The beginning of a year; little beginners in Bible knowledge; the beginning of the Bible. Every mother that has little ones who snuggle into her lap to have their "lesson" taught them, will feel peculiar delight in this happy conjunction of beginnings, and will seek to make the very best of the fifty-two Sundays, to teach those eager little learners all she can of the ways of God with men in those far-off days of which the Bible tells.

Let this one word of counsel be offered : Do not think it necessary to explain everything. The door into the heart of the great heavenly Father is easy to babes. Teach the children the story of what God said and did ; it may safely be left to make its own way.

That story, for the present Quarter, is varied and fascinating.

It begins when there was no one, nor nothing, but God; and tells how, by the word of His almighty power, He made all things of nothing, and how He fitted up this beautiful world for man's dwelling-place, and put it in his care; for He had created man in His own likeness, sinless as He Himself was.

It was a beautiful garden, called Eden, where Adam and Eve, the first man and the first woman, were placed; and they were happy in it all the day long,—all the time happy, because they were always good: they had never sinned. How the Children Helped

Mrs. M—— came home from church one Sunday morning in a hopefully determined mood. The minister had made an appeal for the India famine orphans. "Eighteen dollars would support a child for a year," he had said ; and why could not her children do this themselves ?

She had always tried to interest her four bright juveniles in the cause of missions, with but small success. The needs of the heathen seemed beyond the grasp of the little ones, just because their own lives were so full of blessings. The contemplation of millions of human beings growing in spiritual darkness did not move them.

The mother had long realized, that this was not because their little hearts were not kind and loving, but because they needed some particular object towards which their sympathies might go out. If she could only establish some active, vital relationship between her children and those less blessed, she felt sure that their interest would be aroused. And here was the object required. They would "adopt" a famine orphan. She had already spoken to the minister, chosen a name from the list, and now it remained only to see how the little ones at home would take to the new enterprise.

She disclosed her secret, when they were all seated about the dinner table. Instantly, eager enthusiasm met her. Of course they would adopt the poor little boy. Here was something real and tangible, something capable of calling forth their sympathies. The little boy was hungry; he needed clothes; he had no father nor mother to love and care for him; he did not even know that Jesus loved him; he was dependent upon them for so many blessings.

There was no more trouble over inculcating a love of foreign missions in the hearts of those children. The little famine orphan did it all. Mrs. M---- wrote to the missionary who had him in charge, and received in reply a picture of the little boy, and a letter describing him. The picture was set up on the parlor mantel with a little mite box in front of it. On this box the family artist inscribed, in wonderfully illuminated letters, LACKWA, the adopted child's name ; and many a cent, and five or ten cent piece, that might have gone for candy, or popcorn, or some other selfish pleasure, was slipped into 'Lackwa's Box" instead. The children soon came to look upon him as a member of the family; they wrote him letters; and when he learned to write, they received answers. On his birthday they gave him a party, inviting all their little friends, and set a place for him at the head of the table, with the mite box on his chair. Instead of bringing presents, each

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guest dropped a gift of money into Lackwa's box. This sum was given as an extra contribution, for the children very properly declared it would never do to accept help in the support of a member of the family.

At the end of two happy, helpful years, word came that Lackwa had now grown self-supporting. The M—— family felt actually bereaved, and all decided that they must immediately adopt another child to take his place; and before the year was out a little sister was added to the adopted list, for so greatly had the hearts of the M—— family expanded.

Thus did one mother solve the problem of interesting her children in foreign missions, and, at the same time, besides leading them to do kind and loving deeds, brought upon them a blessing that followed them through life—their heavenly Father's approval.

Children are quick to detect the injustice and weakness displayed in such treatment, and to judge accordingly, and in bestowing their rewards they make no mistakes.

THE LESSON RETOLD

Once there was no such beautiful world as we now live in. But God lived in heaven, even then-for there was never a time when there was no God-and, at the beginning of time, He made all things out of nothing. At first, the world had no shape or form, but was covered with water, and black darkness was round about it all. When God said, "Let there be light," all the thick clouds disappeared, and there was light ; and God divided the light and the darkness evenly, so that there was the first day and the first night.

