ONE ALL IN THE BIG INTERNATIONAL GAME

The Teams Played Evenly and Scotch and English Score One Goal Each in the Struggle.

The international football match at Newstead park last evening between English and Scotch players resulted in a draw, each team scoring once. In years past the Scotchmen have always been easy winners.

A draw fittingly represented the merits of the two teams. Indeed on the run of play neither team deserved to win, and it would have been rather hard lines, on the losers. While the boys from the Hebrides, better known to the Englishmen as Oxley and Howard, getting through a lot of work at the back, the Scotchmen did the best seen on the grounds for a long while.

The close score made things very lively, for the large crowd of English and Scotch followers. Naturally these supporters claimed their team was the best, but a draw was a fitting result to a hard game.

A Scotchman is always a good football player, and hence the Scots were expected to win. Even in the Old Country, where the English and Scotch teams have the best record over England. Out of twenty-eight international games played between the "Thistle" and the "Tiger," Scotland has won the majority.

Had the English team as good a forward line as the other side it would have been easier. In the Scotch line the English team played up to international standard. Allan and Wakely of the Hillhurst club on the right wing did all the work. Williams, in the center, was fair, but the left wing in Toole and Boothman was very weak. Toole is usually a good player, but he was decidedly off last evening.

The Scotch team opened the scoring ten minutes from the start through good work by Thompson and McKenny. It took the Englishmen until eight minutes from the finish to even up matters, and when Toole slammed the ball past Strang, the goal, the Scotch rejoicing and waving of hands from the excited English supporters.

There were one or two chances in the lines from then came out at a few days ago. When Referee Dease called the players together, the teams were as follows:

England—Goal, Dickinson (City); backs, Howard (City), Oxley (City); halves, Jenkin (Hillhurst), Wakely (Hillhurst), Ward (City); forwards, Allan (Hillhurst), Wakely (Hillhurst), Strang (Callies), Petrie (Callies); forwards, McKenny (Hillhurst), Johnson (Callies), Thompson (Callies), McKenny (Callies), and A. Stewart (Hillhurst).

The Scotch team were the first to find their stride and immediately made tracks for the goal. The Englishmen were soon at work and cleared his goal from danger. The first shot Dickinson saved from Thompson. Gradually the Englishmen made the right wing strong save from Allan and later from Wakely. Ross for the Callies, and Oxley, for the City, worked well, but later he got an extra busy time of it. The first goal came in this half and was scored by McKenny after good work by the Scotch forwards. After a few minutes the Scotch, in their chances, and it was an even break. When the City got away it was in rushes, but the Scotch forwards had a little more combination in their play. No more scoring was done and half time arrived with the score, Scotland, 1; England, 0.

During the first five minutes of the second half the Scotchmen again attacked strong, Oxley, Ward and Wakely having their harem for the Callies. Gradually the English got going again. Their halves made good opening for their forwards, but they came to nothing. Boothman made the most of a goal run, but failed to middle the ball. Allen on the right wing, however, made good use of a pass by Jenkin and went down, finishing up with a lovely center across the goal mouth, but nobody was there to take it. McKenny got within range and shot wide. Oxley tried a long shot, but it was easily cleared. Wakely and Allen together went down, but Ross cut across and kicked away. Strang and Petrie had lots to do watching Allen and Wakely, but they came through with flying colors. The Scotch half line was strong, and they played the game, both in attack and defence. After a while the Scotch goal the ball went behind, much to their supporters' disappointment. The City were now playing a better game, and with only about ten minutes to play they were urged on by the crowd. Allen went down and muddled nicely, but Ross cleared. Oxley returned, and the ball was again in front of the Scotch goal. It came to Oxley, who kicked in Toole. That player was standing amongst a bunch, but he acted in a flash and the ball went into the net. From then on the close there was a warm battle, and it was one of the best eight minutes of football played for a long time. Try as they would, neither team could obtain the lead, and the final whistle sounded the scores one all.

For the Englishmen Oxley was a hard worker. He was always in the thick of it, and his great defensive work time after time, saved his side. Howard muddled several times. He is fast, and this saved him. Of the halves, A. Wakely was their best. Jenkin had a fast wing to look after and he held his own. Ward also played a good game. Of the forwards, Allan and Wakely were the pick, as before mentioned.

The shining lights for the Scotchmen were Ross, Cooper, Strang, Petrie, while the forwards were an evenly balanced bunch.

Bill Strang, in goal, saved several shots, and was not to be blamed for the shot that beat him.

Secretary Dease of the Central Alberta Football League, made a satisfactory referee, although he let one or two things get away from him.

THE CITY AND THE UNIVERSITY

The city of Calgary will be asked for \$100,000 or thereabouts as a grant towards the Calgary university. This is a proposal that will be carried by the city council, without a dissenting voice, and practically without a dissenting voice. The establishment of a university in Calgary will be of great importance to Calgary. It will create a better atmosphere for the city and district. It will give the city a wider outlook, and create within it a new era of development. It will be of great value to the city.

The idea of a Calgary university was conceived only a few days ago, but it is spreading very rapidly. Application has already been made for a provincial statute and that will be given during the coming session of the legislature. The reason for delay is not a lack of energy, but a desire to have the city establish a university bonus by law at the next session of the legislature.

BRITAIN IS NOT DECADENT

The words of Lord Kitchener on returning to England should serve as a warning for an alarmed nation, which is becoming surfeited with politics and pessimism. He scorned the idea that Britain was decadent, and stated with a fine pride that England was young, brave and strong, and he is correct. The trouble with England is that its people go too much given to talking war and peace, and discussing the words of the political leaders who do not appear to stand their country in order to make a point against the enemy.

Britain is not decadent. It is still the greatest nation the world ever saw. It is the most progressive empire upon which the sun ever shines. It is at the beginning of its long journey and not at the end. It is progressing all the time. The pessimism which is caused by a surfeit of parliament is a matter of very great regret and does not become the nation.

