THE SEPTIC TANK SYSTEM.

The septic tank system of sewerage, which it is proposed to introduce in the unsewered districts of the city, is not an experiment as many persons suppose.

The debentures proposed to be issued by authority of the by-law are payable in 50 years, and require, for interest and sinking fund, a levy of one-third of one mill on the rateable property of the city.

Under the circumstances, if the people of Victoria were asked to pay ten times or a hundred times the amount called for by the by-law they would assume a grave responsibility in the sight of Heaven if they refused to respond.

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Sewer By-Law Is Endorsed

Representative Meeting of Ratepayers in Victoria West Last Evening.

System is Explained by Ald. Brydon and City Engineer Topp.

A representative meeting of the citizens of Victoria West had last evening in Semple Hall to consider the by-law to borrow \$100,000 to sewer that part of the city not reached by the general system, which is to be submitted to the ratepayers of the city tomorrow.

Mr. Beaumont Boggs was voted to the chair, and there were present Ald. Brydon and City Engineer Topp.

The meeting was called upon by the city engineer, who explained the system and the need for it. He stated that the system would be a perfect sewerage system and would cost \$100,000.

The system had also been tried in England and was found to be successful. In places where the overflow ran into rivers it was necessary to filter the water, but here where the outlets would be into the sea there would be no such necessity.

City Engineer Topp, in answer to a question, said that he was fully satisfied with the engineering of the system. It was an English idea, and had worked well in the Old Country.

On motion of Mr. Redding seconded by Mr. Carver, the meeting resolved to endorse the by-law.

Another meeting will be held in the Oddfellows hall on Wednesday evening. The meeting will be an explanation of the latest scientific system of disposing of sewage.
