by an act of the Legislature of New Brunswick.

Second, there has been no take-over of the Board of Directors of CHSR-FM. Under the bylaws of the Board, two of its directors must be nominees of the UNB Student Union. The meeting of 16 January 1987 was convened to seat the two nominees who had been ratified by Council and selected after an advertised applications and interview procedure.

I have no specific knowledge as to why Mr. Bennett was

# Orientation's national acclaim

At a recent conference in Cincinnati, the UNB Orientation Program was again recognized for its outstanding efforts in serving new university students. Representing UNB was Marc Braithwaite, Chairman of the UNB Orientation Program.

As coordinator of Orientation's Alcohol Awareness Program, Mr. Braithwaite also serves as Chairman of the National Orientation Directors Association Task Force on Alcohol and Drug Abuse Programming for North American universities. His present involvement lead to an invitation from Miami University to attend The Governor's Conference on Alcohol and Substance Abuse Education on Ohio Campuses.

While attending the conference, Braithwaite, delivered two presentations to administrators and students representing universities within Ohio. The first presentation was entitled, "The Importance of Alcohol and Drug Education on University Campuses." It focused on how universities can get their plans for alcohol/drug education off the drawing boards and implement programs within their universities. Braithwaite based his presentation on the success of the UNB Orientation Program involving Alcohol Awareness and the international acclaim it has received during the past year.

The second presentation involved a "head-to-head" panel discussion with the Ohio distribution manager for Anheiser-Busch. This workshop, entitled "The Role of Alcohol Distributors on Campus - a Help or a Hindrance", did not develop

any concrete resolutions but addressed the need for breweries to exercise responsible marketing strategies on university campuses. In addition, the breweries will have to be realistic in the role they wish to play in Responsible Drinking programs.

The two day conference also focused on university liability involving alcohol related accidents, effective programming within our education system, and that the enforcement of "dry campuses" is not a realistic solution in solving student alcohol problems.

This conference gave UNB

the perfect opportunity to expose itself on the leading edge of Alcohol Education. Many conference participants were amazed by the outstanding initiative UNB Orientation has taken regarding effective Alcohol Awareness programming. Key players in Orientation's success include The Associated Alumni of UNB and The Alcoholism and Drug Dependency Commission of New Brunswick.

As progress continues, Alcohol Awareness will go far beyond Orientation. UNB has to establish a responsible alcohol/drug use environment

which involves the entire university community including students, faculty, and staff. In order for this alcohol program to excel, students and administrators will have to work together. If there is no cooperative effort, realistic student needs will never be addressed and in turn, administrators will not be able to maintain a long term program.

Braithwaite is highly confident that the soon to be elected Student Union will capitalize on some effective programming regarding Alcohol Education. This may be one of the many opportunities that the

S.U. will take advantage of in order to build upon their public credibility.

UNB will continue to demonstrate its progress abroad. In mid-May, Braithwaite will lead a two day workshop at The University of Cincinnati regarding effective alcohol education programming. In addition, he will travel to Chicago this weekend to deliver a mid-term report to the National Orientation Directors Association Board of Directors. He is able to make this trip due to his support from The Associated Alumni of UNB.

## Nazi war criminals still around

Rudolf Hess, World War II Nazi War Criminal who is presently suffering from pneumonia, was taken to hospital early last week after doctors diagnosed the illness at his residence, Spandau jail.

Born in Alexandria, Egypt on April 26, 1894, Hess served with Hitler in the same regiment for part of World War I. After the end of hostilities he attended Munich University and wrote a prize essay on "How Must the Man Be Constituted Who Will Lead Germany Back to Her Old Heights?"

He helped Hitler in the Putsch of November 1923 and escaped to Austria, only to return later to serve time with Hitler in Landsburg Prison.

He began as Hitler's private secretary, but quickly moved up to the position of deputy party leader in 1933. In 1939, Hess was declared third in chain of command, after Hitler and Hermann Göring.