A THOUGHT ON LIBERTY

Gen. Louis Botha, one of the bravest and noblest of the world's warriors, who has spent his life for his country, has said in the House of Commons that Great Britain stands against the Transvaal and the Orange Free State, has developed into a very able and enlightened nation. Up to date the Alberta government has not been very active in accepting any advice heading towards the cancellation of the contract with one, Clarke, a celebrated railway builder.

The mysterious flight through the back window with the files was not any more sudden or dramatic than the flight of Faulkner from Winnipeg with the certain information wanted at the investigation.

Up to date the action of the Alberta government in declining to accept the advice to cancel the contract with the Clarke people, had had no very perceptible effect upon the editorial adherents who gave it.

How can a representative face the electors and declare that it is right that a government should give a company \$20,000 a mile for building a road which could be constructed for \$3,000 a mile less at the very least.

Now when there is less excitement about it all, will any person tell why Clarke is stopping away from the investigation, why Faulkner took to flight in Winnipeg, and why many declines to answer important questions?

Perhaps the most surprising feature of the entire railway transaction is that men and newspapers can be found to defend the government for giving what amounts to \$20,000 a year for what the government could have got for \$3,000 a year. That is amazing.

The British paper that criticized the assurance of "Canadians evidently met some Toronto persons who would not hesitate to give King Edward some advice as to the proper way to wear his crown, supplementing the "well-meant tip that that is the way they do it in Toronto."

Now that the Star has said it, the pessimistic, blue Englishman should take a bump that it is bad form to be so downcast about it all and there is no truth in the story, and he should chipper up and be a bit merry for his nation is the greatest on earth and is just beginning to come.

And now Mr. A. Mysterious Parker of Calgary, without ever knocking, walks right into the midst of all this mystic railway business and while things are already weird and unknown sits down in the gloaming. No person seems to know from whence he came or why, or what he wants to do.

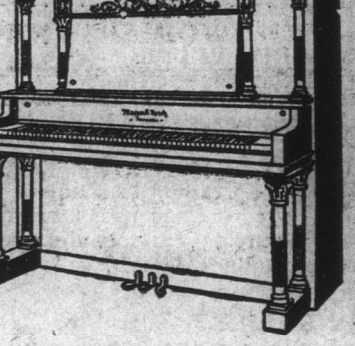

BRITAIN'S ESTIMATE OF FINANCE MINISTER
The Business Man of the Party Says a Prominent British Member

THE GREATEST STROKE IN IMPERIAL STATESMANSHIP
Was Policy of Preference of Which He Was Responsible

London, April 29.—An appreciative article on the Hon. W. S. Fielding by "M" appears in the National Review. It says Sir Wilfrid Laurier is the grand signeur of Canadian politics. Mr. Fielding is essentially the business man of the party. The article deals mainly with the financial career of the "minister of surpluses," and gives him credit for taking the first practical step in the policy of preference, which was one of the greatest strokes of imperial statesmanship the world has yet seen. "M" concludes by stating that there is ample ground for confidence in the reflection that Mr. Fielding is not to be bullied by Germany or the United States or any other country. He has not hitherto forgotten that while furthering Canada's interest he also is a statesman of the whole British empire.

NO GREAT NEED OF RAIN IN DIDSBURY DISTRICT
Seeding is Nearly Completed and Conditions are Favorable.

"The Didsbury district is not suffering in the slightest from lack of moisture," said John A. Finlay, who was in the city yesterday from that town. "Seeding is nearly completed and the early sown fields are looking quite green. There will be July 20 per cent. more land under crop this year than there was last year, and the prospects for a good crop of spring sown grain were never brighter. Fall wheat is looking very good and is expected to give a fair average crop. There has not been any of it, so far, receded, and there is not likely to be."

Of course a good warm rain would do good, but this fine weather has enabled the farmers to get their spring crop in on a good seed bed, and they have no fear of a scarcity of moisture in due time. After the rainy season sets in, the farmers will be prepared to commence breaking new land and working their summer fallows. Everybody is looking forward to a very prosperous year. NOWEGIAN WOMEN VOTE
Seventy Per Cent Exercised Franchise at Last General Election

Copenhagen, April 27.—Some interesting facts about women's suffrage in Norway have been prepared by J. Castberg, ex-Minister of Justice in the Norwegian Liberal Cabinet. Mr. Castberg says in Norway women got the municipal franchise in 1901, and men has universal suffrage; but the female suffrage was at present confined to those who themselves or through their husbands, paid taxes on a yearly income of at least \$100. This limitation excluded about 200,000 adult women out of 5,000,000. With the female franchise was combined eligibility for Parliament. The first time that women exercised the franchise was at the general election last autumn. Seventy per cent of the enfranchised women voted. Women were divided on the same political line as men. Of course there were exceptions, but as a rule, the influence of the family on the result of the election had been done. These women stood for Parliament, but they were all defeated by their political opponents. Only one woman got elected as a member's deputy—that is, she would take the place of a member who died or was absent through illness or any other cause. On the whole, it might be said that the result of the first exercise of the parliamentary franchise by women in Norway was to awaken the public spirit of women.



SPIDERS USED FOR COMMERCIAL PURPOSES
Los Angeles, April 28.—Few persons look upon the common garden spider as a skilled worker in occupations other than the trapping of flies, but a Los Angeles optical company is utilizing a force of the insects in the manufacture of certain delicate instruments used by surveyors, architects and astronomers. The spiders are kept constantly engaged in making webs which are transferred to small parts of the instruments called "cross-wires" which are necessary in ascertaining exact distance without actual measurement. The spiders, while held by the hind legs by their keeper, weave webs across a diagonal frame. These webs are then removed from the frame by

The car was very nearly loaded, and contained all the household furniture, farm implements and machinery, eleven head of horses and one cow. Mr. Landies' loss is approximately \$7,000.