On the second day, God divided the waters

of the clouds that come down when it rains, from the waters on the earth; and on the third day He said, "Let all the waters on the earth be gathered together into separate places"; and so the seas and the lakes and the rivers were formed, and the dry land appeared. And God called the dry land, earth. But there was nothing growing on it-the land was bare. So God spoke again, and things grew out of the ground-soft, green grass, and flowers that were beautiful to look at, and grain and vegetables, and small and great trees.

Afterwards God placed the sun in the sky,

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and bade it shine all day, and go from one end of the world to the other, to mark the days and seasons and years. And God also made the moon to lighten the world at night, and He covered the sky with stars ;—all this was done on the fourth day.

There were as yet no animals living on the earth. Now God made these also. He spoke, and the waters were filled with fish more than could be counted, and they were of all kinds and sizes, from the very smallest up to great whales. Man Made in the Image of God

MAN MADE IN THE IMAGE OF GOD January 13, 1907

Genesis 1:26 to 2:3. Study Genesis 2:4-25-Memory Verses, 26, 27.

Golden Text-God created man in his own image, in the image of God created he him.-Genesis 1:27.

26 And God said, Let us make man in our image, after our likeness : and let them have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the fowl of the air, and over the cattle, and over all the earth, and over every creeping thing that creepeth upon the earth. 27 So God created mean in his care image

27 So God created man in his *own* image, in the image of God created he him; male and female created he them.

28 And God blessed them, and God said unto them, Be fruitful, and multiply, and replenish the earth, and subdue it : and have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the fowl of the air, and over every living thing that moveth upon the earth.

THE LESSON RETOLD

The beautiful world which God had made, with its seas and lakes and rivers, its grass and trees and flowers, its hundreds and thousands of living things, with the sun and moon and stars to lighten it by day and by night, was now finished ; and at last God made the greatest and most wonderful thing of all— He made man. We are told that God took some of the dust of the earth and shaped out of it a man; and breathed into his nostrils, and gave him life, and a soul which could think and understand.

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Lesson II.

And God brought to Adam all the beasts of the field and the fowl of the air, to see by what names he would call them.

But the man, whom God called Adam, was alone in the world, with the beasts and the birds, with no one like himself to talk to; so God said He would make a woman also, to live with him, that he should not be alone. And God caused Adam to fall fast asleep, and He took one of the ribs out of Adam's side, and made out of it a woman, to be a friend and companion to the man. And the woman was called Eve.

And God said to the man and the woman, "I have given you dominion over all the creatures I have made; and for your food the herbs and fruit trees which are growing upon the earth. The green herbs, too, will be food for the beasts and fowls and creeping things."

Thus, on the sixth day, God finished making the world, both the sky and earth, and everything that lives in them. And God saw that everything He had made was good ; and on the seventh day He rested from His labors and made nothing more. 1 Now the serpent was more subtil than any beast of the field which the LORD God had made. And he said unto the woman, Yea, hath God said, Ye shall not eat of every tree of the garden?

3 But of the fruit of the tree which is in the midst of the garden, God hath said, Ye shall not eat of it, neither shall ye touch it, lest ye die.-

15 And I will put enmity between thee and the woman, and between thy seed and her seed; it shall bruise thy head, and thou shalt bruise his heel.

THE LESSON RETOLD

When God had made the first man and woman, He placed them in the lovely Garden of Eden, and bade them take care of it. There was a beautiful river in the garden, and many trees which were pleasant to look upon. God told Adam and Eve that they might eat freely of the fruit of every tree save one,—a tree that grew in the midst of the garden. It was called the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. God said to Adam that if he should eat of the fruit of this tree, he should surely die.

Now, the serpent, which was the most cunning of all the creatures which God had made, thought that he could tempt the man and the woman to do wrong. He came into the garden when the woman was alone, and said to her, "Why do you not eat some of the fruit of this beautiful tree?" The woman replied, "We may eat the fruit of every tree in the garden except this one; but God has

forbidden us to eat of it, and, if we disobey God, He has said we shall surely die." 1

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But the serpent answered, "You shall not surely die. The fruit of the tree will only make you wise, so that you will be able to distinguish between good and evil." And Eve looked at the fruit ; and it seemed so good, that she wondered if what the serpent said could be true. At last, she put out her hand and picked some of it and ate it ; then she gave some to Adam, and he also ate it.

