German National Votes

Premier Bauer Rants Refused --- Admirals Germans Sink War

UNCONDITIONALLY. WEIMAR, June 23. The National Assembly this afternoon voted to sign the peace terms unconditionally, the Government having succeeded in overcoming the opposition of those who insisted on two conditions.

"SHORT AND SWEET." PARIS, June 23. The German note accepting the allied peace conditions without reservation made only one typewritten page. Paul Dutasta, the Secretary General of the Peace Conference, had the note translated as soon as he received it and sent copies of the translation to Premier Clemenceau, Premier Lloyd George and President Wilson. The completion of the American peace conditions problem. The American proposal has been delayed by the repatriations that the new states formed from Austria-Hungary bear something toward the cost of the army of liberation has not yet met with favor. The French delegation is working upon a new plan.

SOME SIGNATURE. LONDON, June 23. Haniel Von Haimhausen will sign the peace treaty for the Germans, it appeared likely to-day from all information at the headquarters of the American delegation.

NO TROUBLE ANTICIPATED. WINNIPEG, June 23. Troops have been taken off Main Street, south of the subway of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and conditions appear normal. It is understood that search in the North End for arms have not developed any sensational finds. At the present time there is absolutely no sign of impending trouble. If it is coming the military are "on their toes."

A DYING GASP. WEIMAR, June 23. In announcing the decision of the German Government to sign the peace terms before the National Assembly to-day, Premier Bauer said: "At this hour of life and death, under the menace of invasion, for the last time I raise in free Germany a protest against this treaty of violence, destruction and self-determination, yet in this enslavement of the German people, this new menace to the peace of the world under the mask of a treaty of peace. No signing can entice and this protest which we raise and swear to. This treaty does not lose its annihilating character by alterations in detail. Protesting against it is useless, and it is at the risk of a new crisis within 48 hours. Our power of resistance is broken, and there are no means of averting the treaty."

German National Assembly Votes For Peace.

Premier Bauer Rants---Forty-eight Hours Extension Refused --- Admiral Von Reuter Gives Reasons--- Germans Sink Warships in Home waters.

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The treaty itself, however, does give a handle which we cannot allow to be wrested from us, namely, the Entente's solemn promise of June 16th. The treaty can be revised from time to time and adapted to the new conditions. That is one of the few words in the treaty breathing a new spirit of peace." Premier Bauer concluded by expressing his faith in the German people and their final realization of a better future.

MORE WARSHIPS SUNK.
WEIMAR, June 23. The German warships which were not surrendered to the Allies, and which have been anchored off Kiel, Wilhelmshaven and other points have been sunk by the German sailors manning them, according to a report received here from reliable sources. According to the report there were twelve German war vessels besides destroyers which were in German waters not having been turned over to the Entente under the armistice provision.

A FIAT REFUSAL.
PARIS, June 23. Germany to-day was refused an additional forty-eight hours within which to sign the Peace Treaty. The Council of Three flatly refused the request. The request for additional time was pleaded on the change in the Govt., and the generally disturbed conditions which made it difficult to keep arrangements.

THE TURKS AGAIN.
PARIS, June 23. The situation in Asia Minor is serious, according to official advices received by Reuter's Limited here to-day. These advices stated that the Turkish forces outnumbered the Greeks four to one, and threaten to drive the Greeks entirely out of Asia Minor. The Greek forces are reported to be retreating before the Turks who are supplied with good artillery and plenty of ammunition.

TELL IT TO THE MARINES.
LONDON, June 23. Although reports have stated that six Germans were killed and ten wounded when the boats of the German fleet in Scapa Flow were fired upon subsequent to the scuttling of the German fleet, the Daily Mail says others may have drowned, and that some may possibly have reached the Orkney Islands and have not as yet been reported. The main force of the British Fleet was absent, exercising at sea, when the German ships were sunk, some drifters, small warships and patrolling aircraft being on guard over the interned enemy squadron. Admiral Von Reuter, commander of the surrendered German fleet, says he issued the order to sink the ships, the Daily Mail adds, and did so because at the beginning of the war the German Emperor directed that no German warships should

fall into the enemy's hands. He said that he believed from newspaper reports that the armistice had been ended. The Mail quotes the Admiralty as denying that the German crews were periodically changed, and saying that the original crews remained on board the vessels. There were about 150 to 200 men on the big ships, and from ten to twenty on the destroyers. Therefore there were nearly 5,000 in the water or in the ships' boats when the fleet was sunk. Fourteen hundred were landed by the British on Sunday at Nige, Rosshire, on the northern shore at Cromarty Firth. They were placed in huts, and are being held under military guard.