The men who were assisting him were working late when the train reached here about midnight and the loading was not quite completed; but only a few chickens remained to be placed. Those loading the car necessarily were using lanterns. One was holding a lantern while another was nailing a board in place, when the train, backing in on the sidetrack, bumped against the car, jolting the men in the car so that the one who held the lantern lost his hold on it.

ORNAMENTAL LIGHTS FOR CITY STREETS

The Citizens Uniting With the City in Getting More Artistic Method of Illumination.

According to information that has been furnished Ald. George E. Wood, an important step has already been taken toward providing the city with ornamental street lights. The agent of the company that manufactures the Corinthian iron posts that have been approved by the commissioners has informed him that he already has so many orders from merchants for the posts that he has sent for a carload. Mr. C. D. Taprell, owner of the Alberta hotel, told Ald. Wood that he will get eight of the posts. Mr. W. R. Hull, owner of the Hull block and the Grain Exchange building, told him he would get seven, and Mr. P. Burns, who is to erect a new block on the corner of Eighth avenue and Second street east, told him that he would get about the same number. In fact, Ald. Wood has not spoken to a single business man who has not spoken to him warmly on the subject.

It is thought that when other merchants find how greatly the ornamental lights improve the attractiveness of establishments they are placed in front of, they will not be long in following the example of those who take the step first. Mayor Jamieson will suggest to Supt. Price of the C. P. R. that the railroad install the same form of illumination in front of its station. With the lights at night and the fountain by day, and the new addition besides, the depot would present a splendid appearance.

The city has offered to furnish the electric current needed free to the merchants, the latter to bear the cost of installation. In some cities the merchants are also compelled to pay a portion of the cost of the electric energy. The city has already taken steps to order 80 of the most improved style of arc lights, known as magnetic lights, but most of them will not be needed, at least in the business section, if the ornamental lights are installed.

To get the wires into the ornamental standards it will be necessary to provide wire ducts along the streets or under the sidewalks, and this will be some expense. It is an expense, however, that the city will have to bear.

Senator Will Lose His Seat

Ottawa, April 25.—Because of non-attendance of the senate for two years, Senator Sullivan (Conservative, Kingston) probably will lose his seat. Last session he was ill and unable to attend, but so far this session has not been present.

Guests of Queen of Netherlands

The Hague, April 25.—Theodore Roosevelt was the guest of the Netherlands today. Accompanied by Mrs. Roosevelt, daughter and son, Mr. Roosevelt was escorted from the frontier station at Rosendale to Het Loo, where at the royal chateau they were greeted by Queen Wilhelmina.

THE CANADIAN TRADE IN SOUTH AFRICA

Severe Criticism of Lax Methods of Lumber and Carriage Exporters.

Mr. H. R. Pousette, the Canadian Trade Commissioner at Durban, South Africa, writes to the Department at Ottawa as follows: On a recent trip to the Transvaal, constant complaints were heard directed against the methods of Canadian exporters and the quality of the goods shipped. Some of the timber merchants were most indignant at the treatment meted out to them, and stated there is the greatest difficulty in obtaining timber up to specification. In conversations with some of the leading merchants of South Africa are to be taken as a criterion, it has to be regretfully concluded that the reputation of Canadian lumber exporters here is anything but savory. Dealing with Sweden, on the other hand, appeared to be much more satisfactory, and there seemed to be little trouble in procuring the material as ordered. Although they refrained from so expressing it, it simply meant that the practices of the Swedes were considered more honest than those of the Canadians. Certainly no one will contend that to send out lumber below the specification charged for, and with an inspector's note attached, is right.

Inquiring for Reliable Exporters.
One large firm stated that they had recently imported a shipment of lumber from an Ontario firm. As it was intended for a large government building, in which only good material was being used, they specified the best, and paid from \$72.50 to \$80 per 1,000 feet. However, when forwarded to

the building contractors, much of it was rejected as being scaly. To verify his statements, the partner who was discussing the subject showed me the correspondence. He said that if he could be recommended to a reliable exporter he would place a trial order at once, and if this arrived satisfactorily, would follow with large ones. He also mentioned that they paid cash in New York, and neither asked nor wanted credit. It can be accepted as a fact that there is plenty of cash business awaiting reliable Canadian lumber exporters here—in reality, it is looking for them.

A Repeat Order Cancelled.
Another firm, when interviewed, made the statement that they were highly pleased with a shipment of planis recently received from another Ontario shipper, and intended calling over to repeat the order. A few days later, however, in answer to a request from this office for permission to hand the name of this shipper to the importers mentioned above, they replied by sending the cable, much of it, was discovered to be poor "shaky clear" instead of "carpenter's clear," a fact sadly patent to a novice. It is needless to say no repeat order was despatched.

Recently two small trial shipments of carriages have been received by Durban firms from an Ontario factory. An absurdly long time elapsed before these were despatched, it is true, but their arrival has given immense satisfaction. If this company will only improve their business methods a lucrative trade awaits them.

Trial Shipment of Carriages.
Some time ago a trial order for a light travelling wagon or democrat, with a canopy-top, for an up-country Government department was put through this office and sent to a Canadian firm. The utmost expedition was shown in despatching this, and the manufacturers showed in their correspondence a most commendable desire to please. The vehicle arrived last month, and was inspected by me in the Transvaal. The wheels, under wagon and box were apparently excellent, but the cushions created a most unfavorable impression, and to a certain extent, marred the effect of the other parts. They were covered with imitation leather, stuffed with wood shavings, and fitted with the cheapest springs, despite the stipulation that there was to be nothing flimsy about the construction.

It can only be concluded that this was the result of carelessness on the part of one of the factory foremen. The cushions on the seat may not seem of much importance to some, but no detail should be too trifling to justify inattention. In a case such as this, it is apt to direct suspicion to other parts, and, in any case, make purchasers less inclined to repeat orders for fear of similar occurrence. Every vehicle before shipment to this country should be most carefully examined to see that the parts are complete and fit-together properly, and care should be taken to ensure that the varnish is perfectly dry.