But after they had eaten, they knew they had done wrong, and were afraid to meet God; so they hid themselves among the trees of the garden. But God, who sees and knows all things, called to Adam and said. "Hast thou eaten of the tree of which I commanded thee that thou shouldst not eat?" Then Adam began to make excuses, and said. "The woman whom Thou gavest to be with me, gave me the fruit, and so I ate it." And

the woman said, " The serpent told me the fruit was good, and so I ate it."

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And God was very much displeased, and said to the serpent, "Because thou hast done this, thou and thy kind shalt crawl upon the earth all thy days; and men shall hate thee and shall try to kill thee, and thou shalt be cursed for ever."

At the same time, God promised that He would send One who would undo the harm done by the serpent. This One was Jesus Christ, our blessed Saviour.

THE LESSON RETOLD

After God, in His anger, had spoken to the serpent, He said to Adam and Eve, " Because you have disobeyed Me, and eaten of the fruit of the tree of which I commanded you not to eat, you also, and your children as well, shall be punished."

" You," He said to Adam, " shall work early and late to till the ground, so that you may have food to eat, and your days will be hard and full of trouble till you die. For now all men must die, because you have thus sinned against Me." The woman, too, was to have much sorrow and suffering.

And God sent Adam and Eve away out of the Garden of Eden, where they had been so happy; and He placed cherubim and a flaming sword in front of it to guard it, so that they could never go back again.

But although they had been so wicked, God still loved them, and gave them two sons, to comfort them; and they called one of the sons Cain and the other Abel. When the sons grew up to be men, Abel was a keeper of sheep, while Cain was a farmer and cultivated the ground. One day, when Cain's

grain and fruit had grown, he brought some of these to give to the Lord as an offering. and Abel also brought an offering of sheep from his flock.

God was pleased with Abel's offering, because Abel had faith in God; but He was not pleased with Cain's offering. Cain was filled with anger, and his face grew very dark. And God said," Why are you angry ? If you do right and try to please Me, your offerings will be accepted. You should not allow jealous and angry thoughts to remain in your heart, lest they become too strong for you to conquer."

But Cain nursed his wicked feelings, until one day, when they were in the field, he struck his brother to the ground and killed Then God called to Cain and asked, him. "Where is Abel, thy brother ?" One evil deed often leads to another, and now Cain sinned again, for he told God a lie. He said, " I do not know. Why should I take care of my brother ?"

And God was angry with Cain, and punished him by making him a wanderer upon the earth till he died, and all his days were filled

with toil and sorrow. Cain complained that this punishment was too great for him to bear. He was not sorry for his sin, nor did he ask God's forgiveness ; he was only afraid of being killed by people who should find out what he had done. But the Lord, in mercy, set a mark upon Cain, lest any one should kill him, and Cain went away from his home, to live in the land of Nod, to the east of Eden.



THE LESSON RETOLD

Many hundred years had passed since God made the world, and now it was filled with people. But they were not good : they forgot God, and did so many evil things, that God said, "I will destroy all these wicked people with a great flood of waters, because of their wickedness."

But there was one man, named Noah, and his family, who still loved and served God ; and the Lord spoke to Noah and told him to build a great ark, or vessel, of wood, which should be able to float upon the waters.

And Noah did as God had said, and made the ark, and took with him into it, besides his family, some of every kind of animals that lived on the earth. And the Lord closed the door of the ark. Now, the Lord said, " In seven days I will send a flood upon the earth, which shall destroy every living thing upon it, save those which are in the ark."

So, at the end of the seven days, the terrible

flood began to come. It rained for forty days and forty nights, and the waters rose so high, that there was no living creature left, man, nor beast, nor creeping thing, except those that were in the ark.

The flood lasted for one hundred and fifty days, but the great ark floated safely on the water, until at last it rested upon a high mountain called Ararat. Then God caused a wind to blow, and the waters began to dry up, until the tops of the mountains appeared. And Noah opened the window in the side of the ark and set free a raven, thinking that it would come back again, if it found no place to alight. But the raven never returned.

