

Fogota Goes North. The S. S. Fogota, Capt. Baxter Barbour; will sail north Saturday next at 3 p.m., taking mails and passengers and freight. The ship will go as far as Twillingate provided that ice does not obstruct her. There is quite a number of people here at present from the Northern Outports who wish to return to their homes, and at their request the Government decided to charter the Fogota for an extra trip.
