The "Virginus" Homicides.

Intense excitement is caused in the United States by the news from Cuba given in the telegrams we publish elsewhere. For a long time the Cuban insurgents have maintained a desperate and sanguinary struggle against the Spanish in the island of Cuba; but, like the Carlist insurrection in Spain, neither side seemed to gain any decided advantage, and the interminable warfare went wearily on. Owing to Cuba's insular position, the rebels could not of course have carried on operations very long without outside assistance; and this assistance came chiefly from the United States, where a strong sympathy prevails in many quarters for the "Cuban patriots," as the U. S. Press like to call them. The U. S. Government have not yet recognised the insurgents as belligerents, although a strong and constant pressure has been brought to bear upon them to do this. The Spaniards had a blockading fleet cruising off the coast of Cuba, to intercept the filibustering vessels which brought supplies and arms to the rebels. One of the most successful of these vessels was the "Virginus." A telegram recently announced that she had been captured by the Spanish gunboat "Tornado;" but people here had long since used up all their interest in Cuban matters, so that the announcement attracted little attention. A new and sanguinary interest has, however, been given to the incident by the news that the captain, crew, and half the passengers have been hastily shot in cold blood by the Spanish authorities at Santiago de Cuba. This brutal massacre has aroused hot indignation in the States, and it is not improbable that the whole affair may lead to serious international complications. It is claimed that the vessel has an American register; but there seems to be considerable doubt as to whether she is entitled in any way to the protection of the American flag. It is said also that she was captured in British waters near Jamaica; if this is the case another element of complication will be added. The United States naval authorities are getting war vessels ready for any emergency that may arise; and so the affair stands at present. It will, of course, be a powerful lever in the hands of those who are pressing for the granting of belligerent rights to the rebels. The Cuban campaign has been carried on with ruthless ferocity on each side, and it is to be feared that the public and international character of this last barbarism is the only thing which makes it worse than many which have gone before it.

The Tory Press and the Scandal.
The Press supporting Sir John A. Macdonald did a dis-service to the Conservative Party when it consented to uphold the Pacific Scandal. The spectacle was sufficiently surprising to attract also the attention and censure of the *Pall Mall Gazette*. One of that class of journals actually sunk to the plea that everybody knew money was used to promote the spread of the gospel, and what harm therefore to spend money in bribing the electors? Had Sir John A. Macdonald had reason to suppose the Conservative Press would refuse to canonize crime and defile wrong, the Pacific and many another scandal would never have been dared by him. The example set by the Conservative Press is one we hope and believe will never be imitated by the Liberal journals of the Dominion. The bulk of the people of Canada of either party are comparatively uninterested in the petty question as to who shall distribute the legitimate patronage of the Crown, so long as it is done honestly. Their anxiety ought to be for the good government of the country. They want honest election laws; they want to put honest men in office; they want to keep them honest by surrounding them with a healthy public opinion. We hold that the best guarantee that the Reform Party will not, like the late Conservative Party, in the course of time fall to pieces of corruption, will be found in the fact, which ought to be well understood, that if the Reform leaders in power do not do right, they will not receive the support of the Reform Press. We are not prepared to admit that Canada has sunk so low in demoralization that it cannot be governed except by fraud, intrigue and subterfuge.—London Advertiser.

ANGUS MORRISON denies that he has received an official appointment, and asserts that he still represents Niagara.

Sir John A. Macdonald has been nominated for West Toronto, in place of Mr. Crawford. At a meeting on Wednesday night, Hon. J. B. Robinson, M.P., in the chair, Mr. George Munroe nominated Right Hon. Sir John Macdonald, K.C.B., as the candidate of the Party. Speeches were subsequently delivered by Mr. J. S. Beaty, M.P., Mr. A. W. Lauder, M.P.P., Mr. Canavan, Mr. E. King Dodds, Mr. Lewis Moffatt, Mr. Bickford, and Mr. G. D'Arcy Bolton.

At about two o'clock on Wednesday afternoon the ceremony of swearing into office Lieut.-Governor Crawford took place, at the Government House, in the presence of the members of the Local Administration, the various Consuls in the city, a large number of Senators, members of Parliament and prominent citizens. The oath was administered by Chief Justice Draper. There were about 30 persons present by invitation. The ceremony being concluded, His Honor entertained the party at a banquet.

The Toronto Water Commissioners and the *Globe* has got to loggerheads. The *Globe* thought that the proceedings of the water Commissioners wanted ventilation, and sent a reporter to one of their meetings. The commissioners denied the right of the reporter to be present; and after some talk about sending for policeman, the meeting dissolved without doing any business—leaving the reporter alone and noteless—the "man in possession. A telegram yesterday to the *Hamilton Times* says—"The *Globe* is determined to test in law, if necessary, the right of the Water Commissioners to prevent reporters from reporting their proceedings. The course of events in this matter causes much comment. It is reported that, when the reporter left, the Commissioners last night decided that the Clerk should prepare a report of the proceedings of every meeting, for the press, subject to revision by the Chairman.

An action has been taken out in the Superior Court against one of the wealthiest citizens in Montreal, by his wife, for separation from his bed and board, on the ground of neglect and ill treatment. Some startling disclosures may be looked for.

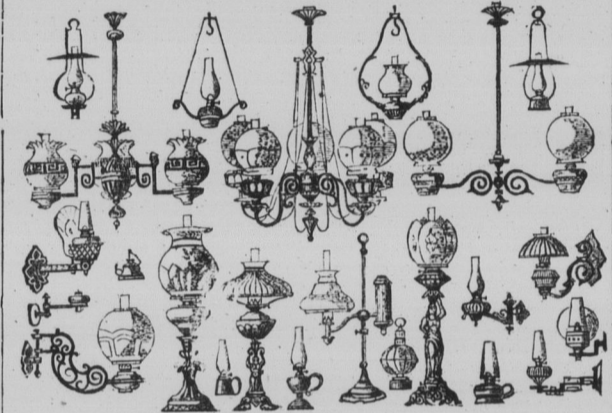