Lamentable Effects of Unbusinesslike Methods.
On November 11 another up-country Government trial order for two light travelling wagons was sent to two different firms in the Dominion. One replied at once to say that in spite of its

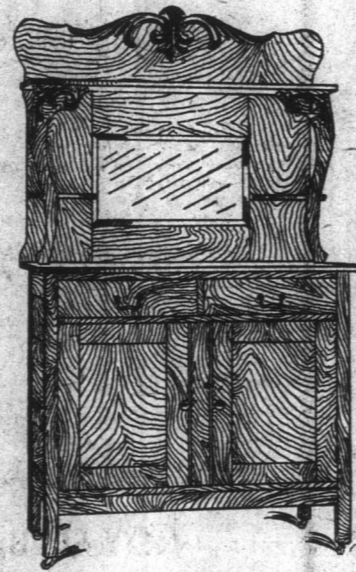
being a special design, every endeavor would be made to ship it in 30 days. On February 11 a letter was received from the other to say that the price quoted for their vehicle only applied to orders of six or more, and it would be impossible to accept the business, although no such stipulation was ever mentioned in their letter when submitting special designs and quoting for same. There was nothing to do, but to write to the official who had placed the order, apologizing for the childish methods of this manufacturer, and asking permission to transfer it to another firm. However, this has not been given, and it is not likely to be. Furthermore, not only was this official who has power to place substantial orders, disgusted, but he has evidently communicated the facts to a large importing house with whom arrangements have recently been concluded to take up an agency for Canadian carriages. His attitude can be readily understood, as such an incident is enough to put off any business man.

Alacrity of an Exemplary Firm.
As a pleasant contrast comes an encouraging letter from a Canadian firm in the Dominion. As a result of a reply to a circular letter from this office in the latter part of last year an agency was arranged for a certain firm last December. A trial order was forwarded for about half a carload of goods, with some suggestions accompanying it. The reply this morning stated that the goods would be expeditiously shipped—indeed, they are now more than half way across—and that the suggestions were being closely followed. Three price lists were included in the letter, one just out of date showing the price in decimal currency; one, the new prices in the same

currency, and another quoting price in sterling, and bearing on the one and on each double page in the middle the name of the local firm handling these goods. If there were only a few firms like this in Canada, Canadian export trade would double itself in ten years.

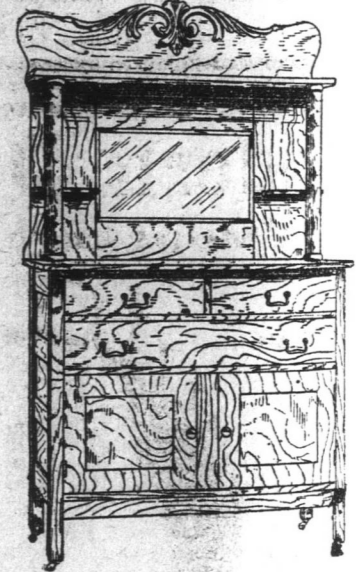

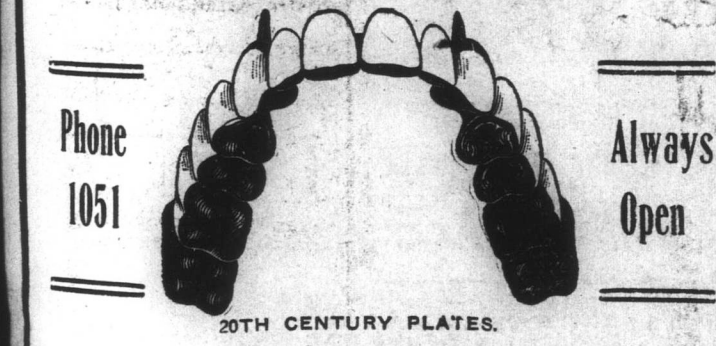

LAST ACT WRITTEN IN TEXAS ROMANCE

Sale of Obit's Ranch Marks End of Beresford's Strange Career in S. W.

El Paso, Texas, April 28.—The sale of the Obit's ranch in Mexico for \$190,000 wound up the affairs of the estate of the late Lord Delaval Beresford, who chose to spend his life on a cattle range of 110,000 acres in Mexico, his companion, a negro woman, rather than in England. Delaval Beresford left England when a young man, twenty years or more ago, because he did not like the restraint of his life. He had no other choice. He wandered until he found a location that suited him. It was leagues from the railroad, in the mountain fastness of the then almost unexplored stretches of northern Chihuahua, in Mexico. Why he went there and why he selected that location for his home he told nobody. He had money to buy the land, which was worth less than 50 cents an acre, and he had the money to buy the cattle with which to stock it. He was rough and ready, as the cowboy boys say. He was an Englishman, but he did not have the English ways. He was ready to ride with the hardest vaquero, and at night would sleep with nothing but a blanket for a bed and only his saddlebag for a pillow. That he was a lord, a member of the British aristocracy, nobody knew for years, but he was admired as an Englishman with nerve and grit.

"Bought" for El Paso. Whether his relatives knew where he was nobody knew. He never seemed to get any mail and he never wrote any but business letters. He made friends of his Mexican vaqueros and their families, and he became known in El Paso, for he made visits every once in a while to the city, and it did not take long for the people to become aware when he was there. On these visits he treated everybody he met, neither race nor color being barred. But always he kept out of the spotlight. He did not spend his money in the big gambling houses or in the brilliantly lighted saloons, as other common do when they hit town with purses newly filled with the proceeds of sales. Always the small saloons, dives, were patronized. Delaval Beresford did not seek the best of society. After one of these visits it was rumored that on his return to Obit's ranch he was accompanied by a negro, a well-known to the people of the city most frequented by the Englishman on his visits. Then somebody explained that she had been taken down as his cook, that he had met the Mexican fare he had been getting.

