THE BRITISH WAR MEDAL.

A beginning, I understand, has now been made with the distribution of the British War Medal, but it will, of course, be a long time before all who are entitled to it can be supplied. It was decided about a month ago that a sufficient supply was now in hand to justify a start being made with their disposal. In the case of officers the medals will be sent from the War Office, and those for ex-soldiers will be dealt with by the record offices. The system followed in regard to the distribution of the ribbon, under which application could be made by special postcards obtainable at post offices, is not being adopted in the meantime, and no action on the part of the individual entitled to the award is required. As the batches of medals are prepared they are being forwarded to the appropriate record offices, and will be sent by registered post to the addresses of which they have a record. Where addresses are discovered to be out of date something like the postcard system may have to be adopted in order to get rid of accumulated

PRESS AID IN CRIME DETECTION.

The prompt way in which the police authorities have called in the press to seashore at Eastbourne may be hoped to have a fully satisfactory result. Such an appeal for assistance is very far from a novelty, though for a long period the custom, luckily for the perpetrators of crime, died into disuse. It was first made by Sir John Fielding, the great "blind magistrate of Bow trious Henry Fielding, of "Tom Jones" fame; and in the very earliest years of George III. an appeal was issued from Bow Street Police Court to the leading London daily journal of the time to give a full account of "wanted" criminals and hidden crimes, because it was felt that no other course would so well serve the cause of justice. One other feature of the Eastbourne case which has aroused general commendation has been the immediate application of the local police to Scotland Yard (London's headquarters of the detective force of the country) for expert detective assistance. This is a course which ought to be taken as a matter of rule, but the more backward police organisations in various parts of the country either do not adopt it at all, or invoke the aid of Scotland Yard when it is too late to be of use.

LONDON CLUBS RETURNING HOME

A number of workmen are to be seen in and out of the palatial premises of hall Place, overlooking the Embank ment Gardens, which, having been cleared of the War Office staff temporarily located there, is now being made ready to receive its members once again after their four years' stay in what used to be the Westminster Palace Hotel in Victoria Street. During the autumn of 1916 the Government seized the Hotel Metropole, the Hotel Victoria, the Grand Hotel, the National Liberal Club, and the Constitutional Club, all within gunshot of the War Office, as well as the Adelphi, the Salisbury, and De Keyser's Hotels within half a mile. All those who hall clubs of flats in the War Secretary's ambit then began to grow afraid. 





WILLING TO COMPROMISE.

LONDON, Oct. 7. Leaders of Sinn Fein have intimated that although they desire complete seperation from England, they would not oppose a broad measure of Dominion Home Rule, if it can be proved the majority of the people desire it, says the Daily Mail. This intimation is given to the Irish Peace Council body of moderates from all parts of Ireland, which has just completed a plan for Dominion Home Rule, says the newspaper. The Council claims to have obtained sufficient support to make the scheme workable, and the Mail asserts will send a deputation to Lloyd George to consider initial steps of the scheme.

WEAK BUT UNCHANGED.

LONDON, Oct. 7. MacSweeney, on the fifty sixth day of his hunger strike, was very weak, but otherwise unchanged, acc a bulletin of the Irish Self Determination League.
