Cleaning a Greasy Oven.

To clean a greasy oven, take a bu-
cket of strong soda solution and a
long handled brush, such as is used
for cleaning carriage wheels; soap the
brush and rub thoroughly the roof,

with soapy water; take out the oven
sheets, wash them, then the door,
rinsing each part thoroughly with the

Town Council.

The regular monthly meeting of the Council was held on Wednesday evening with Mayor Harvey in the chair and Couns. Hales, Regan, Starr, Haycock and Sleep present.

After the minutes of previous meetings had been confirmed reports were read from Streets and Finance Committees.

The total receipts during the month amounted to \$1471.96 and the expenditures for same period \$3918.11.

The expenditures were largely made up of cost of new fire station, &c. The debit bank balance on Jan. 31st was \$2134.34.

Mr. H. E. Arnold, on behalf of the auditors, read the yearly report and laid on the table statement of assets and liabilities, &c.

A communication was read from Mr. M. K. Ellis, secretary of the Nova Scotia Fruit Growers' Association, expressing thanks for providing accommodations and other courtesies for the annual meeting of the association.

On motion the books of the town clerk and treasurer for the year 1911 were passed upon as correct.

At this point Mayor Harvey gracefully thanked the members of the council for courtesy shown him during the past year and retired from the chair.

The Recorder administered the oath of office to Mayor Chambers and Counsellors Haycock, Regan and Harris.

Mayor Chambers took the chair and addressed the council briefly.

A draft of the bill empowering the Council to apply to the Legislature for authority to borrow the sum of \$15,000 for street improvement was laid upon the table by the Recorder and read.

Resolved that the draft bill entitled 'An act authorizing the town of Wolfville to borrow money for street improvement' be adopted and the Recorder instructed to send same to one of the representatives of the county for presentation.

Death of Wolfville's Oldest Citizen.

On Sunday afternoon last the death occurred of Robert Chisholm Wolfville's oldest citizen. Had he lived until the first day of March he would have been 106 years of age. Mr. Chisholm was a native of Tyrone county, Ireland, and when a boy of ten came with his parents to this country and settled at St. John, N. B. His father, James Chisholm, was a native of Scotland, and his mother (Martha Brown) an Irishwoman. Both parents lived to an advanced age, the father to considerably over ninety, the mother well into the eighties. At the age of thirty he removed to Annapolis Royal, then, and for many years after, a garrison town. Ten years later he came to Cornwallia and settled at Town Plot, where the fort and barracks occupied by the regulars during the war of 1812-1814 were still standing. With the exception of three years spent in St. John Mr. Chisholm lived in Cornwallia, until he came a few years ago to reside in Wolfville with his son, Mr. R. D. Chisholm, at whose home he passed away. Until a few months ago he enjoyed excellent physical health, but since winter set in he complained a good deal of those minor ailments incidental to advanced age. His mental powers, however, remained unimpaired until the last. His recollections, within certain limits, were remarkably wide and clear. He remembered the first four-wheeled carriage in Cornwallia, which was owned by Squire James Eaton, and he had talked with people who remembered when the French were the occupants of this neighborhood. He distinctly remembered the journey over the result of the Battle of Waterloo in which two of his uncles took part. In his youth nearly all the farmers lived in log houses with pole floors. They were lucky if they saw a newspaper once a fortnight. The wages of a good journeyman blacksmith was then from eighteen pence (36c) to two shillings (48c) per day, while farm laborers received two dollars per month and found themselves. Schools in his boyhood were few and far between and the great majority of working people could neither read nor write.

The funeral took place on Monday afternoon, the service being conducted by Rev. R. F. Dixon, assisted by Rev. E. D. Weber. The remains were taken to Canada for interment.

Wolfville Defeats D. B. D. A.

In a fast and exciting game of hockey Wolfville defeated the D. B. D. A. on Monday evening to the tune of 7-2. The game was the best seen here this season. The Dartmouth team had a stronger team than the last time they were here. The home team put up a brand of hockey more like that of last year, and are not going to give up the trophy without a struggle. Lloyd Black refereed very satisfactorily.