Soon afterwards he sent forth a dove, a bird which feeds on green things, such as buds and leaves, but it found no place to rest upon, and no food to eat, and, therefore, soon returned to the ark. Noah waited another seven days, and then sent out the dove again.

This time, when it returned, it bore in its bill an olive leaf, which showed that the waters had gone down very much. Seven days more passed, and once more the dove was sent out, but this time it did not return; so Noah removed the covering of the ark, and, looking out, saw that the face of the ground was dry.

And God called to Noah and said, "Come out of the ark now, thou and thy family and all the living things which are with thee." And Noah obeyed, and gave thanks to God for saving them all from death.

ABRAM CALLED TO BE A BLESSING February 10, 1907

Genesis 12: 1-8-Memory Verses, 1-3.

Golden Tert—I will bless thee, and make thy name great ; and thou shalt be a blessing. —Genesis 12 : 2.



1 Now the LORD had said unto A'bram, Get thee out of thy country, and from thy kindred, and from thy father's house, unto a land that I will shew thee :

2 And J will make of thee a great nation, and I will bless thee, and make thy name great; and thou shalt be a blessing:

3 And I will bless them that bless thee, and curse him that curseth thee : and in thee shall all families of the earth be blessed.

4 So A'bram departed, as the LORD had spoken unto him; and Lot went with him : and A'bram was seventy and five years old when he departed out of Har'an.

5 And A'bram took Sar'ai his wife, and Lot his brother's son, and all their substance that they had gathered, and the souls that they had gotten in Har'an; and they went forth to go into the land of Ca'naan; and into the land of Ca'naan they came.

6 And A'bram passed through the land unto the place of Si'chem, unto the plain of Mo'reh. And the Ca'naanite was then in the land.

7 And the LORD appeared unto A'bram, and said, Unto thy seed will I give this land

and there builded he an altar unto the LORD, who appeared unto him.

8 And he removed from thence unto a mountain on the east of Beth'-el, and pitched hi tent, *having* Beth'-el on the west, and Ha'i on the east : and there he builded an altar unto the LORD, and called upon the name of the LORD.

THE LESSON RETOLD

After the flood was over, God spoke to Noah, and made a covenant, or agreement, with him. He said, that, if Noah and his children and his children's children would worship and serve Him only, they should increase and be blessed and possess the whole world. The fish of the sea and the fowls of the air and the beasts of the earth, as well as all fruit and herbs, were given them for food, and God promised never again to destroy the world by a flood. And God set a rainbow in the cloud, which was to be the sign of this covenant between Himself and them.

Now, Noah had three sons, and these sons had a great many children, and these children had still more, until the earth was once again filled with people. But, as before, many were wicked and left off worshiping God. So God said, " I will set apart a nation by themselves, which will serve and worship Me only."

Now, there was one good man living in the

land of Haran. He had come from a city called Ur. His name was Abram. And God chose him to be the father of this great nation; and He called him to leave his own land and go away from his kindred and his father's house, to another country, which He should show Him. And God made Abram this promise, "I will make of thee a great nation, and I will bless thee and make thy name great; and I will bless them that bless thee, and punish them that hate thee, and in thee shall all the families of the earth be blessed."

Abram had faith, and believed what God said, and, although he was an old man. seventy-five years of age, he left his home willingly, to go into whatever strange land God should lead him.

And he took with him Sarai, his wife, and Lot, his nephew, and his servants and his flocks, and all his possessions, and started on his journey to the land of Canaan. As they

passed through the country, they came to a place called Moreh, and there the Lord appeared to Abram, and told him that this land should some day belong to his descendants. And Abram built an altar there, at which to worship God.

Afterwards he went on still further, till he came at last to a mountain near Bethel, and there in the valley below, he pitched his tent, and built yet another altar to God, and worshiped Him.

THE LESSON RETOLD

Soon after Abram had come into the land of Canaan, a terrible famine came upon the land. So Abram took his wife and his nephew, Lot, and his servants, and all his possessions, and went down into the land of Egypt, to live there until the famine was over. He did not remain there long, however, and soon returned again into Canaan.