In spring of 1941 Hess tried to restore his prestige by attempting to obtain peace with

Great Britain. On May 10 he parachuted into Scotland and asked to be taken to the Duke of Hamilton. After establishing his identity, he was allowed an audience with Ivone Kirkpatrick and Sir John Simon, but was of little use. He was then treated as a prisoner of war and tried with other Nazi war criminals in Nuremberg.

### Ivan the Terrible on trial

Is John Demjanjuk actually the infamous "Ivan the Terrible?" Israeli Prosecutor Michael Shaked thinks so but Demjanjuk, who is currently on trial in Israel for the murder of thousands of Jews in the "Treblinka" concentration camp of Eastern Poland denies this accusation.

Demjanjuk entered the U.S. in 1951 after concealing his military record. He claims he spent the war years as a forced labourer for the Germans. Life was running smoothly for him until 1981 when the Soviets produced an SS I.D. card. As a result, the U.S. promptly revoked his citizenship.

The prosecutor maintains that Demjanjuk was transferred to an SS center which trained guards to work in concentration camps and then to Treblinka where he served between October 1942 and September 1943. The defense contends the I.D. card is a forgery by the Soviet KGB as part of an effort to harass the Ukrainian community in the U.S.

The mysterious aspect of the case is uncertainty about the fate of the real-life "Ivan." He is believed to be dead, but one witness, Yitzhak Arad, testified that no-one actually saw Ivan's body and therefore no-one can verify his death. All maps, photos and records were burned by the Germans after they razed Treblinka in 1943, so as for valid evidence, human memory is the only existing one.

As the trial continues, the defense is bringing forward five survivors of Treblinka prepared to identify John Demjanjuk as "Ivan the Terrible," the Nazi guard who killed thousands of Jewish prisoners. So the mystery continues: Is John really Ivan?

Oral has found a silver lining in this dark cloud however. Although he refuses to say how