NEW ITALIAN DELEGATION.
ROME, June 23. The Italian delegation to the Peace Conference hereafter will be composed of former Foreign Minister Titoni, Senator Marconi and Senator Scialoja.

A LITTLE COMEDY.
WASHINGTON, June 23. War with Germany and Austria would be declared at an end by an amendment to the Army Appropriation Bill introduced late to-day by Senator Hall, Republican, of New Mexico, with a view to removing from Congress any blame for continuing war conditions pending ratification of the Peace Treaty.

A FEW MORE CALLS ON GERMANY.
BERLIN, June 23. It is officially announced that General Nudert, Marshal Foch's representative on the Allied Armistice Commission, has presented the German Armistice Commission with a request of the Allied and Associated Powers that Germany take immediate steps to stop the German advance in Easthonia. The immediate evacuation of Windau and Libau is requested and the hastening of the evacuation of territory formerly belonging to Russia is asked for.

POLES AND UKRAINIANS SIGN ARMISTICE.
PARIS, June 23. An armistice has been concluded between the Poles and Ukrainians so that neither will cross the River Dniester.

MILITARY DICTATORSHIP CONTEMPLATED.
PARIS, June 23. The movement for a military dictatorship in Germany is gaining ground, according to advices received by the American military authorities, quoting the Kreuz Zeitung of Berlin. Die Freiheit, the independent Socialist paper, declares that the counter-revolutionary element is preparing to strike a blow against the government.

FRANCE'S VIEWS.
PARIS, June 23. The Paris newspapers in commenting upon the decision of the German National Assembly to sign the Treaty, lays stress on the efforts of Germany to escape her responsibilities and see in them proof that the German mental attitude has not changed. The Germans, it is declared, generally will observe the clause of the Treaty only with a knife at their throats and point to the deliberate destruction of the German ships at Scapa Flow as a symbol and a warning.

WILL HOLD OFFICE A LITTLE LONGER.
LONDON, June 23. General Roberts, Food Controller, has decided to retain control of food during the coming winter.

MYSTERIOUS EXPLOSION.
LONDON, June 23. Early this morning a violent explosion occurred close to a spot where one of the German warships was sunk yesterday, says a Kirkwall despatch to the Central News. A huge column of water and much debris were thrown up. A single German warship which remained anchored yesterday

What about his war retainer of £1 or \$4.80 per month while on Active Service. I suppose one could call that an allowance. But apart from all that I know we sailors are entitled to this \$70.00 per month for six months, which is not to be sneezed at, as "One of Them" said in his letter of June 18th, but I think it is just as well for us poor Sailors to start sneezing right away: we can't be worse than ignored. ST. PAUL, Minn., June 23. Reports from Fergus Falls, Minn., early to-day estimated the number of persons killed by a tornado which swept over the town last night, all the way from two hundred to four hundred and the injured at seven hundred.

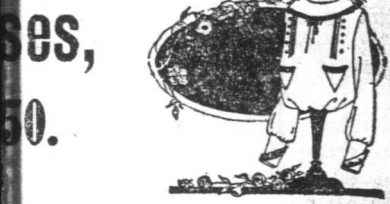

True the food was more stringy and fatty than would have been chosen, but see how light the biscuits were. To be sure, I only received five cherries for dessert but think what generous things one got of the vegetables, etc.

Society Butterfly Gone.

Lady Beatty, British Admiral's Wife, Tells of War's Changes.

Lady Beatty, our famous admiral's wife, when someone placed her among those ladies who, before the war, devoted their time to the gay social round denied that she was a society woman, says the Gentlewoman of London.

And, indeed, she is not. An American by birth, brought up in that hive of industry, Chicago, indefinitely impressed with the stamp of the strong, capable woman of affairs, she has little sympathy with the whirl of dinners and dances which comprised life for many English women of the upper classes before August, 1914.

Talking to me on this subject recently she said: "It was such an utterly different world from the world of to-day. No wonder that many society butterflies almost felt the solid ground knocked from under their feet when the call to arms sounded through the country that summer four and a half years ago. They were like children who had always been kept in a nursery, protected and guarded from any contact with the world. Perhaps they looked out of their high windows and saw other children, less fortunate, playing in the street or working for a livelihood. But they were as so many dreams to the sheltered ones—or like scenes at a theatre, witnessed, but not in any sense lived in. Vaguely they knew of a working, struggling world outside their own, but the thought hardly interested them, and did not really penetrate.