Now, Abram was very rich. Besides gold and silver, he had camels and cattle and sheep and goats and a great many servants ; so the journey could only be made by slow and easy stages. They lived in tents, and camped wherever they found the best pasture for their flocks, until they came at last to Bethel, where Abram had settled at the beginning, and where he had built an altar to the Lord; and there he praised God for his safe return.

Now Lot, Abram's nephew, also had a great many flocks and herds ; and it was soon found that there was not enough pasture for both Abram and Lot. So their herdmen began to fight as to who should have the best ground and the most convenient wells.

Abram was grieved at seeing this strife, and said to Lot," It is not right that we who are kinsmen should quarrel, nor that my servants should fight with your servants. It would be better for us to separate, and each go different ways." Then he took Lot up to a high place, where the whole country lay spread before them. " See, now," he said, " the whole of this fertile land is before us to choose from ; take whichever part of it you wish. If you would rather go to the right hand, then I will go to the left ; and if you take the left, then I will go to the right." Then Lot looked about him on every side, and when he saw how much more beautiful than all the rest the plain of Jordan was, being fair " as the garden of the Lord" and watered by a river winding through green meadows and beside shady trees, he selfishly chose the whole of the plain as his portion.

So Abram and Lot separated; and Lot took all his flocks and herds and possessions, and journeyed east till he reached the plain of the Jordan ; and there he set up his tent near



the city of Sodom, although he knew that the city was very wicked in the eyes of the Lord. But although Lot had taken for himself what seemed to be the best part of the land, Abram was not jealous nor covetous, but settled himself to live happily where he was.

And Abram had no reason to feel that Lot was better off because the Lord appeared again to him, and said, "Lift up now thine eyes, and as far as thou canst see,—north, east, south and west, all this land shall belong to thee and to thy children forever, and thy descendants shall be as the dust of the earth in multitude."

THE LESSON RETOLD

Some time after Lot had settled near Sodom. four kings came up against the city, and taking it, carried away captive the people who lived in it, as well as all their possessions. Amongst others, they carried away Lot and his family, who thus suffered for Lot's having chosen to live near so wicked a place.

When Abram heard that his nephew had been taken prisoner, he armed a great band of his servants, and stealing upon the invading army at night, he frightened them so, that they fled away, and Abram brought back all the people of Sodom and their belongings, as well as Lot, in safety.

And the king of Sodom, feeling grateful to Abram, told him that, because he had saved all his people, he might take the spoil as his reward. But Abram refused, saying that he would take not so much as a thread, lest the king should then be able to say, " It was I who made Abram rich."

Afterwards, Abram began to be afraid lest, perhaps, these kings he had fought against would return to punish him. Then the Lord appeared to Abram in a vision, saving, "Fear not, Abram, I will shield thee from all harm, and will greatly reward thee." Abram said, " Oh, Lord; why shouldst Thou give me more and greater possessions, seeing that I have no son to inherit my riches after me ?" And God brought Abram outside into the night, and said, " Just as thou canst not count the stars in the sky, so shalt thou not be able to count all the descendants that I will give thee." And, although Abram was an old man and had still not even one child, he believed what the Lord had told him ; and God was pleased with his faith, and said further to him, " I brought thee away from thy home in Ur of the Chaldees, so that I might give thee and thy children this land of Canaan, to inherit it for ever." And Abram praved to God. ' Oh, Lord," he said, " give me a sign, so that I shall know that I shall inherit the land."

Now, when the people of Abram's time entered into an agreement or covenant of any kind with each other, they went through a

strange ceremony. They took certain animals and birds, such as cows and sheep and pigeons, and dividing the bodies of the animals lengthwise, they set the pieces opposite each other on the ground. Then the two who were making the agreement, walked along the passage between, and after they had done this, neither would ever break his word to the other. It was in this way that God now made a covenant with Abram, which would never be broken.

And Abram slept, and dreamed that he was in horrible, black darkness. And God said to him, "Thy children shall not always live in this land. For four hundred years they shall be slaves in a far-off country; but in due time, I will punish that people and bring them back again in safety, carrying great possessions with them. But thou thyself shalt live to a good old age, and shalt die here in peace."