The next time he came to town the negro was with him and the pair went to one of the leading hotels and applied for a room for "Mr. and Mrs. Beresford," but all rooms were engaged. Quarters were found elsewhere, and that night the usual Beresford spree was on and the negro was a partner in it all. During the revelry the negroes, known to her associates as "Flo," announced that she was "Lady Flo," and that she was the wife of Lord Delaval Beresford, brother of the English Admiral Charles Beresford. "We've swine back to old England and I've sworn to see de Queen," she has ten—see me, "cause I've de wife of a lord," she would tell her friends.

Then it got to be a common talk: everybody soon spoke of the couple as "Lord and Lady Flo." The Englishman continued to raise cattle and ship them to Canada and sell them for a good price, and accompanied by his black companion he went to the ranch to El Paso. He never denied the statements of the negro that she was his wife and she made purchases at the stores and charged them to Lord Beresford, who always settled the bills promptly. No more letters passed between the Englishman and his family back in England than before the disclosure of his identity, however, and "Lady Flo" never made her trip to see the Queen.

In 1907, early in the spring, Lord Delaval Beresford took a trainload of cattle to Canada to be shipped to Hat, Canada, and when the list of dead was printed there appeared the name "Delaval Beresford, Mexico." "Lady Flo" was in El Paso when the wires brought the news and at once went into mourning and proceeded to make preparations to take charge of the estate.

Inside of ten days a lawyer came from New York. The cables had been working and the lawyer had learned that Beresford had acted. The body had been ordered shipped home and the lawyer was directed to take charge of the estate in the name of the surviving relatives. A will was produced by the El Paso attorney who had done the legal business for the family, and it left the entire estate to "my legal heirs," with the exception of \$5,000, which I hereby devise and bequeath to my faithful housekeeper, Flora.

The will was offered for probate in El Paso county, also in the courts of the State of Chihuahua, Mexico, but there was a protest filed by counsel engaged by "Lady Flo." Statements were given to the newspapers that while she had never been married to Beresford she could prove that she was his common law wife. Had it everybody recognized her as the wife of the dead man and hadn't he promised that just as soon as he returned from Canada they would be married by a priest in Mexico? But the admission that there had been no marriage settled the case.

"Flo" Balked by Laws. In Texas she was at once ruled out of court because the law prohibits the marriage of a white person to one of African blood, although among people of the same race common law marriage law is not recognized, although there is no law against miscegenation. Thus the very law that would help in one country was against her in the other, and the probating of the will went forward.

Lord Charles Beresford then came over from London, made a trip to the ranch, visited Mexico City, consulted his lawyers in both countries and listened to all the stories about the past life of his brother. Then he sent a lawyer to see "Lady Flo," who in the meantime had appealed from the courts ruling in El Paso and was preparing to take the case to the supreme court, she declared, if necessary to get her rights. The next day all the legal steps taken by the negroes were stopped and Lord Beresford went back to England and the estate was offered for sale. It was estimated that the negro received \$15,000, but it never was made a matter of record. The negro is now living in El Paso in a comfortable brick house on South Campbell street, and she owns several similar buildings. On a big stone in

DOES KING EDWARD FEAR THE DOOM OF MONARCHY

Correspondent Says Prince of Wales Does Not Possess Diplomacy that May Hold the Throne Secure.

New York, April 4.—The Times today publishes a London cable under a flare head, "Edward Fears for the Throne," and says: "Strange and almost incredible as the statement may seem, I am able to declare that the king is haunted by the fear that he may be the last king of England to sit securely upon the throne."

In the course of time when the present Prince of Wales succeeds him, there are in the opinion of his father, likely to be events and complications that may undermine the British monarchy.

archy.

King Edward has a proper sense of his own tact and ability to preserve with dignity the attitude of a constitutional sovereign, and, also it is well-known among his immediate entourage that his political sympathies are with the Radicals, he has never departed by a hair's breadth from the strict impartiality by which, as a constitutional monarch, set above parties, he has been guided to all his public acts.

"This correct attitude will in a measure safeguard the crown in the event of its being dragged into the prospective fight between the English political parties. Although each side is even now seeking to create the impression that the King will stand with it in the future battle, neither can point to any public act of the King to justify such an assertion. Nor can either point to what might be termed an indiscretion on the part of King Edward."

"In the case of the Prince of Wales, the boot is very much on the other leg. He is strongly Tory, and makes no concealment of the fact, notwithstanding his father's frequent objections. There are countless instances

of the prince expressing in mixed

political circles views which could be pleasing only to one section of his hearers.

"London at the present moment is buzzing with a story of an incident which occurred a couple of Saturdays ago, when the prince attended a university football match at the Queen's Club. During an interval in the game he was noticed to be talking somewhat emphatically and excitedly on some subject. What the subject was specially became apparent, for the prince, in the heat of discussion, raised his voice to such a pitch that it was heard by scores of persons in his neighborhood. He was roundly denouncing David Lloyd-George and his gutter budget."