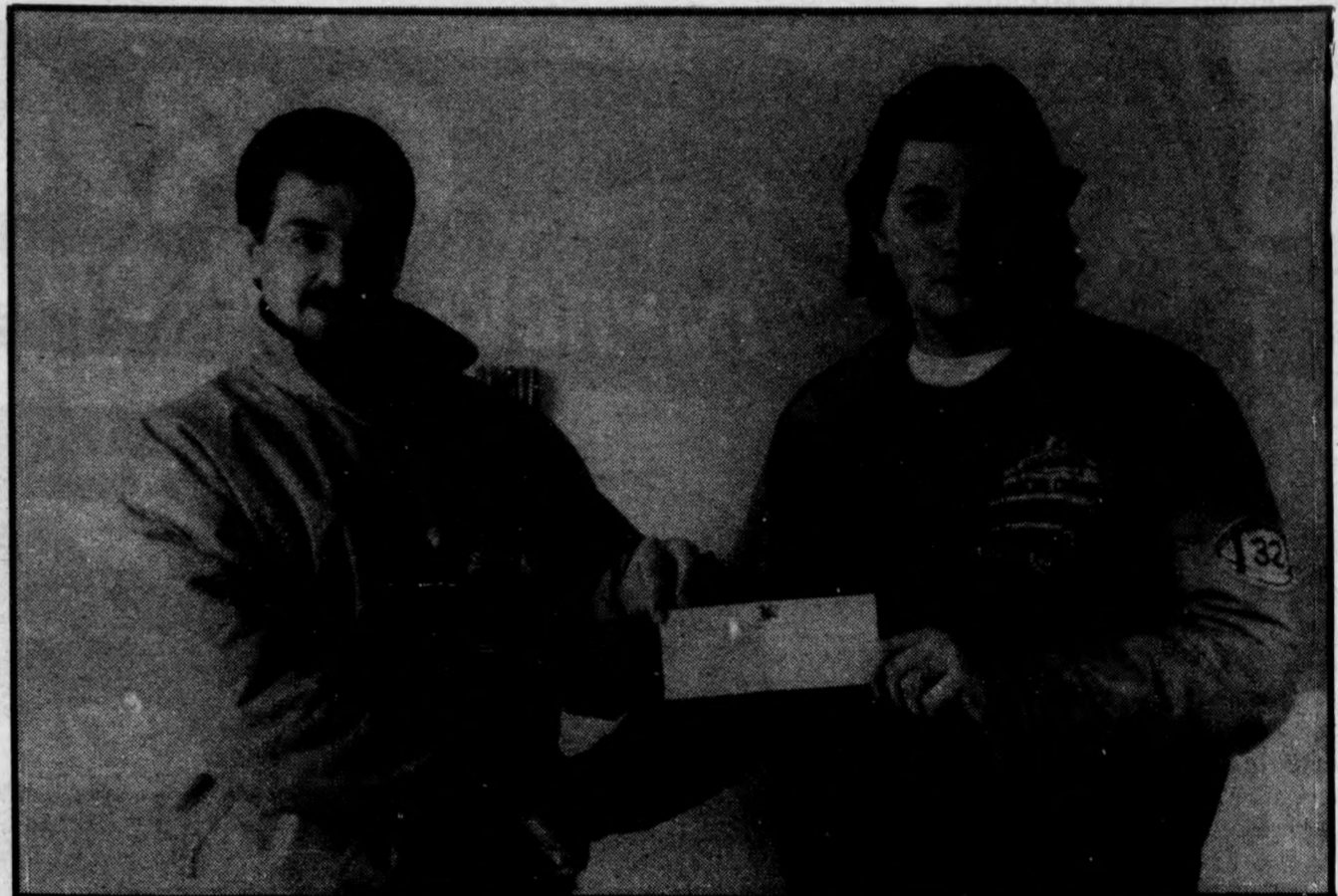

tury can purchase the right to sign his or her name in the Singer Hall Time Capsule register or to leave a memento in the capsule.

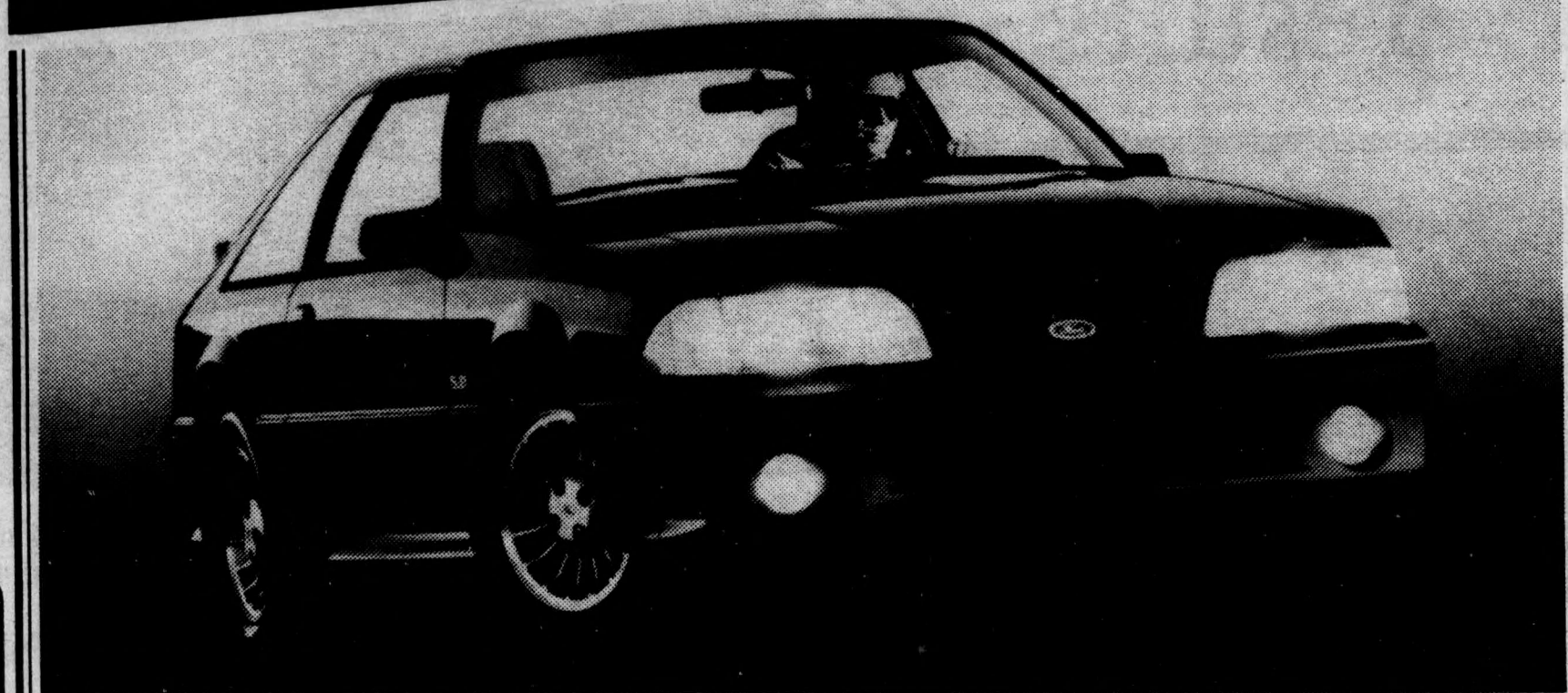
The week will culminate tomorrow, March 14, with a dance-a-thon in the Student Union Building Ballroom from

