ATHENS MODEL SCHOOL

On Friday last Mr G. W. Beach, Chairman of the Athens Public School Board, received a letter from the Deputy Minister of Education offering to establish a Model School in connection with the Public School. This Model School is intended for the preparation of candidates for "Limited Third Class Certificates."

The chief requirement of the Department in this connection is that the principal shall hold a permanent First-Class Certificate. Of course, other members of the teaching staff, as formerly, must be properly qualified for the work.

The annual grant from the Department in connection with the Model School has been fixed at \$500.

The official letter says: "For a few weeks during the summer the Minister will probably provide a special professional course for those members who are to have charge of the schools." Whether the attendance at this course shall be compulsory or not remains to be seen.

The members of the Public School Board met on Monday evening and, after carefully considering the matter in all its bearings, passed a resolution unanimously accepting the Department's offer.

A Model School is not by any means an unmitigated blessing, but, financially, the board will probably be able to make the account balance, and the advantage that the local training school will prove to students of Athens and vicinity amply justifies the School Board in the course it has adopted.

ELECTRIC POWER

Interest in electric power in Eastern Ontario was manifested by a large attendance of delegates from municipalities at the meeting held in Brockville by Hon. Adam Beck on Friday last. It was explained that under the Hydro-Electric system of the Ontario government, the commission had secured an option of 15,000 h.p. from the Waddington company. This power the commission would distribute among the municipalities making application for it at cost price. The price quoted for the different municipalities varies, depending upon location and amount of power taken. Brockville is down for 1,000 h.p. and the rate is \$20.49 per h.p. Athens, estimated at 75 h.p., would pay a rate of \$39.97.

Providing the amount of power originally asked for is increased by 100 per cent, Brockville's rate would be reduced to \$15.87 and Athens to \$24.69. The plan pursued is for those requiring power to make application to the local municipality. The municipality then contracts with the Hydro-Electric Commission and attends to collections and payment therefor.

Mr Beck has made the long deferred definite proposition for which Eastern Ontario has been asking, and whether it is to be accepted or not now depends upon the power-users and the municipalities. It is safe to assume that the best price at present obtainable has been quoted by Mr Beck, and no doubt a careful study of the whole situation will now be made by those interested.

DEATH OF REV. L. A. BETTS

Rev. L. A. Betts died at the home of his son in Winnipeg on Friday last, aged 85 years, and his remains were brought to Brockville and interred on Monday. As a minister of the Methodist church, Mr Betts was well known throughout a large part of Eastern Ontario. Athens was one of the many stations he filled, and following his superannuation he made his home here for some years. After his removal to Brockville he was an occasional visitor here and was always sure of a warm welcome from his many old and new friends.

He was made a Mason in Rising Sun Lodge, Athens, and ever continued an enthusiastic lover of the craft. A few years ago he was elected to the office of Grand Chaplain.

He is survived by a family of four. They are James Betts, Niagara Falls; John Betts, Prince Albert; George Betts of Winnipeg; and Rev. W. A. Betts, Long Beach, California.

BEE KEEPERS AT DELTA

Morley Petit Esq., Apiculture Tutor at the Agricultural College, met the Leeds County Bee-Keepers' Association at Delta on March 30 and gave the members and others such a treat in bee lore as they never had an opportunity to enjoy before. He drew from his audience by his kindly and genial manner a list of their difficulties and in a masterly manner brushed them aside, telling his hearers where they erred, impressing them with the necessity of making some changes in their treatment, and convincing the most sceptical that by improved methods we would have in this part of Ontario a Mecca for bee-men.

In the evening Professor Pett gave an illustrated talk, in which he treated the bee problems in an educational manner. He showed the different kinds of bees, how they were produced, their length of days and their respective duties. He also showed that the careful and studious apiarist can control the swarming impulse and convert all the bee energy into honey-producing power. He advised those interested in Apiculture to become members of the County Association, giving a long list of the advantages they would enjoy, including the best Bee Journal printed in Canada. Anyone desirous of becoming a member can do so by sending his name and his dollar to the secretary, H. E. Byre, of Chantry.

