

#### ODDS AND ENDS

BY "ACADIA."

Mr. J. H. Lyons of the "Philatelic Express" wishes it to be distinctly understood that in his capacity as Editor of the above named periodical he is of the opinion that the Philatelic Journal of America is the finest stamp Journal published, and he tells us that this expression of opinion is unsolicited and given gratis. It is unfortunate that Mr. Lyons' knowledge of stamps and stamp papers is not equal to his generosity. If it were we might have an entirely different opinion from him.

M. Giwelb, of London, G. B., in December number of the American Philatelist informs us that the high values official stamps of Great Britain, such as 5s., 10s. and £1, are very extensively forged or counterfeited, and warns collectors to be very cautious in buying such specimens. He even goes so far as to say that he knows the authors of the forgeries. Why then does he not come out manfully and name the parties referred to. He would spoil their disreputable traffic and do Philately a great service by putting collectors on their guard, thus causing them to shun such characters.

We do not question the right of any stamp paper publisher to secure all the patronage that he can get, but the line should be drawn somewhere. The "Philatelic News" published by H. B. Wilber & Co'y., Cambridgeboro P. A prints a whole column advertisement for W. S. Kinzer, of Wooster, Ohio, a party who has been ignomimously expelled from the C. P. A. and branded the wide world over as a mean, sneaking, contemptible, paltry, thieving scoundrel, a fellow who for months carried on a system of petty stealings by substituting worthless stamps for those he coveted. He is still indebted to the C. P. A. a large amount notwithstanding all the sheets he had sent in were confiscated

by the Exchange Department in the hope of making good the losses. Selling such a rascal advertising space is simply affording him the means of defrauding those who do not know his true character and I claim that any publisher who knowingly prints the advertisement of such a fraud becomes a party to his dishonesty.

The contract made by an enterprising firm in New South Wales with the Post Office Department, by which it has acquired the right to use the backs of the postal issues of the Colony for the next four years for advertising puposes is exciting considerable comment.

The general opinion is that the judgment and good taste of the Postmaster General of the Colony is very much at fault. This action has provoked a very indignant protest from Mr. A. G. Taylor, a resident of the Colony, whose letter appears in a late number of the American Philatelist, as a clipping from an Australian paper.

Mr. Taylor is evidently a collector, or at least has rubbed up against collectors at some period, as he refers to the action of the Postmaster General of New South Wales as being rivalled in only one instance, and that by the Postmaster General of New Brunswick, in 1860, the celebrated Charles Connell, who was charged by his colleagues with having unlawfully substituted his own portrait for that of Her Most Gracious Majesty.

In common with many collectors (even including such an authority as Major Evans), Mr. Taylor has fallen into the error of accusing Mr. Connell of this act of disloyalty, when the fact is, and has been proven absolutely, that the stamp with Mr. Connell's head on it preceded that with the Queen's by some months.

Mr. Deats, of Flemington, N. J., C. P. A. No. 39, informs us that he now has over 350 varieties of Canada, Tobacco, Snuff and Cigar stamps. Who can beat this?

#### EXCHANGE DEPARTMENT.

#### POSTAL DOUUMENTS.

COSTA. RICA.

Bernordo Soto, President of the Republic of Costa Rica, by authority of the power granted him by Section 28 of Article 102 of the Constitution,

Decrees:

ARTICLE I. The fiscal taxes for couriers and telegrams will be paid in the future by means of postal-telegraph stamps which will be used indiscriminately for either service.

ARTICLE II. There will be issued new series of postal-telegraph stamps, nine in number, and they will be of the shape, color and denominations given below:

Rectangular in shape, 25 mm. in height and 21 mm. in width, with the inscription

COSTA RICA above and COPREOS Y TELE GRAFOS below; the value will be in confor mity with the following colors:

Olive green \$5	00
Violet 2	00
Blue 1	00
Red	<b>50</b>
Light green	20
Burnt ochre	10
Orange	5
Sea green	2
Sienna	1

ARTICLE III. The use of the new issue of stamps will commence the 20th of the present month, and after that day telegrams and cable-grams will be paid in the offices of the respective districts.