"And then—the war! It was as if the nursery flew open with a chill wind, and blew forth the little inmates into the unfriendly streets. For the first time they brushed shoulders with life as it is lived by millions, and touched the cold hand of reality.

"In some ways it was a terrifying position for these favorites of society. But I shall always be proud of my sex when I remember the way in which they responded to the need of the moment. To-day I suppose there is not a society butterfly of the ugly sort left throughout the length and breadth of England, for one can never apply that name again to a woman who has worked for four years, with heart and soul, nursing the wounded, making munitions in the big factories or driving a car here, there and everywhere on war's business."

PUNIC FAITH.

On November 21st, 1918, ten days after the signing of the armistice between the Allies and Germany, the battle fleet of the latter was formally surrendered to Admiral Sir David Beatty, in the waters of the Firth of Forth, Scotland, the German ships steaming under Allied escort to their appointed anchorage.

"The German flag is to be hauled down at 5.57 to-day (sundown) and is not to be hoisted again without permission."

Thus, was practically finished as a fighting machine the High Seas Fleet of the German Empire. Subsequently all the surrendered ships were escorted to Scapa Flow, the great British Naval base in the bleak Orkney Islands, and there interned, with German watch crews on board, and British seaplanes, aeroplanes and destroyers doing guard duty in air and on sea, where silent and sullen, they have lain over six months.

No thought of a breach of faith occurred to the naval commanders of Britain. The enemy crews were on parole of honor, and not a suggestion of mischief on the part of the watch crews occurred to the British or in fact to any of the Allies. Honorable themselves they accepted the word of the German as equally honorable and binding, and had no idea that the Hun would prove faithless.

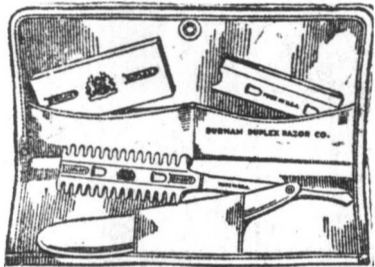

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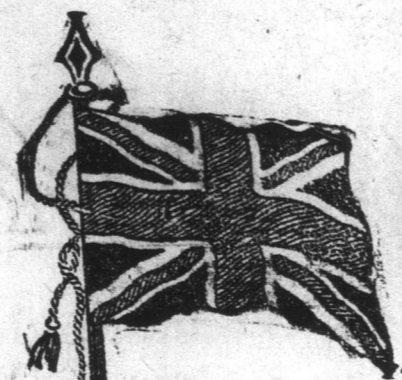

Bolshevism—a Disease.

(By SERGT. GUY EMPHEY.)

The following extracts from "Treat 'em Rough," published in New York, by Sergt. Guy Empey, makes interesting reading, as showing an ex-service man's opinion and advice on the problem of Bolshevism in the States.

From New York's east side came the leaders of the unspeakable Bolshevik reign of terror in Russia. Like a malignant cancer it has ravaged and emaciated one of the greatest powers. The Reds count Russia as their first victim. Next in order they plan to conquer Germany, then the United States. Those breeders of anarchy who did not go to Europe are here now among us, engaged actively in seditious agitation.

Are we to allow this horde of blood-mad maniacs, who respect neither God nor human life nor the honor of women, to reproduce in America the unutterable atrocities which to-day make Russia worse than a living hell?

Boys, we have just finished a big job, but a greater one looms up. An enemy has developed in our midst. It is Bolshevism. The Russians define it as "the rule of the proletariat." We Americans have the right name for it—Anarchy.

It cannot be fought with the bayonet alone, because the bayonet is a man's weapon. Bolshevism is a disease, a poison, insidious propaganda. To fight it successfully your rear must be protected, because Bolshevism uses the dagger of the assassin, stabbing in the back. We cannot "fall in," in company formation and advance upon this enemy with bayonets fixed. If we could it would be a comparatively easy and simple matter. It must be a fight of the individual. There can be no generals or captains in this campaign. Every one must be a private. You must fight it with your own mind; the "buck" cannot be passed to the other fellow. If you leave it to him to do the work it means that you have become a Bolshevist. Live up to the ideals of Americanism and Bolshevism will be defeated. If a person, in your presence, should insult the American flag, what would you do? No doubt for the benefit of the community, you would help dig his grave.

