"Not fair or judicial," was what Mr. McCarthy had to say of the charge. "Pretty thin story," was one of his Lordship's comments, and "There is nothing in that," was another. Mr. McCarthy took up as much time with his objections as he did with his address to the jury. From his tone there is probability of an appeal.
