"Woman's freedom," writes Laurence Housman, of London, Eng., does not and never will consist merely in the possession of a vote; there are a great many men possessing votes who are by no means free, largely because they do not value freedom. But if women, when they obtain the vote, value freedom, as many are showing that they value it by their struggle to obtain the vote, then without coubt we shall see in all departments of life and art a new influence showing itself, different in kind from any influence that has hitherto held sway in our civic life.

"Freedom for women has a twofold aspect-outwardly it may be described as 'right of way,' a right to enter, without any artificial barriers imposed by the other sex, into all the departments of life, there to test their power and heir limitations without hindrance and without favor; inwardly it meanss something deeper and more important, it means a power for moral and spiritual initiative, to the exercise of which 'right of way' will only provide the means."

CRIMINAL APPEAL.

Judgment was given yesterday on the appeal in this matter. The con-viction was upheld by the Chief Justice and Judge Johnson. In the opin ion of Judge Emerson the appeal should be allowed, and the conviction

After the delivery of the judgment the prisoner was sentenced, by Judge Johnson, to two years in the Peniten tiary, with hard labor, the time to run from August 21, 1912. The Judge meritorious service of the accused for a number of years, and also because of the manner in which the appeal had been presented, the sentence was much lighter than it would otherwise

It was unanimously held by the Court of Appeal that the Criminal Appeal Act, 1907-8, (English) is in force n this Colony. This is the first decision on this point, and changes the practice here as to criminal appeals The prisoner's counsel had said, at the outset of the appeal, that if the Court held this Act to be in force, he did not rely on the objections which would otherwise be made as to the manner in which the jury had bear empannelled at Harbor Grace. Arguments on this point were therefore presented without prejudice. In view of the decision reached, that the Act is in force, it therefore became neces-sary to decide the question about the Jury But the Chief Justice referred to it in passing, by saying that as t the first jury panel, the action of the Crown officers, in asking its dismissal because of what the Judge had done, had the effect of making the question of the legality of the Judge's action of no importance; and that a to the second jury panel, the fact that the prisoner had not challenged the full number he was entitled to had the effect of making the judge's action of the importance which it might have possessed if the challenges had been exhausted. These remarks, however not being a necessary part of the real decision, it appears that the vexed ed the public:—Can a judge deal with a jury as Judge Johnson did at Harbor Grace-has not been passed on by the Court.

The question that really has been decided by the Court in this case, be yond the decision that the Criminal Appeal Act applies, is this:—Tried for breaking and entering the shop James Cron, with intent to steal, the prisoner on cross-examination was sked if he had been charged with stealing from Ernest Simmons. There was no connection between the facts in the two matters. The Chief Justice and Judge Emerson agree that the question about the Simmons matter should not have been asked or answered, because the facts of that matter were inadmissible to prove the charge on which the accused was being tried, and therefore a violation o the Criminal Evidence Act. But here these two judges differ. Judge Emer-son holds that the trial Judge did not sufficiently withdraw this evidence from the jury, and that, therefore, the conviction should be quashed. The Chief Justice holds that the trial Judge's remarks to the jury robbed this evidence of its sting to such a degree that the jury could not have been affected, and therefore that the conviction should not be disturbed.

lawyers, the Chief Justice gave an opinion, but Judge Emerson made no remark whatever, though his decision seems to imply disagreement with the Chief Justice on the point, He has, however, promised to delive a reasoned judgment for his decision and if he does so he may deal with this matter. Relying on an English decision (Rex vs. Nicholls, 1908, 25 P.L.R. 65.) the Chief Justice holds, in effect, that where there has been nondirection by a judge to a jury (which seems equivalent to misdirection) the Court of Appeal will not quash the conviction on the ground of "Mis-carriage of Justice" unless the Court is of opinion that if the jury had been properly directed it would have found or ought to have found the prisoner not guilty. This seems to constitute the Appeal Court a second jury in the action, and to amount to this, that nothing illegal done in the course of a trial is a "Miscarriage of Justice" i the Appeal Court concludes that the accused was really guilty. This seems to be opposed to another English case, Rex vs. Dyson (1908) 2 K. B. 454, where it was held that "where the Court of Appeal were of the opinion that even had they been properly directed the jury would in all probability have convicted the prisoner, the Court nevertheless quashed the Conviction on the ground that they were unable to say certainly that the jury must have convicted even if properly

On the question of fact, the Chief Justice and Judge Johnson said that they wre convinced the prisoner was guilty, and Judge Emerson said he did not express any doubt of this. The sentence was a merciful one in this light, and in passing it Judge Johnson had evidently given consideration to all that could be said in favor of the



The Home Rule Bill started its final stage to-day, and it was marked by two speeches seldom excelled in the House, by Asquith and Balfour, Other speakers, representing all parts followed, and the debate was adjourned until to-morrow, when a division

will be taken. The bitterness which

bills of a similar nature aroused in

the past was absent in the discussion. but with "harder hitters" on the programme to-morrow, this may not be continued. When the order of the day was called, Balfour, at the request of Bonar Law, moved the rejection of the measure. There was a crowded house, and Balfour, who had been absent from Parliament for some weeks, while not so fluent as the Prime Minister, delivered one of those telling speeches for which he is famous. He dealt with the Bill in a general way, and particularly laid stress on the case of Ulster, which he likened to the revolution of the American Colonies. He charged the Government with showing a dangerous appreciation of the situation, and pointing his finger at the government bench, concluded with saying if blood be spilled the real assassins would be those who never had the courage to face the situation. Asquith defended the bill from every standpoint. He pleaded with the House to forget the past, and give Ireland what the vast majority demanded. He laid stress on the safeguards in the Bill to prevent Protestants from being oppressed by the majority; and repeated the Government's offer to insert any other reasonable safeguards if only the Opposition could tell what was wanted. He recalled that Balfour had made the same gloomy prediction he did to-day when the Liberals gave self-government to South Africa. Unionists and Liberals, continued the debate until after dinner, when T. P. O'Connor gave the bill his blessing on behalf of the Nationalists. Hon. Thomas C. R. Agar, Robartes, one of two Liberals opposing the measure, regretted the refusal of the Government to hold out the olive branch to Ulster, and denounced the bill as one of coercion. William O'-Brien, leader of the Independent Nationalists, criticized some provisions of the Bill, and said that while he could not accept it as a final settlement, he regarded it as a sincere and courageous message of peace to Ireland. He suggested that if the former Chief Secretaries and Under Secretaries of Ireland and three representative Irishmen, including John E. Redmond and Sir Edward Carson. could be got together, they might come to some measure of agreement.