Bolshevism is trying to substitute the red flag for the American flag. It is our duty to keep our colors clean. Think of the thousands of our bunks who died in France for that flag. Is it not due them that the Bolshevist parasites be shaken from the folds of the Star-Spangled Banner?

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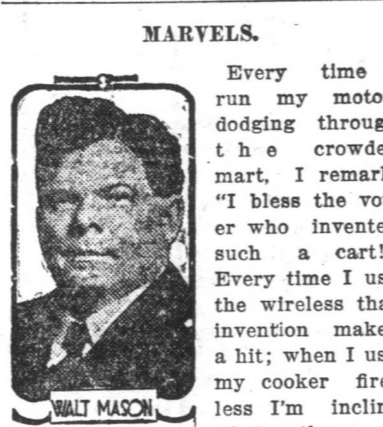

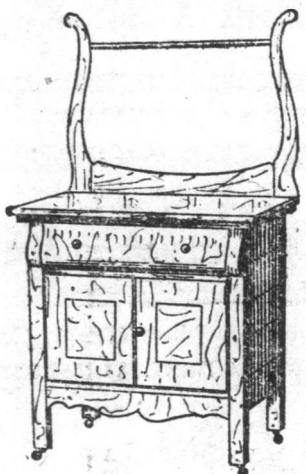

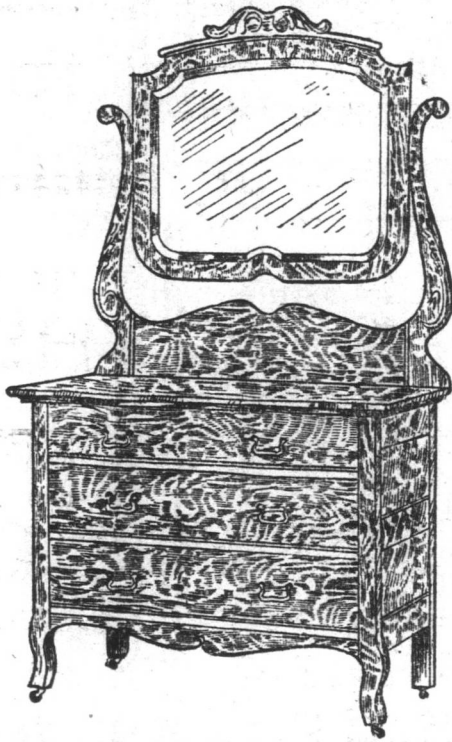

Moonshiners Fined.

A couple of weeks ago, following a report that the illicit distilling of liquor was being conducted wholesale in certain outposts to the northward, Inspector General Hutchings despatched two constables to make enquiries, and in a short time they unearthed no less than ten stills which were turning out a brand of moonshine that carried a kick in it sufficient to upset the most accomplished booze artist in the business. The plants, though very modest in design and of recent construction, were capable of putting a fairly large quantity of booze on the market, in fact sufficient to supply the wants of the settlements in which they were located if run at full capacity. The conduct of this business is neither in keeping with the spirit nor letter of the Prohibition Act, however, and the constables had the moonshiners appear before a local magistrate who imposed a fine of \$100 each on the offenders and ordered the stills destroyed.

Wonderful Skill of Bygone Ages.

A search which the Society of Antiquaries of Scotland have been conducting for some time on Traprain Aie, an isolated hill, which forms a part of Arthur J. Balfour's Whittingham estate, resulted in one of the most remarkable archaeological discoveries ever made in Britain. The excavators came upon a pit two feet deep and

two feet wide, filled to the brim with fragments of metal vessels. An examination has shown that these relics, although in a broken condition, form a rich collection of fourth century silver plate. Two tiny coins give the date. One was struck by Valens, who was Emperor of the East from 364 to 378, and the other by one of his successors, probably Gratian or Honorius. The vessels found have decorations of striking beauty. On the surface of one embossed cup is a representation of the fall of man, the figures of Adam and Eve being shown by a fruit-laden tree with a huge serpent twined around the trunk. The same cup bears a representation of the magi, and on another is depicted the miraculous draught of fishes.

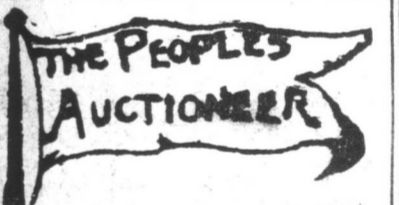