## Stratejaket Review

Monsignor Boyd Gig



This past weekend, three bands played at the Monsignor Boyd Family Center, promoted by D.T.K. Productions and CHSR-FM: Black Forest Cake Trade, No Contractual Obligations, and Stratejackets. I took in the concert, and found it to be overall very enjoyable.

The uninitiated may be surprised to see such a collection of persons with coloured hairs, mohawks, skinheads, together with girls wearing miniskirts or studs and chains to keep your Volkswagen on the road even during icy weather. If you are not scared off in the hallway, however, these hardcore "gigs" are really something to take in.

In this particular show, Black Forest Cake Trade of Saint John opened the show for a somewhat smaller than usual crowd (perhaps this shows the popularity of such Fredericton bands as Neighbourhood Watch and Scream Theatre, who have attracted much larger crowds). The band was reasonably good, but seemed to be quite unpracticed (especially the bass player and drummer). This is understandable, given the fact that the band has been together less than a month. The vocalist however, in my opinion, projected his voice rather well, and most of his lyrics were intelligible even over the loud drumming and guitar work. The lead guitarist, a former member of Totalitarian Assault, seemed more comfortable with a speed metal style than with hardcore, but managed to get through some passable cover versions of songs of bands such as S.O.D., Black Flag, and D.O.A. The old Totalitarian Assault songs were understandably well done. I think after more time and practice together, this band will be able to put out a much better sound.

No Contractual Obligations (N.C.O.) were the next band on. They began their set with the forgettable "What the F---", which did, however get a lot of people out on the floor slamming. The band, overall, was much more musically powerful than the previous, and very well practiced. They were playing hardcore, and playing it the way it was supposed to be done. They got an incredible response from the "punks" in the audience,

who slammed and thrashed amongst each other during every song. I was especially impressed with their bassist and drummer (perhaps because of the previous band's performance in this respect) who seemed to be very well practiced. The vocalist, however, was not quite as powerful.

The last band of the evening was, in my opinion, the best of the bunch. Stratejackets, from Halifax, played a mix of 60's and 70's garage band Rock n' Roll together with some newer "alternative" (which is widely defined, of course). They were an incredibly energetic

band with an excellent vocalist. An added addition on the part of the vocalist was a tambourine, something I haven't seen in some time. One of the hits of the evening was a cover of David Bowie's Ziggy Stardust, which was very well performed. As well, there was a "cow punk" song of sorts. All of their songs were danceable (yes, that is dance, not trash). I expect, and hope, to be hearing more from this band in the future, as they have great potential and will likely be getting even better as time goes on.