SUICIDE AT ELGIN

George Burr a highly respected and middle-aged farmer residing half a mile from the village of Elgin, committed suicide on Wednesday last.

The particulars as learned by the Recorder are that Burr had been brooding over payments on the farm which he purchased from Amos Merriman four years ago last autumn. He expected that the present sugar season would assist him greatly in covering the amounts, but since the flow gives indication this year of being light, he had become more despondent.

He arose yesterday morning, however, feeling no worse than usual and joined his family at the breakfast table. Upon completing the chores he proceeded to the village and purchased a bottle of carbolic acid. Returning to his home he went to his room. A moment later he left the house for the barn and almost immediately Mrs Burr detected the odor of acid. Going to the room her fears were realized, and notifying one of her sons that she thought his father had taken acid told him to hurry to the barn. The boy did so and just as he reached the barn he discovered his father removing the bottle from his lips.

The unfortunate man was carried into the house but before he reached it became unconscious and expired before a doctor reached him.

On Tuesday afternoon, on the eve of his departure for Nanapanee, a number of citizens waited upon him at the Bank and presented him with a bronze clock and a gold locket, bearing emblems of I.O.O.F., accompanied with the following address:

AMONG THE JEWS

Interesting Items Concerning Them From Far and Near.

Speaking of the longevity of the Jews. Professor Ripley, in his work on "Races in the United States," says that according to the census of 1890, the Jewish death rate was one-half that of the active American in the three most populated wards of New York city, being 22 per 1,000 among the Jews, 45 among the natives and only 17 among the Jews. Thus the average life of the American would be 45 years, while that of the Jew would be 71 years.

In compliance with the request of the Chief Rabbi of Turkey, the Minister of War has given directions that during the eight days of Passover, Jewish soldiers shall receive a sum of money for the purchase of matzos and other Passover food. This order has been communicated to the commander-in-chief of every army corps. It is safe to say that in no other army in the world is such a wonderful spirit of toleration and regard shown for its Jewish soldiers as in the Ottoman Empire.

The Congress of the All-Russian Nobility which is being held in St. Petersburg, discussed the report of the Committee charging the Jews with playing the leading role in the "liberation movement" and recommending that the nobility should take measures for the protection of the fatherland against the Jewish danger. During the discussion of the report some very violent language against the Jews was used. The monarchist leader, M. Markoff, compared Jews to rabbits, and said that all Jews, including members of the first guild, artisans and possessors of university diplomas, must be confined within the Pale. Also Jews must be prohibited from entering the medical and legal professions, and finally as a radical measure all Jews should be expelled from Russia.

The English Zionists held a conference in Manchester at the end of last month to endeavor to reorganize the movement in England on a satisfactory basis. The result of the conference was that a thoroughly representative body of officers were elected to look after the interests of the movement. It is intended that in the near future a large central committee shall have local Zionist Councils, and the headquarters of the movement is to be in London, as at present. Mr. J. S. Coven, of London, is the new President of the English Zionists. Mr. Coven is a very well known Zionist leader in England, being a director of the J. C. T. and also the Anglo-Palestine Co.

With reference to the bill for the Abolition of the Russian Pale, it is of hope their way, as above. Through the committee may report favorably on the bill, it is admitted that in the Upper House, it is expected that the vote in favor of the bill will be composed. The result was reported in the press by cable, some time ago, but full details were not given. The supporters of the bill were the Socialists, Labor party, the Progressives (whose leader in the debate said that the Christian religion did not permit the punishment of a whole people, because of the presence of a few criminals amongst them), the Octoberists, and the Cadets (Constitutional Democrats). Mr. Kadish spoke for this last party, and said, in speaking of his speech, "In the name of humanity, in the name of morality, and in the name of Russian citizenship, I call for cheer for the principle of equality of all before the law." In view of the importance of the bill, it was decided that the President should call out each deputy's name to record his vote for or against the measure. Ultimately the President announced, amidst great excitement, that 208 votes were given for the bill to a committee, and 128 votes against it, eight deputies having abstained from voting (the absence of which would result in a committee of 169 to 133).

