But this is more than doubtful, Even with a flue ordinary fires are found to smoke sometimes; and there is no protection by the opening he recommends against the power of lateral drafts to impregnate the air with that deleterious and insidious gas carbonic acid. In the open room we can not have the quasi vacuum principle in operation. Pneumatists will understand how this force arises, through the momentum of the ascending heated stream in a close channel. It is for the sake of increasclose channel. It is for the sake of increasing this draft that factory chimneys are built so high. A familiar example of that hap-hazard plan is furnished by the peat fire in the old Irish cabins, where the roof opening was quite large, but did not prevent the diffused smoke annoying the eyes and lungs. In the case of gas or petroleum stoves the vapors would be making the danger more formidable. Let us have chimneys to our gas stoves. PRACTICE.