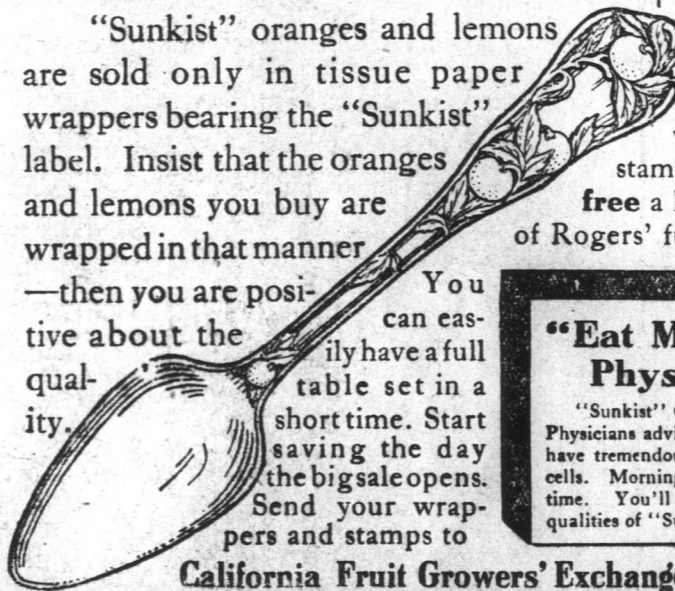

Plans to Keep American Settler Across the Line

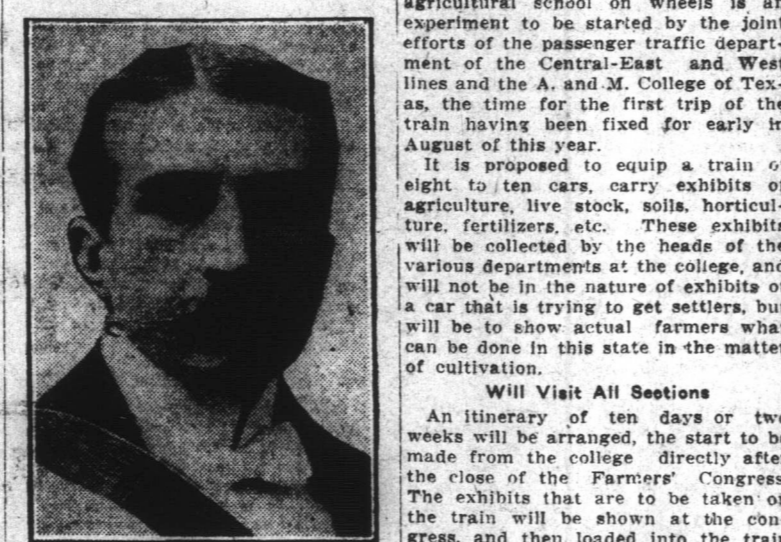
Secretary Wilson of Department of Agriculture Trying to Find Farms for the Wanderers in the Forest Area of the Western States

(By Arthur C. Johnson in Washington Post.) Deeply impressed by the fact that many hundreds of American farmers, imbued with pioneering proclivities, are passing over opportunities for making homes in the West and flocking to the frontier in Western Canada, the secretary of agriculture is preparing to inaugurate a system whereby settlers will be induced to occupy arable tracts within the forest reserves. As a starter on this policy, Secretary Wilson has already dispatched Chief Forester Graves on a tour of the forest reserves in the West with orders to serve notice on all forest supervisors and rangers that hereafter everything possible must be done by them to aid settlers not only to find farms within the forest reserves, but to acquire these tracts and become bona-fide citizens of Western expanses. According to the Secretary's determination, many of the burdens heretofore imposed upon settlers, demonstrating the possibilities of farming tracts they have discovered within the confines of national forests, are to be lifted, and the forestry employees are to be required to exert every effort to people such portions of the reserves as exhibit any signs whatever of being of value for the raising of products. It can be definitely stated that it is the intention of the department of agriculture to carry this policy to the extent of actually removing and disposing of merchantable timber from tracts where the standing growths are not necessary to conserve water supply, and turning said lands over to settlers for occupancy and improvement.

Welcome News for the West The news of this stand by the department will be received throughout the west with acclamation, for one of the chief curses directed against the forest reserve policy heretofore has been in relation to the zealousness of the administrators in maintaining the national forests as sacred expanses, wherein a settler must laboriously prove his right to enter and take up farming land. Although directed from Washington to grant the pioneering farmer the right to enter agricultural tracts within the forests, it is charged that the

accordingly that while the ends for which forest reserves were created shall be conserved, the man who desires to settle within them shall be given every opportunity within reason to take up land and proceed to reap the fruits of his industry. He has ordered that forest rangers shall in the future be directed in every way possible the man who is searching for a home, and if there are suitable home sites in the lands which are now reserved from entry on account of the presence of a small amount of salable timber, the government will dispose of that timber and give up the land, providing its agricultural improvement can be foreseen. The secretary sees many advantages in this system of settler encouragement. Not only will the States gain taxable property, he reasons, but the increase in the number of inhabitants will serve to keep the forest fires in check. It will be possible also to do away with many so-called ranger stations—those extensive open tracts which are now maintained for the support of the forest employees in the national forests is supposed to be the initial effort of the government to remove the excuses which these Americans have made for not making settlement upon lands which are equally productive within their own country. Action may soon follow in the regions where vast strips of land are withdrawn from entry, and awaiting the action of congress in regard to the conservation movements in general. It is realized that through the extensive system of land withdrawals for forest reserves, reclamation projects, and conservation movements in general, the United States has perhaps gone much further than was anticipated in the discouragement of western settlement.

AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE TO TRAVEL THROUGH TEXAS Technical Education Will Be Carried to the Farmers Throughout the State. College Station, Tex., April 29.—An agricultural school on wheels is an experiment to be started by the joint efforts of the passenger traffic department of the Central-East and West lines and the A. and M. College of Texas, the time for the first trip of the train having been fixed for early in August of this year. It is proposed to equip a train of eight to ten cars, carry exhibits of agriculture, live stock, soils, horticulture, fertilizers, etc. These exhibits will be collected by the heads of the various departments at the college, and will not be in the nature of exhibits of a car that is trying to get settlers, but will be to show actual farmers what can be done in this state in the matter of cultivation.

change—for the increase in the number of the settlements will give the farmers places to live. 4,000,000 Acres Soon Available There is at present in hand at the forest service offices a general elimination from the national forests of tracts which do not bear timber growths. Proclamations will be issued before long returning over 4,000,000 acres of land to the public domain, where the right to enter it will be as free and unrestricted as the land laws will permit. Secretary Wilson has intimated recently that other eliminations will be made from time to time until the land which the government has no right to reserve for forests will be removed as thoroughly as possible. If there still remain tracts within the reserve upon which settlers think they can make a living by farming, those individuals will be aided in acquiring them, providing they do not bear trees which are necessary to protect the water sources. The Secretary of agriculture admits, in fact, that he has authority to make settlement in the forest reserves, an undertaking wherein the nature of the land itself will be the restrictive agent rather than the government.