THE LESSON RETOLD

At last, God's promise to Abraham came true, and he had a son, whom he called Issac. When Isaac had grown to be a man, Abraham died, leaving him his flocks and herds and all his possessions. And the Lord blessed Isaac. as He had blessed his father. Abraham, and his riches increased day by day.

After some years a famine came upon the land, as in the days of Abraham, and Isaac took his family and all that he had and went to live in the valley of Gerar, in the land of the Philistines. Now Abraham, also, Isaac's father, had once lived for a time in this country. God continued to bless Isaac wonderfully. What he sowed was multiplied a hundredfold, and his flocks and herds and the number of his servants also increased, until at last the Philistines were afraid that he would become too great, and began to torment him, hoping that he would leave their country. They had already stopped up with sand and stones the wells which Isaac's father had dug,-wells are very precious possessions to the people who live in hot, dry lands. When still Isaac did not go, Abimelech, the king, himself came to him, and asked him to leave the country, because he was growing too powerful.

But Isaac, instead of going away from the land of the Philistines, moved farther up the valley of Gerar. Here, also, there were wells which Abraham had dug, and which the Philistines had stopped up. These Isaac cleared out, and called them by the old names that his father had given to them.

posing to kill thee.

44 And tarry with him a few days, until thy brother's fury turn away; 45 Until thy brother's anger turn away from thee, and he forget *that* which thou hast done to him : then I will send, and fetch thee from thence ; why should I be deprived also of you both in one day?

THE LESSON RETOLD

When Isaac was forty years old, he married a beautiful woman named Rebekah. They had two sons, Esau and Jacob. As the boys grew up, Esau, who was roving and restless, became a skilful hunter ; but Jacob preferred to live quietly, minding his flocks. At last Isaac grew very old, and knowing he must soon die, he called Esau, his eldest son, to him, and said. " Take your bow and arrows and go out and get some venison, to make me a savory stew ; and when you bring it to me to eat, I will bless you before I die."

As soon as Esau had gone, Rebekah, who loved Jacob best of all and wished him to get the blessing, came and tried to persuade him to deceive his father, and make him think that he was Esau. She took a young goat and made a stew that tasted like venison, for Jacob to carry to his father. Then she dressed him in his brother's clothes; and because Esau was very hairy, while Jacob was smooth, she fastened on Jacob's hands

and neck pieces of skin from a young goat, and so sent him in to his father.

Now Isaac was blind and could not see. So when Jacob came in to him and said, " My father," he said, "Who art thou, my son ?" And Jacob answered, "I am Esau. Eat now of the venison I have brought, and then give me thy blessing." But Isaac did not feel certain that it was Esau. " How then did you find it so quickly, my son?" he asked

Jacob had already told a lie, and now he did another wicked thing. He said, " The Lord thy God brought it to me." Still Isaac was not sure, and said, " Come near, I pray thee, so that I may feel whether thou art really my son, Esau, or not." Then Jacob went closer, and Isaac felt all over him, and said, "The voice sounds like Jacob's, but still, these are Esau's hands-"; and so he gave Jacob the blessing that rightfully belonged to the elder son, saying, "Let



delight Proverbs 12: 22.

God give thee plenty of rain for thy fields, and much corn and wine. Let people serve thee and nations bow down to thee; and be lord over thy brethren, and let every one that hateth thee be punished, and every one that blesseth thee be blessed." So Jacob took his brother's blessing.

Now Esau hated Jacob because he had stolen the blessing that belonged to him, and he said, "When my father is dead, then will I kill my brother." His mother heard Esau's words, and calling Jacob, told him he must leave his home quickly, and go to stay with her brother, Laban, at Haran, until Esau's anger should pass away.



WOES OF DRUNKENNESS

March 24, 1907

Isaiah 28: 7-13—Memory Verse, 7. Bolden Tert—Wine and new wine take away the heart.—Hosea 4:11.



7 But they also have erred through wine, and through strong drink are out of the way; the priest and the prophet have erred through strong drink, they are swallowed up of wine, they are out of the way through strong drink; they err in vision, they stumble *in* judgment.

8 For all tables are full of vomit and filthiness, so that there is no place clean.

9 Whom shall he teach knowledge? and whom shall he make to understand doctrine? them that are weaned from the milk, and drawn from the breasts.

