A Barrister Accused of Killing his Wife.

From the London Daily News. Mr. Hugh Shortland of Modbury, who returned to England a short time since from New Zealand, where he had practiced as a barrister, was apprehended yesterday at Modbury, charged on suspicion with having murdered his wife, Mrs. Shortland, who was somewhat eccentric in manner, and has recently taken a prominent part in promoting railway communication through South Hams district, was married on the 8th of last month to Miss Laura Dimes, daughter of a gentleman living at Oldstone manor, near Dartmouth. The marriage took place at the registrar's office, Kingsbridge, the young lady riding in from Oldstone on horseback, accompanied by a groom also mounted, in order to go through the ceremony.

Two days later Mr. Shortland bade his wife and her parents good-bye, saying he was going to New Zealand, and would return soon. On the 28th ultimo Mrs. Shortland, who was still residing with her parents at Oldstone, went out for a walk, but did not return that night. No alarm was felt, however, as Mr. Shortland was known to have remained in the neighborhood some days after he left the manor, and it was thought possible that Mrs. Shortland had met her husband and that they had gone away together; but next day she was found drowned in a pond in the manor grounds. Her body was perfectly upright, her hands were held up in front of her, and on her temple and face, were some slight bruises and scratches, but nothing to indicate that there had been a struggle. It seems to have been taken for granted that she was accidentally drowned, and so, post-mortem examination was ordered, and at the inquest an open verdict was returned. On the same morning a letter addressed to the deceased lady, purporting to come from her husband at Bristol, was received at Oldstone manor. In this letter he said, "I am hurrying on at the fastest rate, and shall soon be home again." The envelope bore only the Plymouth postmark, but this was explained by Mr. Shortland, who said he was enclosing the letter with some other documents to his solicitors at Plymouth, and had asked these gentlemen to post it on to Oldstone.

It now transpires that that was simply a ruse; that Mr. Shortland has not been out of England at all, but has all the time been within a few miles of his wife's home, and his apprehension yesterday, together with a man named Ryder, who is supposed of being associated with him in the crime, has caused excitement throughout the whole district, where he is well known.

At Kingsbridge last night Mr. Shortland was charged with the wilful murder of his wife, Laura Dimes. The superintendent of police was called, and said that when the inquest was held two letters were produced, one in the prisoner's handwriting, stating that he was then at Bristol on his way to Australia, and that his wife might next expect to hear from him from Sydney, where his father, Dr. Shortland, is in practice. The officer stated that he went that morning to the cottage of a laborer in Modbury named Ryder, and there found Shortland. The officer states that at the inquest it was proved that the deceased was found dead in an ornamental pond attached to her father's garden.

Miss Dimes was 22 years of age, and the two were introduced to one another in Modbury by a peddler, to whom they were mutually known. The extraordinary character of the case has occasioned great excitement.
