



The Dominion Exhibition a Halifax closed on Friday after twelve days of unprecedented success from all points of view. The weather was charming all through and the attendance was by far the largest in the history of exhibitions at Halifax. The total attendance was 142,746. about 52,000 more than the highest previous number at an exhi bition there. It is expected the commissioners will; have a considerable cash surplus over all ex-

One of the trial judges at Halifax declared when the case was before that court that sufficient evidence had even
