



German Submarines.

The statement that fifty German submarines have ment of the war is remarkable in view of the elusive character of thes underwater crafts and the number of submarines Germany was known to possess on August 4th, 1914. When war was declared, Germany had 30 submarines ready for sea, with a reserve of six new boats which were near completion. The German Naval Law provided for the construction of 72 submarines by the end of 1917. If all have been rushed to completion, this would mean 108 of these ves sels and if 50 of these have been de stroyed, it means that the British Navy has succeeded in destroying half of the German submarine navy. It is sufficient to show that this peril can be met, and perhaps overcome, and at all events sufficiently overcome to frustrate the objectives of the submarine warfare. These objectives are two in number. The first is to reduce the Dreadnoughts of the British Navy in number while the German Dread ights are kept secure at the bas until the German strength in Dreadnoughts is on a par with the British. This objective has failed definitely. British Dreadnought superiority over that of Germany is far greater to-day that superiority is being steadily im proved by the addition of new dread-noughts to the French, Russian and Japanese Navy and by the addition of Italian dreadnought strength, so that to-day it is practically impossible for Germany at the present or in the future operations of the war to measure strength in dreadnoughts with her enemies. The other objective was to starve out the British Isles by a submarine blockade. Thousands are Deported from their Homes to Asia Minor.—Draft many into Turkish Army.—Hang Leaders of Armenian Society Outside the War Ministry.

At the Armenia ntown of Zeitiunvof, of 20,000 inhabitants, the young Armenians refused to enlist in Tur key's armies. A Turkish military force was sent against the city but 300 of the Turks were killed. An overwhelming Turkish force was sen against the city, and when it fell the Turkish military officials carried ou to the extreme degree their system of leportation and dispersion.

Twenty thousand Turks from

Thrace were taken to Zeitoun and established in houses that for generations belonged to the Armenians. while the former owners were scattered to the extreme ends of the Empire, one portion being sent to the sandy deserts at the head of the Persian Gulf and the other to malarial marshes in the interior. Eye-witness es from the interior, coming to Constantinople describe the processions of these ragged, miserable Armenians as they poured off to Zeitoun, herded by soldiers in groups ranging from fifty to several hundred. Old men who could not maintain the pace were beaten by the soldiers until they died in their tracks. Children dropped out by the wayside to perish. 



Japan Leads as Fishing Nation!

Japan is said to be the leading fishing nation, not in the actual value of its fish products, for in that respect several other nations excel it, but in the number of persons who make their living by fishing, in the proportion of fishers to the rest of the population, in the relative importance of fisheries in the domestic economy, in the ingenuity and skill of the people in devising fishing apparatus, in preparing fish and in the zeal shown by the Government in promoting the in terests of the fishing population. The islands comprising Japan

stretch diagonally from northeast to southwest, between two and three thousand miles, giving a great range of climate, and consequently of waters from almost tropical to almost arctic. The islands are for the most part long and narrow and at no part s the interior too far from the sea to allow of the easy transportation of fresh fish. Within a few miles of the coast in many places are deep parts of the sea in which breed inexhaustible supplies of deep sea fish, while the bank and top feeding sorts swarm about the shores in countless schools. It is estimated that one person in 20 in the entire Empire is more or less of a fisherman and fish appear in some form on the table of every Japanese family daily, if not at every meal. The annual value of water products is in excess of \$30,000,000.

Half a million boats are engaged in fishing, of which 18,000 are more than 30 feet. Almost a million men are professional fishermen, and 1,400,000 more give part of their time to fishing and the rest to farming or other pursuits. Only about 200,000 men are, it appears, so employed in the

Home Defeuce Corps.

A meeting of the officers and ex-officers of the City Brigades was held at the C. L. B. Armuory last night to discuss matters in connection with the formation and training of a corps for Home Defence. The meeting was largely attended and was presided over by Lt.-Col. R. G. Rendell, of the C. L. B., who stated that the principal object of the meeting was to ascertain how many men were available for assistance in the organization of such a force. He explained to the meeting that at the last meeting of the Patriotic Association a sub-committee was appointed to deal with the mittee was appointed to deal with the question of home defence, and that there recommendations which have been approved by the Reserve Force Committee are now in the hands of the Executive to be confirmed. It has been suggested that a force of about 250 be established and the men trained in manual, platoon, and marching exercises, particular attention to oe paid to the training of marksmen. The exercises, particular attention to oe paid to the training of marksmen. The members of the Rifle Club have already offered to attend to the musketry instruction. While the formation of this corps is principally for the protection of St. John's, members the outports or on Labrador, but this would be optional. Let the ship be rammed or badly noled in action below the water-line, and the diver calls for his dressers. for he's now the star actor of a drama which may turn into tragedy involving a thousand lives.

port the damage. Even in port the "cobbler" goes below and scrapes the cruiser's bottom, a process which may add a couple of knots to her speed and make all the difference between safety and capture or destruction at the hands of an

overwhelming force. For this work scaffolds are rigged up and boats launched with a panoply of steel brushes and other gear which tears off the baracles and weeds that incrust the steel hull, perhaps thirty feet down in the green waters.

This is no work for the weakling or the tippler. The would-be diver must be a superb specimen; a clean and sober liver, for the pressure of water at great depths is fearfully trying to heart, lungs, and stomach. Think of eighty pounds on every square inch of the body! From such a depth the man must be hauled up slowly so that his vital organs may adjust themselves to the relaxing pressure. Bleeding at the nose and ears occurs, and there are terrible risks from sharks and other monsters of the deep.

Where Divers are Trained.

Down at Portsmouth is the queerest 'school" in the world where these warship "cobblers" are trained. It's a circular tank like a gas-holder in miniature, with an outside stairway leading to a gallery above. At a height of five feet or so is a range of plate glass windows through which the instructor can put the novice

through his slow and ghostly paces. He is taught to use hammer and chisel, to scrape a hull and recover lost anchor-chains. In six months the man is a skilled artisan under water, and then he's drafted to battleship or cruiser, where he's a priviledged person with special pay-a unique sort of "ship's doctor," called into consultation when the steel monster is hit in a vital place, and none can say how long she has to live.