A similar liberal policy will be put in force in regard to the prospecting and the locating of mineral deposits within forest reserves. The fact that more than 37,000 farming individuals went into Canada from the United States inside of eleven months and settled on the agricultural tracts there, undoubtedly has made an impression upon President Taft and his cabinet. The activity of Secretary Wilson in welcoming settlers

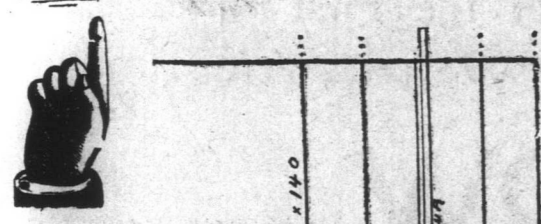
STOESSEL'S WIFE IS FORCED TO PAY FOR PORT ARTHUR Queen of War Times Provision Shop Required to Settle Old Bill. St. Petersburg, April 29.—Ruth Stoessel, has just been ordered by Stoenow Civil court to hand over rubles, or about \$82, to Mrs. Stoenow, a Russian officer. She began in 1906. It proved to be the prowess of Gen. Stoessel's wife, the queen of the Port Arthur provision shop during the Japanese siege of that city. Mrs. Stoessel had already repaid the attacks of beleaguered citizens complained to the government officials she had worked a corner in getting her husband, as commander of the fortress, to fix the selling price of flour in Port Arthur. Mrs. Stoessel informed the court that at the outbreak of the war she owned a cow and two calves. When the siege began she left Port Arthur and handed over her dairy business to her husband, who died soon after. Mrs. Stoessel thereupon appropriated the cow. The plaintiff estimated that Mrs. Stoessel sold a thousand rubles worth of milk before settling the animal for rubles. Mrs. Stoessel admitted selling the cow, but declared she had given the milk to the wounded. Moreover, she said, she was injured when she found it. The court decided that she must refund the price of the cow, 12 rubles, but Mrs. Stoessel had to pay the price of the suit. She did not receive payment for her milk claim.

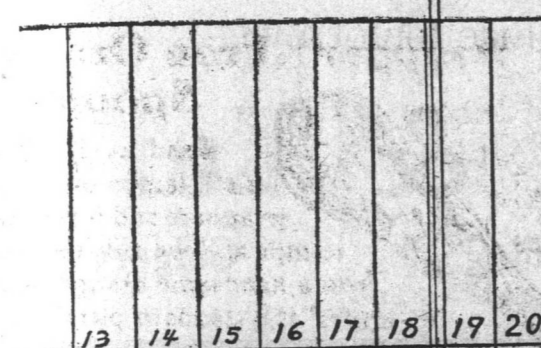

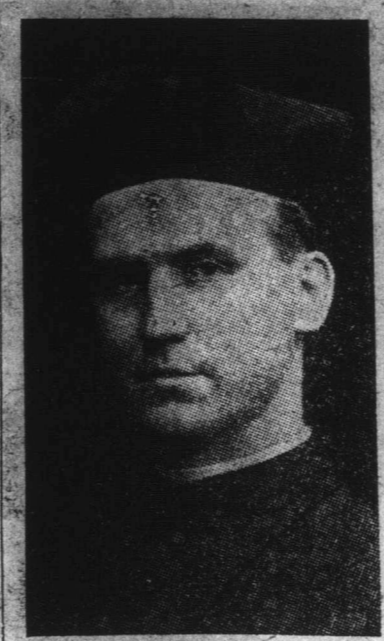
ARMY IN INDIA IS HOAXED BY GIRLS

Lieut. Governor's Daughter Sends Telegram That Might Have Caused War.

Calcutta, April 27.—The British military authorities have been the victims of a practical joke perpetrated recently which threatened serious consequences. The story goes that about a month ago the daughter of a well-known lieutenant-governor, accompanied by two girl friends, was on a visit to friends on the northwest frontier, and one day went to All Masjid, a fort near the tensest excitement. The father of the "From" there the three ladies sent a telegram to General Adenhouse as if it were from a responsible officer, declaring they had gone out into the tribal country and had not returned. Great anxiety had been felt, and he concluded by declaring that he found it very difficult to restrain the garrison from turning out en masse to rescue the girls from their peril.

The news, of course, was soon on at once from the general's headquarters to Calcutta, where it created the intensest excitement. The father of the enterprising damsel and the commander-in-chief spent several hours in deliberations and in hastening from Fort William to the government house and from government house back to Fort William.

As the girls did not return, a force would have to be sent out after them, and if a force were sent into the tribal country, war, it was feared, might ensue. It might set half a dozen suspicious tribes in arms, and an engagement might lead to a "big" campaign which in turn might cause a rupture with a now well-armed Afghanistan. The anxiety, therefore, was intense. The "From" it is said that it was not until 12 hours after the "fatal" message had reached Calcutta that it was discovered that the military organization of an empire had been hoaxed.

Flour is Now Made FROM ALFALFA GRASS

What Used to be Considered Food for Animals is Devoted to Man's Use.

Omaha, April 28.—Man apparently is turning to a grass diet, not only finding it palatable, but fat producing as well, taking the place of meat and wheat flour bread. The new food is alfalfa and Omaha is the first city in the country to put the provender upon the market.