If you missed this concert, you can probably catch both

N.C.O. and the Stratejackets on CHSR-FM (97.9), as I have been informed by the new Music Director, Kathleen Johnson, that both bands have songs in heavy rotation on the station. If you haven't been to one of the gigs at the Monsignor Boyd yet, watch out for the next one. Posters go up all over Fredericton and both campuses, and there should be some mention made in the Bruns. Peter Rowan of D.T.K. Productions has done a remarkable job of promoting these gigs in the past, and I expect the future holds even better things for those fans of good alternative music in Fredericton.



# Angela Hewitt

After a faultless performance, three encores and a standing ovation, Angela Hewitt left the audience at the Fredericton Playhouse chattering excitedly about her stylistic sensitivity, skill - and above all - her utter musicality.

Playing selections from Bach, Chopin and Ravel, she demonstrated amazing ver-

satility. I cannot ever remember having attended a concert where the audience has been treated to a performance reflecting such subtlety and precision. In fact, I found Miss Hewitt's obvious mastery of the piano rather unnerving. It was almost like listening to a carefully engineered recital spliced and cut in a top notch recording studio. But somehow she managed to combine technical excellence with emotional involvement.

The performance -dedicated to the memory of the late Professor Walter Baker - featured renditions of Bach's "Concerto in the

Italian Style", Ravel's suite, "Le Tombeau de Couperin", and Chopin's "Four Scherzi." I particularly enjoyed Miss Hewitt's interpretation of Bach's three movement concerto. But then such sensitivity is to be expected from a pianist who won the prestigious International Bach competition in Toronto two years ago.

Since her Toronto success, Miss Hewitt has played in the United States, South America - and of course Europe. Even though she is at present living in London, she has recorded a number of concertos with the CBC Vancouver Chamber Orchestra.

## Joy Division

Before I bombarded you with comments on Joy Division, I thought I'd tell you a bit about the "Peel Sessions". They are albums that contain British Pop music history, with such artists as the Fall, Billy Bragg, the Beat, Madness, the Undertones, and many more...

John Peel, from the BBC, has reached his 20th year at Radio One, hosting the nation's most popular and influential pop music program. "The John Peel Show", which is a British version of "Brave New Waves", broadcasted three times a week, supports off-beat, diverse and little known bands by using a blend of records, live sessions and Peel's "off the cuff" observations. In fact Peel has recorded and played "Siouxie and the Banshees", "Pink Floyd" and "Bowie" up to twelve months before they got a record contract. He is looked upon as one of the most influential people in the British music scene.

-But enough of that. To get to the point, "Joy Division -The Peel Sessions" is a wonderful album. The album captures the 1979 session of one of the most important bands of the post/punk era. Produced by Bob Sargeant, the four cuts, - "Exercise One", "Insight", "She's lost control" and "Transmission" give a quick glimpse into the intense and often varied style of "Joy Division". This album highlights Ian Curtis' rough vocals, the powerful instrumentation, and the insightful, introspective vocals that distinguish this band from all others. Much less refined than their later releases, this album magnifies their talent and makes it number one on my list.

