Fertilizers must be used liberally if large returns are looked for. There are several good chemical fertilizers which may be recommended, but Sul-phete of Ammonia has been proved to phate of Ammonia has been proved to

give the best returns, and is the most valuable and economical source of itrogen for agricultural purposes vegetables, grass, and all leafy crops, about one and a half cwt. per acre is the best quantity to use, and this should be applied when the plant s making it's growth, as well as be-

fore sowing the seed. If a liquid manure is preferred, a 1/4 oz. of Sulphate to one gallon of water should be used, and applied once a week for a month. This quan-

It is a good plan to reduce the Sul-phate to a fine powder, and mix with four or more times its own bulk, for the purpose of diluting the manure, which is very powerful. For potatoes the following mixture strongly recommended:-40 lbs. Superphosphate. 26 lbs. Fine bone meal. 10 lbs. Carbonate of Magnesia.




