Dried Fish Trade

ses How To Improve Quality Of Fish.

A meeting of the advisory committee of the Atlantic Experimental Station for Fisheries was held Thursday in the rooms of the Board of Trade, Halifax, to consider matters in connection with the dried fish trade, particularly how to improve quality and to ensure better prices. Outside points, such as Lunenburg and Digby were well represented. The meeting was unanimous as to the desirability and even necessity of getting action toward improvement in the quality of fish, and it was proposed that demonstrations of the best methods of preparing the fish should be given in the chief centres. The Station was asked to prepare in consultation with the trade a pamphlet defining the different qualities of dried fish, which might serve as a basis for a standard grading of the product, and so give confidence to the buyers, with higher prices as a result.-May 2, 1925.
