

# A GIGANTIC CONSPIRACY.

LONDON, June 20. (Canadian Associated Press) The magnitude of the struggle which leaders of the miners are seeking to bring about now may be judged by the computation that the membership of the Unions which they hope to immediately involve in a general workers. The organizations threat-ened with wage reductions are rail-way workers with 750,000 members; transport workers, 500,000; engineers, 100,000; farm hands, 1,000,000; printers, 150,000; cotton workers, 500,000; wool workers, 250,000, and gas work ers, 90,000. Instructions are being sent to these Unions to attend a meet-ting at London next week to consider the general strike proposition of the miners. All public comment declares that the miners' move is absurd and oredoomed to failure. The first effort of the miners in this direction was likely, because owing to widespread anemployment and other causes, the finances of all Unions are about exhausted. 

### Jutland Debt of Honor.

In the early hours of the morning of June 1 five years ago the British Fleet abandoned its pursuit of the besten Germans after the Battle of Jutland and steered for home, leaving three of our battle-cruisers at the bottom of the North Sea. It has since been disclosed by Mr. Filson Young, in his recently published book "With the Battle-Cruisers," that the defects which caused the loss of these three splandid ships with some 3,000 British officers and men had been revealed at the Battle of the Dogger Bank in January 1915, and had been reported to the Admiralty. But nothing was done to remedy them. To the immertal dead of Jutland the living owe a great debt; and with the living it should be a point of honour to ascertain where the responsibility lies for the loss of these ships by a thorough and careful inquiry.—Daily Mail.