The army itself, we are assured by the Minister and others, is not anti-Semitic. Why, then, are no Jews appointed to commissions?



London society is still enjoying the statement made by Mrs. Aquilith, wife of the Prime Minister, during a recent lawsuit that "extravagance is a passport to society," but to prove that not all the feminine members of the nobility can be reached by the "open-handed" methods of women who desire to "climb," some of the smartest of these within the charmed circle are beginning to take a lively interest in the Simple Life Exhibition which opens soon, in order to prove that while extravagance may help the aspirant for society favor it is not, at all events, a "necessary" passport to circles of the upper set.

Robes For Coronation.

Few people are aware that the guests at British coronations may not select their own costumes. The crown appoints a special official, whose duty it is to see that the robes are properly attired. It is within this official's power to refuse admission to defaulters, no matter what their rank; and at the coronation of King Edward one peer was actually excluded from the ceremony because he had endeavored to assert his independence in some trifling detail of attire.

Dukes must don robes or mantles of crimson velvet, edged with miniver, and their capes must be furred with miniver pure, and powdered with four bars or rows of ermine—i.e., narrow pieces of black fur. Their noble wives will only pass the crown official in safety if, over full court dress, their dual capes are powdered with four rows of ermine, with a five-inch-broad edging, a six-yard train, and a coronet consisting of eight strawberry leaves, all of equal length, above the rim. And so on, from dukes and duchesses down to barons and baronesses.

The different grades of the peers may be detected by the number of rows of ermine on their cloaks. As has already been stated, dukes are entitled to wear four. The other peers wear: Marquises, three rows and a half; earls, three rows; viscounts, two rows and a half; barons, two rows.

The degrees of peeresses, on the other hand, are shown by the length of their trains upon the ground. These are prescribed by the Earl Marshal as follows: Duchesses, two yards; marchionesses, three yards; countesses, one yard and a half; viscountesses, one yard and a quarter; baronesses, one yard.

Novels With a Purpose.
There is no doubt that the best novel of this kind, and the most effective for its purpose of putting an end to slavery, was Uncle Tom's Cabin. "Don Quixote" ridiculed the follies and abuses of chivalry out of existence. In "It's Never Too Late to Mend" the intolerable cruelties of our prison system were attacked, and "Hard Cash" exposed the equally flagrant wrongs practiced in lunatic asylums. "Oliver Twist" drew attention to the maladministration of the Poor Law. "Bleak House" struck at the Chancery Courts, while "Nicholas Nickleby" pointed out abuses in schools of the "Dotheboys' Hall" type. "All Sorts and Conditions of Men" brought about some amelioration of the conditions of life among the poor in the East End of London.

An Aged Family.
Five members of a family of six in the Island of Islay are receiving Old Age Pensions. Their combined ages amount to 446 years. The sixth becomes eligible for an Old Age Pension this year.

A REMARKABLE SPEECH.

Welsh Social Outlaw Finds This World a Wretched Sort of Place.

Many centuries ago there lived a Greek philosopher who got it into his head that life was a lamentable thing. He was a man of great eloquence and he went about declaiming to multitudes and drawing for them the dismal conditions of mortal man. "Life is no better than death! Life is no better than death! Life is no better than death!"

So vividly did he paint the horrors of life that many who heard him committed suicide. His journey from town to town was marked by a trail of self-inflicted murder. One day after he had finished speaking an attentive listener went up to him and asked: "If life is no better than death, why do you not die yourself?" "Because," returned the philosopher, with his most convincing manner, "death is no better than life."

