The news from Ireland this morning is

not of a startling nature. There has been no important arrests made as yet, or at least the police have not made them public if there was. The imperial parliament will eassemble to day after the funeral of Lord Cavindish, which will be largely attended by commoners and the nobility. It understood Mr. Gladstone's new rish bill is ready for immediate presentation to the house, and it is said to resemble Parnell's bill in many respects. Mr. Davitt makes a scathing reply to an article in the London Standard.

LONDON, May 10. At a meeting of Parnellites to day the pinion was expressed that if Gladstone's bill confined to its nominal objects of the mprovement of the administration of justice and the suppression of secret societies t would meet very general acceptance. Heybourne, the American Irishman sus pected of complicity in the assassination.

THE NEW IRISH BILL.

This consolidation was consummated some time ago under the auspides of the Western Union company, which by the privileges now granted to its annex, the Great Northwestern Telegraph company has secured several substantial and important advantages. The results of the legislation give to the combined companies a virtual monopoly, not only of the business of the older provinces but the possibilities of a large extension incident to the rapid progress of the country, especially in the new Northwestern territories.