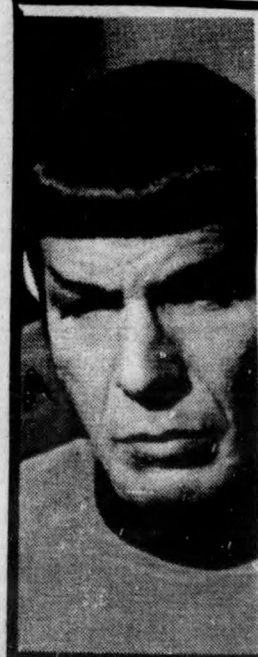

# Norbert Kraft Guitarist

Classical guitarist to perform with UNB String Quartet on Thursday, March 19

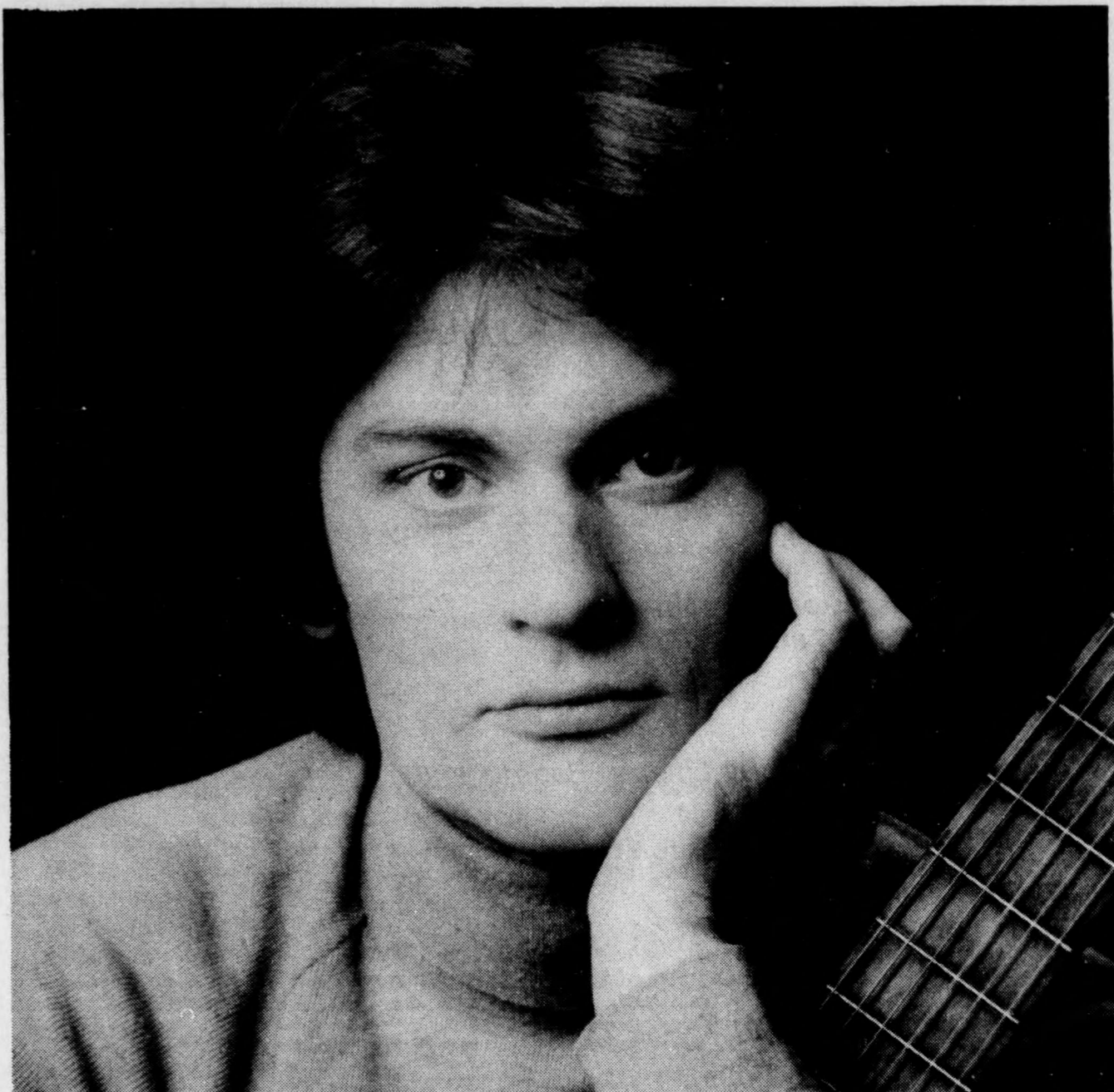
Classical guitarist Norbert Kraft, grand prize winner of the 10th annual Andres Segovia International Guitar Competition, will appear with the Brunswick String Quartet at the Fredericton Playhouse on Thursday, March 19, at 8 p.m.