Not wholly unlike the teachings of this pessimistic Greek were the cynical remarks of Richard Parr, 23 years of age, the other day, before receiving his three years' sentence to penal servitude in a Welsh prison. He made a remarkable speech, giving his views of life and mankind in general.

"You have heard a record of a few of the deeds I have been guilty of," he said. "I feel proud of them, proud of my career and proud also to think that my country must go to the expense of providing such a one as I with legal aid. I am one of those degenerates you hear so much about—useless to the country, useless to my friends and useless to myself. I am a living lie and I know I shall never be anything else. Life is a gigantic fraud. Selfishness and oppression abound on all sides."

"The chief object in life seems to be that men should 'do' their neighbors. If they don't succeed their neighbors will 'do' them. I am one of those who 'do' their neighbors. I believe in 'doing' my neighbor, for it is but self-defense. There is no mode of punishment that can prevent me from doing these deeds. If I thought that by living a clean, honest, straightforward life I should be rewarded in the future, then I would do so. But there is no future, and one can't, if he so chooses, live as he will. It matters not one atom, for when one is dead one is finished with. Death will never frighten me. I shall face it and will welcome it."

Ten years ago, as Parr himself explained, he began his career of roguery with a six-months' prison sojourn. Since that time it has been his life's object to do injury to others, and he has succeeded to his own satisfaction. He confessed that since 1901 he had not had six months' liberty and he seemed rather proud of his record.

About Royal Names.
Appropos of the Coronation gift that is to be presented by the Marys of the realm to Queen Mary, it is worth recalling that Mary, Anne, and Elizabeth are the only familiar English names that have been borne by occupants of the throne in that country.

Among the queens and queens-consort of modern times we have had Henrietta Maria (wife of Charles I.), Catharina (wife of Charles II.), Dorothea (wife of George I.), Caroline (wife of George II.), Charlotte (wife of George III.), and Adelaide (wife of William IV.).

And, when speaking of royal names, it is as well to remember that King George V., according to a well-known authority on heraldry, has no surname. He is a descendant of the House of Guelph; but Guelph was only the baptismal name of the patriarch of the family, who died in 1101.

Since then his descendants have been ruling princes, and never needed a surname.

Coins 550 Years Old.
In digging a drain at Fakenham, Norfolk, a man has just found about two hundred gold nobles (a coin worth 6s. 6d.) of the reign of Edward III. The Treasury has been communicated with and an inquest will be held.

The coins were struck either at the Calais or London mint. Some issued between 1251 and 1260, in addition to the titles of King of England and Lord of Ireland, have that of King of France. Those issued between 1260 and 1289 have the title of Duke of Aquitaine. The nobles were almost pure gold, only half a grain of alloy being used. The design of the obverse is the king armed and crowned, standing on a ship, from a masthead flies a streamer bearing the cross of St. George.

The value of the coins is probably some hundreds of pounds, and the man who made the discovery will receive a large share.—London Daily Mail.

Sunday School.

LESSON III.—April 16, 1911. The Resurrection Morn.—Easter Lesson.—John 20: 1-18.

Commentary.—I. The visit to the sepulchre (vs. 1-10) 1. The first day of the week.—The body of Jesus was placed in the tomb before sunset on Friday and lay there until very early on Sunday morning. A part of Friday, the whole of Saturday and a part of Sunday were together, according to Jewish usage, called three days. Mary Magdalene—she was most earnestly devoted to the Master, and it appears that her zeal led her to reach the tomb in advance of the other women. Their mission was to enshrine the body of Jesus, yet dark—before daylight, the sepulchre—It was the new tomb of Joseph of Arimathea, who had requested the Roman officer to permit him to provide for the burial of the body of our Lord, the stone taken away.—The women had inquired, as they were on the way to the sepulchre, who should roll away the stone (Mark 16, 3). The opening into the tomb was like a door in a wall of rock, which was covered by a large stone like a millstone. In Matt. 28:2 we read that an angel rolled the stone away. 2. Run—In her disappointment in not finding the body of Jesus she hastened to inform the disciples of the loss as she regarded it, the other disciples, whom Jesus loved—From this and other passages it is clear that it was John himself.