Until recently alfalfa was considered a food for animals. For years it has been fed to cattle and horses and used as pasture for hogs. Now, however, it is serving another purpose, and the dry leaves are being ground into meal and flour, mixed with wheat flour and sold on the market as composition out of which bread and pastry is being made.

In other words, the time has arrived when if a man has a large field or a little patch of alfalfa in his back yard he can shoulder his scythe, go out, cut down his grass, cure it in the sun, haul it away to the mill, and if he desires there exchange it for flour made of alfalfa hay, bring it home and turn it over to his wife or the servant who in turn will convert this alfalfa hay meal or flour into bread, biscuits, pancakes or pastry.

At the present time more than half of the families of Omaha are eating hay. This hay eating is not confined to the poor, but extends to those who are in comfortable circumstances. The wealthy as well as the poor, the laboring man as well as the idlers are going on to a hay diet, and they all say they like it.

PROFESSOR SAYS WOMAN'S BEAUTY IS DECREASING

German Professor Says Outdoor Sports and Fashion are Responsible.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., April 25.—The decreasing feminine beauty forms the absorbing topic discussed by Professor Reinhardt Thilo in the North German Gazette, the Government newspaper organ. Writing most learnedly on his interesting subject, the professor says woman's beauty is fading faster in the United States than in Germany, but the same causes are at work in both countries. The first of these, says Professor Thilo, is excessive indulgence in outdoor sports. He thinks it well that the size of women's hands and feet is increased by outdoor sports, for their worship of small hands and feet is pure fetishism. But he says almost resolutely that too much exercise spoils the feminine curves and produces lumpy, muscular excrescences where nature intended smooth roundness.

The second cause ruining woman's beauty is her craze for a slender figure. The so-called robe "colonne" (the dress glued on), says Thilo, simply flattens the natural lines and injures health. The craze for slenderness is working harm, particularly in the United States and Sweden.

Thirdly, according to the professor, the change in the feminine mind, in woman's way of thinking, is affecting her outward appearance. For example, instead of desiring sincere love, American women encourage flirtation. That motherliness, which appears in the best medieval statuary and paintings, even of maidens, is disappearing from the features of American women.

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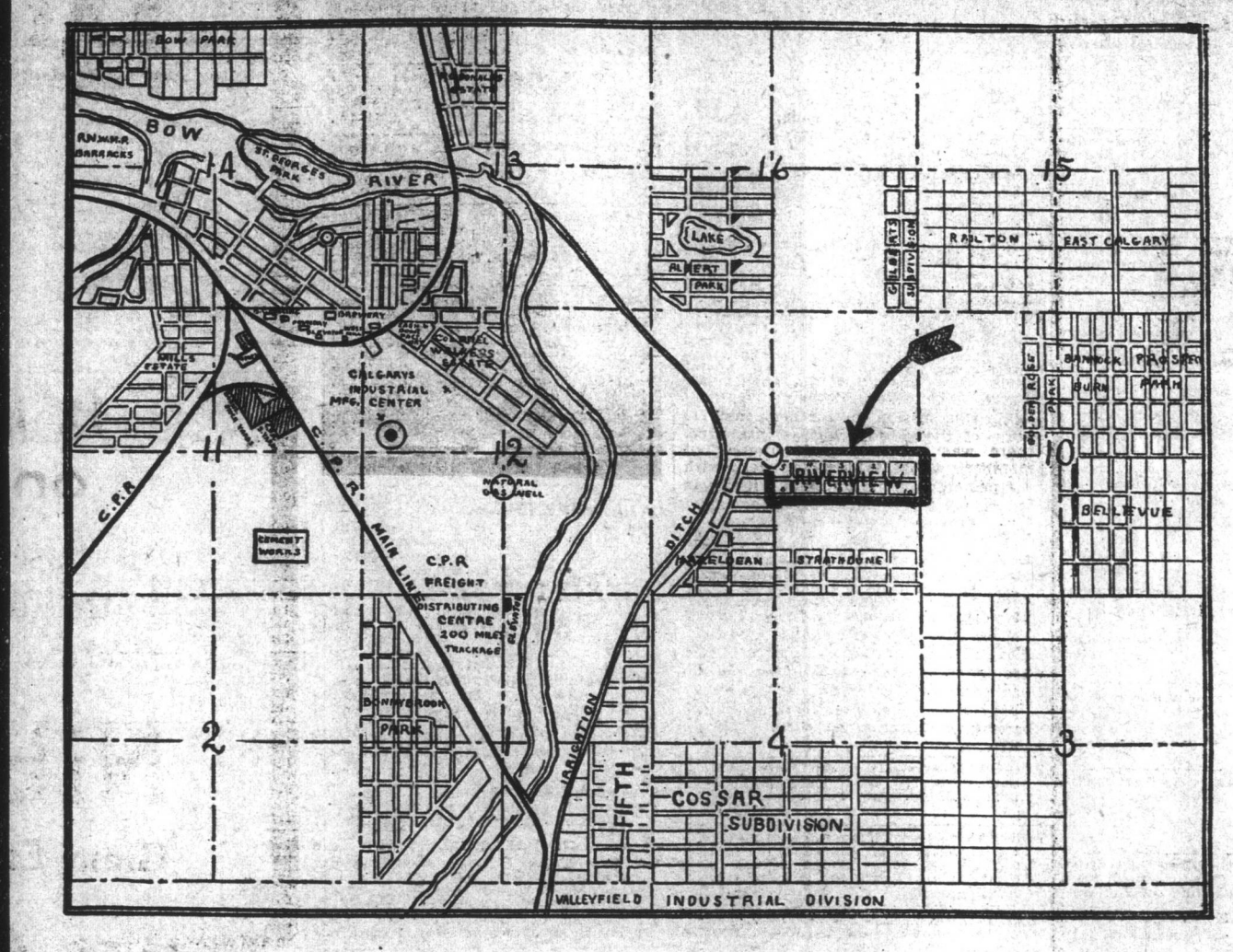