The first half was very keenly contested although the visitors had a little the better of the territory. From the face-off the puck was carried up and down the ice in sensational rushes. Then the play settled near Wolfville's goal for a time. Spicer carried the puck into Dartmouth's territory and repeated attempts were made to score, but in vain. Play was rushed back to Wolfville's end, where Eagles and Eaton got the puck and carried it up the ice, scoring the first goal after 13 minutes of play. Soon after this Spicer was sent to the boards for two minutes, and while he was off Patterson scored for Dartmouth. In a few minutes the visitors scored again, putting them in the lead. The rest of the half was rather slow and the bell rang with the play in Wolfville territory.

In the second half the home team got down to work and had things pretty well their own way. From the start the play was carried into Dartmouth territory. Eaton and Murray got into an argument and were allowed to settle it in the box. Fraser carried the puck the length of the ice and tied the score after 5 minutes of play. Then Eaton came on and Wolfville again found the net. End to end rushes followed and Christie netted the puck. Play continued in Dartmouth's territory and Eagles scored. The puck was then carried to Wolfville's end, but Eaton carried it back and shot but failed to score. Soon after this Wolfville added another to the score. The play began to get rougher toward the end of the game and Eaton and Palmer were sent to the boards, followed soon after by Eagles. Fraser made another sensational rush, scoring number 7, and immediately the bell rang.

The Opium War in China.

The truth of this assertion can be realized only by one who knows how enormous a task the Chinese government has undertaken in trying to stop the raising of the poppy.
Although the opposition to the government's measures has been so strong and so unscrupulous as to be described as both Titanic and Satanic, the crop has already been reduced by one half, and hope is high that by 1924 the traffic will be wholly extinct.
In this great reform China has the help of Great Britain. Although we see an enormous financial sacrifice in the protective loss in the export trade in India opium, we are now comprehensively supporting the crusade against an evil which, no many years ago, we were only too willing to encourage.

A Curious Oath.

The following curious oath was until recently administered in the courts of the Isle of Man: "By this book and by the holy contents thereof and by the wonderful works that God has miraculously wrought in heaven above and in the earth beneath in six days and seven nights do I swear that I will, without respect to favor or friendship, love or gain, consanguinity or affinity, envy or malice, execute the laws of this 'isle justly between our sovereign lord the king and his subjects within this 'isle and between party and party as differently as the hearing's backbone doth lie in the middle of the fish."

Children Cry FOR FLETCHER'S CASTORIA

At New York, Friday, thirty-five thousand placards enjoining 'No Smoking Under Penalty of Arrest' were ordered by Fire Commissioner Johnson to be posted in buildings where crowded cigar conditions make the use of pipes, cigars or cigarettes a menace to life and property. The signs are in three languages: 5,000 in Italian, 10,000 in English and 20,000 in Hebrew.

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Scotland's Record.

The 103,000 persons with drunkenness and disorder in Scotland during 1908, arising in the former entirely from the use of alcohol, and in the latter mainly so, provided the great bulk of work for the constabulary and courts, says a correspondent. But it has been found that drink is an important factor in the causes of more serious crimes. The bulk of assaults is brought about by it, but it is the common explanation of 589 sentences for cruelty to children. About 80 per cent. of charges for murder and culpable homicide arise from intoxication. But the influence of drink extends into other classes of crime which are not generally supposed to be affected by it. From five different careful investigations made among persons guilty of crimes against property, it has been found that in 60 per cent. of them the criminal was not sober at the time of committing the offense. Tetotalers in this class rarely exceed 6 or 8 per cent. of the whole.

Temperance Medicines.

It is becoming well known that the use of alcohol as a medicine is steadily decreasing, as shown by hospital statistics and the testimony of physicians in private practice. Dr. H. W. Wiley, chief of the United States bureau of chemistry, devoted a section of his address as president of the American Therapeutic Society recent held in Boston, to this decreasing use of alcohol in medicine. "I think," said Dr. Wiley, "there is a marked tendency in the medical profession to regard the virtues of alcohol as very questionable. The general result of this (alcohol) problem has been an accelerated movement to restrict or limit the use of alcohol in medicinal practice. A few years ago some alcoholic beverage was regarded necessary in the treatment and elimination of the cause of disease. At the present time the use of alcohol in any form as a food product is extremely restricted. Both as a means of prevention of disease and as a remedy for disease, alcohol is rapidly falling into disrepute, and bids fair to become a mere memory in the Materia Medica and in the Pharmacopoeia." Scientific Temperance Federation.