10 For precept must be upon precept, precept upon precept; line upon line, line upon line; here a little, and there a little : 11 For with stammering lips and another

11 For with stammering lips and another tongue will he speak to this people.

12 To whom he said, This is the rest wherewith ye may cause the weary to rest : and this is the refreshing : yet they would not hear.

13 But the word of the LORD was unto them precept upon precept, precept upon precept; line upon line, line upon line; here a little, and there a little; that they might go,

and fall backward, and be broken, and snared, and taken.

THE LESSON RETOLD

In the days when the people of Israel and Judah forgot the Lord and all His goodness to them, and worshiped other gods, God sent prophets to them—first to warn, and then to threaten them with punishment, if they did not mend their evil ways.

Isaiah was one of these good prophets, and one day he came to the people of Judah in their famous capital city, Jerusalem, and told them that God was soon coming to judge their sister kingdom, Israel. The glories of Samaria, its capital, should be laid so low, by an enemy, that it would look as if a terrible tempest had utterly destroyed everything; and the inhabitants should be carried away captive.

But, although the kindgom of Israel should thus be destroyed, God was sparing Judah for the sake of those who still loved and served Him as their King; and was guarding and defending this kingdom. But there were those, even in Judah, who deserved to be punished for their wickedness. These were the men who were given to strong drink, among whom were even prophets and priests who had so far forgotten their high calling, as to become drunk with wine. Thus they were unable to teach and instruct the people as they ought, for the wine went to their heads, and they could neither reason nor explain doubtful questions, and so the people went astray, with no one to guide them. The judges also gave wrong judgments in their courts, because the wine they drank made them so stupid, that they could not distinguish between right and wrong.

Then, when God sent His prophets to teach them, they laughed and said, "Do you take us to be children, that need to be taught always what we should do? You prophets tell us the same thing over and over, and repeat command after command, as if you were teaching lessons to babies."

So, because they would not listen to His messengers, and give up wine and the other evil things they loved, God said that He would teach them now in another way. They, too, would be carried away captive to a foreign land, to live among strangers, and then it should indeed be as they said it was—they should be taught lesson upon lesson and receive one judgment upon another, because they had been so stubborn in refusing to obey God speaking through His prophets.

They had often been told how willingly God would give them a life of rest and happiness, if they would only keep His commands, but they paid no heed; so now they would be punished on every hand, "here a little and there a little," until their proud spirits were brought low, and they should acknowledge God's power and greatness.

Lesson Story

During a war, not long ago, a regiment of soldiers was ordered to set fire to a certain village. So they concealed it amongst their things, and at night brought it out and handed it round.

But one of the more sensible said, "See here, the enemy is around us everywhere, and if they should spring a surprise on us, you wouldn't be very well prepared to fight after drinking that stuff." But the others only laughed at his good advice. And that very night the enemy did come, and the soldiers were so stupified from the wine they had drunk, that they could not obey their officers' commands, and fighting blindly and senselessly, they were all killed or made prisoners.

AN ALTERNATIVE LESSON

1 Corinthians 15: 12-21, 55-58

Some false teachers in Corinth had been ridiculing the belief of the Christians there, that, after men died, their bodies would some day rise again. So Paul, the great apostle, who had taught the Corinthians about Christ, wrote to them to encourage them in their belief.

First of all, he declared that Jesus Christ must have risen from the dead, for He had been seen many times afterwards by His disciples and others; and, if Christ could thus rise from the dead, so might all men. Then Paul went on to show them how useless his teachings would be, if there were no other life beyond this world; and how unhappy they would feel, if, after trying to serve God faithfully here on earth in the midst of trials and persecutions, they had no hope of enjoying an after life.

"But," said Paul triumphantly, "there is no fear of this, for Christ is indeed risen from the dead; therefore His people also shall rise. They may die like other men; but they need not fear, for death is only a sleep from which they shall awake some day to be forever with their Lord in heaven."

" So, with this life to look forward to, my brethren," he goes on, " be patient and faithful and self-denying in all things, for God has promised to reward you, at the resurrection, for all your loving service."