3. Came to the sepulchre.—The two disciples hastened to the tomb with the hope of finding some clue that would lead to the recovery of the body. 4. Did outrun Peter.—This verse shows the anxiety of the disciples in this matter. 5. yet went he not.—John was able to see the interior of the tomb without entering, and he saw the grave-clothes, but not the body of Jesus. Reverence for his Lord may have kept him from entering. 6. Peter.—...went into the sepulchre Peter was too impetuous to stop outside. This John taken the stone in his disposition from the time he first became a disciple of Jesus. 7. wrapped together in a place by itself.—A sign of the resurrection. If a friend had removed the body he would not have stripped it. 8. an enemy had stolen it—he would not have taken the trouble to remove the napkin and lay it in a place by itself.—Christy-stone. The whole was as if a sleeper had risen from his couch, arranged the clothes and departed.—Whedon. There was no indication of violence, but John saw, and believed.—As reverence at first kept John at a respectful distance from where the body of Jesus had lain, so faith upon a mere complete understanding of conditions within the tomb, led him to enter and to believe that the body of Jesus had not been taken from the tomb, but that Jesus had risen from the dead. Probably he means though he does not say, that he believed in the Lord's resurrection more immediately and certainly than Peter.—J. F. & B. John's love, the love of a mature strong, deep and spiritual nature, all blessed with the highest gift, the gift of faith before he saw the Lord.—Moulton. 9. they knew not the scripture.—We can but admire the faith of John in the resurrection of Christ, in the absence of an understanding of the scripture which foretold the resurrection. Our Lord had told them that He would suffer death and rise again the third day, but the disciples had failed to enter and to believe. John's faith was sublime. He tried so close to the heart of his Master that faith seems to have been inspired in his heart.

10. Jesus appears to Mary (vs. 11-18). 11. Mary stood.—weeping—She remained after the disciples had gone away. Her sorrow at the loss of her Lord's body found expression in tears. Her devotion to Jesus was deep, but her faith was not as strong as John's. "Peter and John's going commend Mary's staying. To the grave she came before them, from the grave she went to them, at the grave she remains behind them. To stay while others stay is the note of love. To stay when all are gone is constant love."—Strain. 12. Seeth two angels.—Her love led her to look at the place where Jesus had lain. "Matthew and Mark mention but one angel, probably that one only spoke."—Clarke. One at the head, etc.—In the most holy places the cherubim were placed at each end of the mercy-seat. See Exod. 25, 18, 19. Jesus was crucified between two thieves, but two angels guarded His body in the tomb. 13. Woman.—A respectful manner of address. Why weepeth thou.—Had she understood that Christ had risen, there would have been no tears of sorrow.

14. She turned herself back.—It may have been simply changing her position from stooping down to look into the tomb to the one she had previously assumed, but Meyer thinks that she was "led by some slight movement behind, or perhaps, as Chrysostom finely supposes, because of some expression of love and awe which passed over the angel faces." Kneeth.—Kneeth.—Mary was looking for the body of her Master, whom she believed to be dead, and not for her risen Lord. It seems that the thought of His resurrection had not entered her mind. She did not pay particular attention to the personage who was there, because of the intense grief of her soul. "She was therefore every way unprepared to recognize the person of our Lord."—Clarke. 15. Words of our Lord after His resurrection were addressed to one of His most devoted followers, and brought comfort to her sorrowing heart. The gardener.—Mary had not yet carefully observed Jesus, and thought He was the man who had charge of the grounds containing the tomb. I will take Him away.—Her love for Jesus led her to desire possession of His body, and her devotion declared she was able to carry it.