The concert is sponsored by the Creative Arts Committee of the University of New Brunswick and St. Thomas University. Tickets are on sale at The Playhouse box office and the Art Centre in Memorial Hall on the UNB campus. Prices at \$10 for adults, \$5 for seniors and school children, and \$4 for students at UNB and STU.

The evening's program will include guitar solos by Mr. Kraft composed by Villa-Lobos, Castelnuovo-Tedesco, Albeniz and de Falla. The Brunswick String Quartet will join Mr. Kraft with Guitar Quintet No. 4 by Boccherini and three quartets by Debussy and Shostakovich.

Austrian-born Mr. Kraft is the first Canadian to win the prestigious guitar competition sponsored by Segovia, the world's most famous classical guitarist. From a field of 40 competitors in November 1985, Mr. Kraft was selected by the international jury for the \$2,000 first prize.

Mr. Kraft has garnered critics' praise and kudos for his virtuoso playing. In 1979 he was the grand-prize winner

of the CBC Talent Festival and placed first in the special guitar category. Musical America, an international magazine, selected him as a Young Artist of 1980.

In addition to appearing as guest soloist with most of Canada's major orchestras, Mr. Kraft made his United States debut in 1984 with the Boston Pops under the baton of Erich Kunzel. He has also performed in England, Germany and Spain.

CBC has featured Mr. Kraft on radio and television and, in 1982-83, he hosted his own

radio concert series, The Art of the Guitar. His latest recording is Fandango on the Fanfare label.

The Brunswick String Quartet is the widely acclaimed resident ensemble at the University of New Brunswick. The group recently launched a new digital cassette of quartets by Beethoven and Shostakovich.

ejected from the meeting, but I would suspect that the ejection could only be justified if the meeting went into closed session or if he was being disruptive or obstructing business.

Mr. White's suspension was justified. I did state that I believe there to be more than ample reason to suspend Mr. Bennett.

Third, those "agents" to which he refers in paragraph 2 of his letter include, among others, a member of city council, a producer with CBC, and a member of the St. Thomas Student Union. Could one make the assumption, therefore, that Mr. Bennett believes that Dr. Downey now controls our municipal government, the media, and members of the St. Thomas student body?

Seventh, the "Committee of Inquiry" to which Mr. Bennett refers is an *ad hoc* committee of Council created to investigate a complaint that Mr. Bennett has on more than one occasion allegedly harassed one of our employees. I am not a member of this committee.

Fourth, it is true that I sent a letter to Dr. Downey on 07 January 1987. Contrary to his statement, however, I did not make any demands on Mr. Bennett or Mr. White, and consequently, did not complain about their failure to meet such.

Eight, the executive of the Student Union, as represented by Messrs. Bennett, Bosnitch, English and Brown was removed from office on 17 April 1986, because it lost the confidence of Council and had mismanaged the affairs of the Student Union.

Fifth, I again wrote the President bringing to his attention what I considered to be the harassment of particular students by Mr. Bennett and his associates. Further, any statements I've made regarding the latter's behavior are true and can be proven.

The refusal of Mr. Bennett *et al* to participate in both the elections of last fall and this spring demonstrates a contempt and perhaps a fear of the student body. If they really had our best interests at heart, they would put the question of their credibility to students, and cease offering excuses that serve as no more than a "cop out" from facing those people who they claim to represent.

Sixth, I did not state that

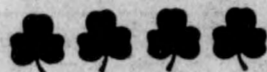
## Ironmen Plan Spring Tour to States

After a three year respite from touring, the UNB Ironmen have finalized plans for a spring tour south of the border to play member clubs of the Virginia Rugby Union. This will be the fourth time UNB has toured in Virginia.

The Ironmen have been practicing since late December in hopes of meeting the American squads with comparable fitness levels. Due to weather restrictions UNB won't see any actual fieldwork until their first stop in Berlin, Connecticut to play the Strollers RFC. In years past the lack of on-field work has not hampered the Ironmen due to their concentration on skill and fitness work during the winter months making the transition from gymnasium to rugby pitch a comparatively easy one.