The same day, the 20th, will cease the legal circulation of the postage stamps previously used in the post offices.

ARTICLE IV. The stamps of the present issue now held by the public can be exchanged at the national stamp Office until October 31, next.

ARTICLE V. For all purchases of stamps of the new issue in quantities of not less than \$25 there will be allowed a discount of 6 per cent

ARTICLE VI. Stamps which are used for the payment of the telegraph tax should be presented at the general office in perfect condition, so that the Director, or the employee designated by him, seeing that the tax has been legally paid, may render them useless by cancelling them with his stamp, and he will at once notify the operators that there is no further need of sending in the reports he has daily examined.

#### PARAGUAY.

We announce that on this date the General Management will issue a provisional series of official stamps in place of those in use which are exclusively for prepaying official mail going abroad.

These stamps are:

5 centavos unperforated; the word Official

and indication of value are surcharged on the 15c, rose stamp.

3 centavos unperforated: the word Official and indication of value are surcharged on the 15c, violet stamp,

1 and 2 centavos perforated: the word Official and the value 1 and 2 are surcharged on the 15c. carmine.

#### UNITED STATES OF BRAZIL.

The Provisional Government of the United States of Brazil, taking into consideration the fact that the colors of our old flug commemorate the victories and achievements of our army and navy in the defence of our fatherland, and that these colors, independently of the form of our government, represent the perpetuity of our fatherland among other nations.

Decree, that the flag adopted by the Republic maintains our traditional and national colors, green and yellow, in the following shape: An oblong yellow and green flag, having in the centre a blue sphere crossed by an oblique bar of white running from left to right, with the motto, "Ordem e Progresso," with twenty-one stars emblazoned on the field, among which will appear the constellation of Cruzeiro placed in its astronomical position. The stars represent the twenty States of the Republic and the neutral municipality of Rio Janeiro.

Second.—That the national coat of arms remain the same as the old one, with the exception that a cap of liberty shall be substituted for the imperial crown.

Third.—That the postage stamps and the government seals shall have the sphere around which will be the motto, "Republica dos Estados Unidos do Brazil."

Fourth.—That all the flags, arms, seals and stamps formed to the contrary are illegal.

#### URUGUAY.

Notice: By order of the General Postal Management there will be put in circulation the 14th of the current month a provisional issue of five centavos postage stamps of the same design as those issued December 1, 1886, and having surcharged in black the word "Provisorio,"

#### OUR EXCHANGE DEPARTMENT.

To the Editor of the Dominion Philatelist:

DEAR SIR,-Kindly allow me space to pass a few remarks upon our excellent Exchange Department, as managed so ably by Major Grenny. I am sure that there is not a stamp collector in the Dominion who would remain for another month outside of our Association if he only knew the advantages we possess. I say no philatelist who has the "hobby" at heart can do as well in any Exchange Department in any society as in ours. I count the monetary gain I make by belonging to the C. P. A. by belonging to the C. P. A., by comparing the paltry \$1 we pay twice a year with the amount I have enriched my collection, i.e., nearly \$90 worth. Surely this is plain enough to all the hundreds of collectors scattered over the Dominion, who are sacrificing their duplicates and spending their money in vain hope of bettering themselves. To the very youngest collector, as well as the more advanced collector, the cost of one year's membership can easily be made on one book alone, and I have frequently had two books in a week, as my friend Mr. Grenny is a rusher. Then he is modest as well, and does not want to praise his good work. I have sent the Exchange Department a total of 130 filled sheets, valued at \$415.71. The largest amount we had circulating at one time was 24 sheets, valued at \$101.47. I have sold \$83.54 off my sheets, and taken the value of \$85.02 In this I do not consider 16 off others. sheets, value \$97.41, I have now in circula-The last sheets returned to me contained \$12.98 worth of stamps, priced 30 per cent. below Scott, from which was taken \$8.57 worth. This sheet was through ten active Canadian collectors' hands, but no branches, which speaks well for the splendid sale. My rule is to take off stamps to the value of my credit in the department, as I do not expect or want any eash balance but an exchange medium, whereby I can benefit my private collection.

