



Woods, Mentreal; P. P. Phelan, Toronto.

The Toronto Lacrosse club was repre-sented by J. S. Garvin, R. B. Hamilton and w. H. Hubbell; the Ontario by Peter Small, E. H. Gerry and J. B. Bailley; the Montrealers by J. D. Cleghorn, W. H. Whyte and F. C. A. MoIndoe and the Shamrocks by P. Butler, T. Larkin and M. Arthill. Other clubs represented were Brockville, Montreal Juniors, Checkers of Beaverton, Brants of Brantiord, Brants of Paris, Thistles of Fergus, Lornes of Meunt Forest, Ottawas, Dufferlas of Ingersoll, Capitals of Ottawa, Young Canadians of Richmond Hill, Independents of Toronto, Renfrews, Junior Ontarios of Toronto, Renfrews, Junior Ontarios of Toronto, Renfrews, Junior Ontarios of Toronto, Brockvilles, Young Shamrocks, Niagar Peterboros, Comwalls, Junior Cornwalls, Independents of Windsor, Junior Brockvilles, Athletics of St. Catharines, and Excelsiors of Brampton.
