

A physicist could experiment with gunpowder and prove that it is easily oxidized and gives rise to a large amount of heat and energy. From this it might be argued that gun powder is a most useful kind of fuel for cooking stoves; Such a conclusion would be hardly less logical than the conclusions that have been drawn from these experiments with alcohol, and which regard it as a useful food for the body. Gun powder is a very unsafe fuel because of its secondary effects, and in the same way the food value of alcohol cannot be determine by its power of being oxidized, but must include the consideration of its secondary effects as well. To show how misleading such a conclusion may be, we may notice a single aspect of this question. Alcohol is oxidized in the body and gives rise to heat. Moreover, the use of alcohol, as is well known, produces a flush of the skin and a feeling of warmth. These two facts will convince most people that alcohol it a heat-producer. But when looked at more closely the question is not so clear. The flush of the skin is due to the action of alcohol upon the nervous system, which causes a paralysis of certain centres, resulting in the dilation of the blood vessels in the skin. This dilation causes the blood to rush rapidly through the skin, giving a sense of warmth, to the end organs located in the skin. hot fomentation in cases of severe pain. It is very soothing for a gathering inside the mouth, and severe neuralgic pains in the face are often relieved by using it. Make two flannel bags and fill them lightly with boiled flowers. Squeeze one bag and apply it as hot as it can be borne to the painful part, covering with warm dry flannel folded twice. When this bag gets cold change with the second bag, which should be kept stewing between two plates in the oven. Keep repeating this

until the pain is relieved. How to Utilize Buttermilk.

The housewives who always use sweet milk and baking powder in articles where such ingredients or their equivalents are called for little guess the superior results which may be obtained from the use of sour buttermilk and soda. If sour milk is used it must be freshly soured, not stale; hence, the best time to use it is in the summer time. Buttermilk is preferable all the year round. Biscuits, griddle-cakes, waffles, cornbreads, muffins, gems, gingerbread, cookies, etc., are all of them more tender, delicate and probably more wholesome (since the majority of baking powders are adulteted) if they are made of buttermilk and soda. A general rule is one level teaspoonful of soda to one pint of buttermilk or freshly soured milk, The sods must be first pulverized by rubbing with a knife on the table or bread board, then added to well to sift the flour, soda and salt together two or three times to insure an even blending. In a very short time one learns to gauge the soda exactly to the acidity of the milk to be used. Baking powder cannot give the best results in the class of articles enumerated .- Woman's Home Companion.

LONDON, Oct. 7.—Her Majesty in Privy Council at Balmoral this morning assented to the calling of Parllament, the mobilzation of the reserves and the continuance in the army of all soldiers now serving, who in ordinary circumstances would be entitled to discharge or transfer

So far as the facts go the commencement of hostilities between Great Britain and the Transvaal seems to be nearer, although it must be admitted that a new element of danger has arisen in the exasperation caused throughout the British colonies in South Africa by the stories of brutal treatment of refugees by Boers. Whether these reports are correct, or not the accounts of outrages upon women and children are having their effect and are being accepted in many quarters hitherto incredulous as confirming the anticipation of the savagery that will mark the pro-

gress of the war. The despatches from the frontier are mostly concerned with the movements of troops, There are several reports that the Boers are increasingly restless under restraint and because of the imperfect provision made for their welfare. It is said that they have threatened either to raid or to return to their homes. President Kruger, however, appears to have reiterated his orders commanding the exercise of restraint, the British and Boers are so close together along the western frontier of the Transvaal.