Touring can only be described as a fine learning experience in which both members and tour veterans alike can expand their knowledge and talents by playing against different rugby unions. The United States has historically fallen behind Canadian rugby unions in terms of organization and overall player ability due to

their later adoption of the game. In the past decade the Americans have risen to a par with Canadian rugby, and in certain aspects such as regimented coaching clinics,

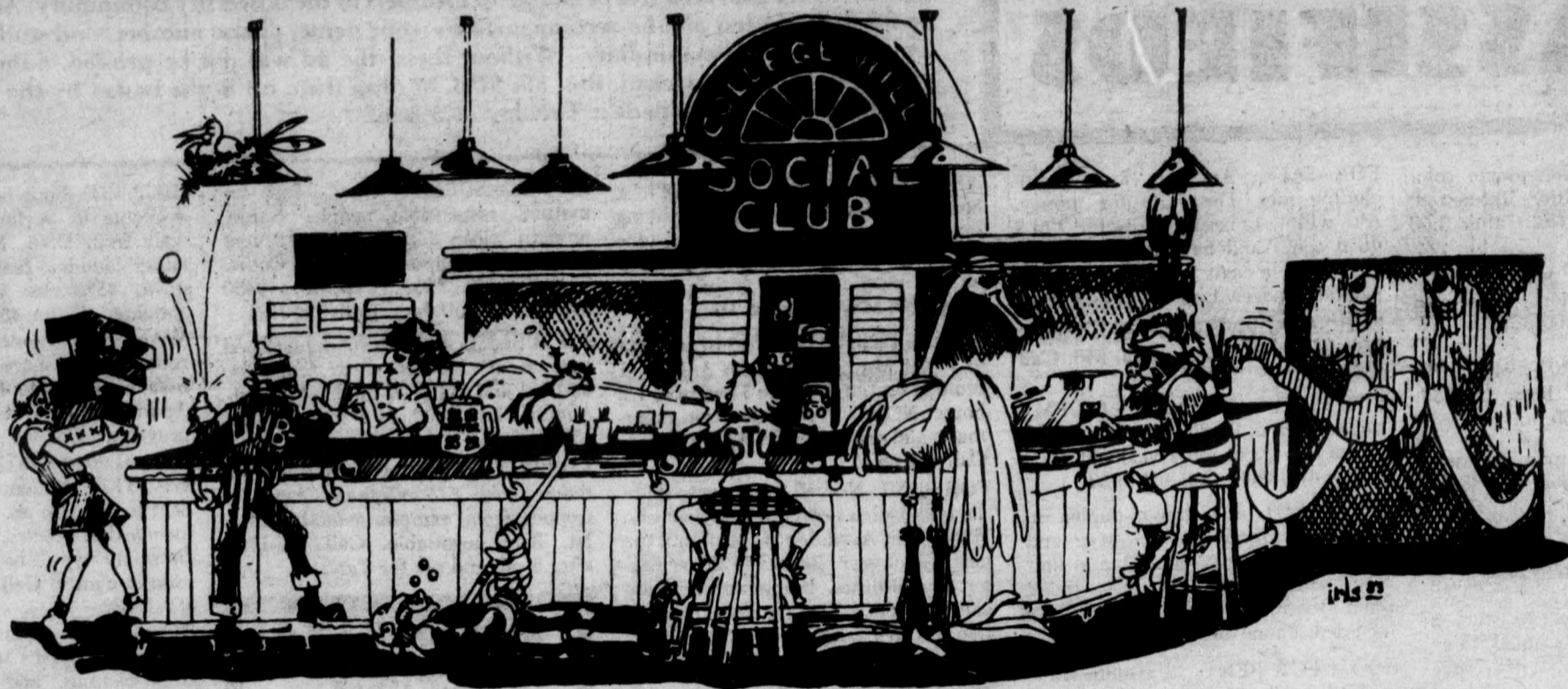
