## POSTAGE STAMPS.

8OSTAGE Stamps have been issued all over the world, and it is estimated that there are now more than 6,000 different kinds. Upon them are to be found the effigies of five emperors, eighteen kings, three queens, one grand duke, six princes, one princess and a great number of presidents.

Some of the stamps bear coats of arms and other emblems, as crowns, the papal keys and tiara, anchors, eagles, lions, horses, stars, serpents, beavers, seals, railway trains, horsemen. messengers, etc. The collection preserved in the museum of the Berlin Post Office included, on July 1, 1879, 4,498 specimens of different postage stamps. Of these 2,462 were from Europe, 444 from Asia, 251 from Africa, $1,1_{4}+3$ from America, and 20 from Australia.