16. Jesus saith unto her, Mary.—Her acts and words of devotion had won their way, and Jesus spoke her name, and spoke it with such tenderness, that she at once recognized him. Turned.—She had not been looking toward him whom she supposed was the gardener, but upon hearing the voice of Jesus she at once turned toward him. Rabboni.—This title existed in Jewish schools in three forms: Rab, Master, the lowest degree of honor; Rabbi, my master, of higher dignity; Rabboni, my great master, the most honorable of all.—Robinson. 17. Touch me not.—She had the testimony of two of her senses, sight and hearing that it was the Lord; and she now seeks the testimony of a third, namely, of feeling, in order to be sure that it is a body and not a pure spirit which addresses her. Our Lord forbids her touch, that she may not lose the honor of her preeminence of faith.—Whedon. Go.—She was at once sent forth as a witness. To My brethren.—Bishop Hall remarks that they were at first servants, then disciples, then friends, and after the resurrection, brethren. I ascend.—He had His resurrection body, but was still on earth. He would soon ascend to glory. To my God, and your God.—A tender intimacy that even on high He is their divine brother. 18. Told the disciples.—She instantly obeyed her Lord's command. The gladness of her own heart prompted her to make the good news known to the others. The disciples did not believe her words (Mark 16, 11; Luke 24, 11).

Questions.—For what reasons is the fact of the resurrection an important one? Who went early to the tomb of our Lord? How long had the body of Jesus lain in the tomb? What did Peter find as he entered the tomb? When Mary looked into the sepulchre what did she see? Describe the appearing of Christ to her. Upon what errand did Christ send Mary?

HOW TO RAISE AND CARE FOR THE PROFITABLE HEN.

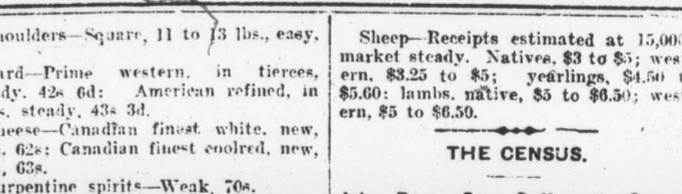


It has been said that 90 per cent. of the ailments that attack chickens are directly due to either the carelessness or ignorance of the attendant, especially where fowls are confined in close quarters. There are many causes for the diseases of fowls, among which are: Too close breeding (no new outside stock introduced into the flock), impaling the stamina and vitality of the fowls; the presence of filth in or around the poultry house; stagnant and filthy drinking water; improper ventilation; direct drafts in the roosting house; allowing access of decaying vegetables or flesh; lack of good, sharp grit; and lice.

Next to roup, cholera is most to be dreaded. The symptoms are drowsiness and a diarrhoea, the excrement being of a greenish yellow color. Cholera is highly contagious. 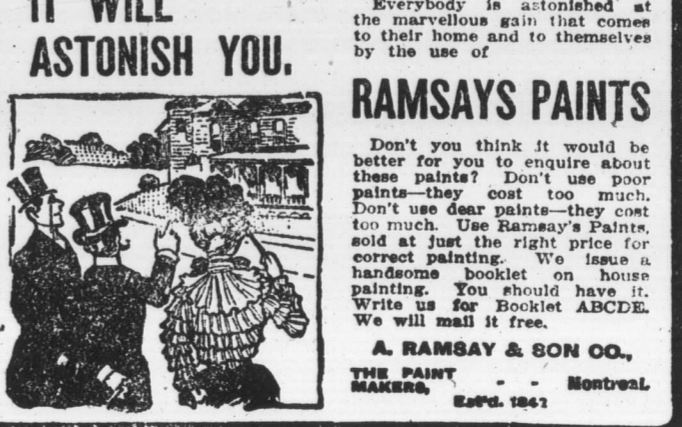