DEAR SIR,—In my communication concerning the Costa Rica surcharges I find that I made a slight error in stating that there were only three varieties of the OFICIAL surcharge on the stamps of the 1883 issue. The full number of varieties is six as follows:

Official, 15x3 mm., 1, 2, 5, 10, 40 centavos,

" 13x3 mm., 5, "
" 15½x2½ mm., 1, 2, "
" 16x3½ mm., 1, 2, 5, 10 "
" 13x3 mm., 1, 2, 5, 10 "
" 16x2½ mm, 1, 2, 5, 10 "

The 5 and 10 centavos of the 1887 issue are surcharged with this last variety. The above list is taken from the Grosses Hanbuch der Philatelie which is without doubt one of the leading authorities in our science,

AUSTRIA. - The Pneumatic letter card has now the interior gray according to the I. B. J.

BRAZIL.—The 100 reis envelope is reported on white laid paper, size 120x94 mm. and the 100 reis Journal stamp is violet.

CEYLON.—Le T. P. notes the 25c. bistre with figures of value in olive.

COLOMBIA.—The new 5 pesos, small size, has been changed in color to black on white.

COSTA RICA.—The 10 pesos of the current set is black. All values are said to have been surcharged. "Guanacaste."

FINLAND.—The 25 penni blue has been slightly altered "Suomi" is at the top instead of the side where it is replaced by the name of the country in Russian. The two lower circles contain the word "Pen" in Roman and Russian letters and between them is "25."

GERMAN EMPIRE.—Le T. P., says the new card is already surcharged "20 para 20."

GIBRALTAR.—Le T. P., gives a complete list of the new series as follows: 5c. green, 10c. carmine, 25c blue, 40c. orange, 50c. violet, 75c. reseda, 1p. bistre, 5p. gray. Only the 5c. and 10c. have yet appeared. The Registry envelope 20c. without surcharge has been issued, size 135x83 mm. The Ph. Record notes two types of surcharge on the 2d. envelope size G. 150x94 mm. In one of the figures "20" measure 10x3 mm, and in the other 7 1-2x4 mm. We have the former in size F.

GOLD COAST.—We hear of a ½d. card, green, 121x86 mm.

GUATEMALA.—The 1c. and 5c. are surcharged "official."

NEW ZEALAND.—Le C, de T. P., says the 1d. and  $1 \times 1d$ . cards have new frames, but gives no particulars.

NIGARAGUA.—Mr Gremmel has shown us a 10 centa os envelope, surcharged in red over the stamp.

#### 5 CENTAVOS

ST. THOME.—The I. B. J. illustrates the 10 reis green (head) surcharged in black in two lies "5-reis."

WAZIELAND.—The current stamps of the South African Republic are in use here with

surcharge in black "Swazieland." Mr. Rechert has shown us the ½d., 1d., 2., 6d., 1sh. Herr Hempel writes to Der "h., that these stamps were issued on Oct. 18, and that all mail matter from Swazieland has to pass through the South African Republic,

TOLIMA.—Mr. Michelsen writes to Le T. P., that there are several varieties of each value of the 1886 issue. In one of the values in lower corners are in octagons and in the other in ovals. Mons. Moons has the 2 1-2, 50c. 1, 2, 5, 10 pesos with octagon and the 1 peso with ovals. We can add to this list the 5c, with ovals and the 10c. of both types.

TUNIS -M. Diena has the eard 10×10c. with the reply part on the back of the first eard and the second eard entirely blank.

URUGUAY.—The 5c. violet stamp is in use again, but with the surcharge "Provisorio" in black.


