## HERSCHEL'S WEATHER TABLE.

The following Table, constructed upon philosophical considerations of the attraction of the Sun and Moon in their several positions respecting the Earth, and confirmed by experience of many years' actual observation, furnishes the observer, without further trouble, with the knowledge of what kind of weather there is the greatest probability of succeeding, and that so near the truth that in very few instances will it be found to fail :

10 and 12, noon .....	Frequent showers .....	Cold rain, if wind W. ; show, if E.

## ECLIPSES.

During this year there will be two Eclipses of the Sun, and two of the Moon.

I.—February 27th, a partial Eclipse of the Moon takes place, in the evening, on the Southern limb. The Moon will rise partially eclipsed, and will be visible in the Eastern part of the Province, and as far West as Hamilton. At Montreal, the Moon rises 5h. 40m., and the Eclipse ends 6h. 32m., digits 3,160.

II.—March 15th, there will be an Annular Eclipse of the Sun. It will be partial on this Continent, and only visible East of Mississipi. The Sun will rise, partially eclipsed on the Southern limb, about 6h. 10m. The size will be about  $5\frac{1}{2}$  digits, or somewhat less than half the Sun. It ends at Montreal 7h. 45m.

III.—August 24th, in the Morning, there will be a partial Eclipse of the Moon. On the Pacific coast the Moon will set with a small Eclipse upon it. Not visible in Canada.

IV.—September 7th, there will be a total Eclipse of the Sun,—wholly invisible in this country.

Until Feb. 28th, Venus will be morning star—then evening star until the 13th December. Until May 15th, Mars will be morning star—then evening star until next year. Jupiter will be evening star until May 19th—then morning star until Dec. 8th. Saturn will be morning star until January 15th—then evening until July 25th—then morning star rest of the year.

## THE SEASONS.

Vernal Equinox—Spring begins March 20th, 4h. 28m. in the Evening.

Summer Solstice—Summer begins June 21st, 1h. 5m. in the Evening.

Autumnal Equinox—Autumn begins September 23rd, 3h. 17m. in the Morning.

Winter Solstice—Winter begins December 21st, 9h. 4m. in the Evening.

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### STANDING RULES

On the subject of Private and Local Bills, adopted by the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly, 3rd Session, 5th Parliament, 20 Victoria, 1857.

1. That all applications for Private and Local Bills for granting to any individual or individuals any exclusive or peculiar rights or privileges whatsoever, or for doing any matter or thing which in its operation would affect the rights or property of other parties, —or for making any amendment of a like nature to any former Act,—shall require the following notice to be published, viz. :

In Upper Canada—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, and in one newspaper published in the County or Union of Counties affected, or if there be no paper published therein, then in a newspaper in the next nearest County in which a newspaper is published.

In Lower Canada.—A notice inserted in the Official Gazette, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English and one newspaper in the French language, in the District affected, or in both languages, if there be but one paper; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the Official Gazette, and in a paper published in an adjoining District.

Such notices shall be continued in each case for a period of at least two months during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding Session and the presentation of the Petition.

2. That before any Petition praying for leave to bring in a private Bill for the erection of a Toll Bridge is presented to this House, the person or persons purposing to petition for such Bill, shall, upon giving the notice prescribed by the preceding rule, also, at the same time and in the same manner, give a notice in writing, stating the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval between the abutments or piers for the passage of rafts and vessels, and mentioning also whether they purpose to erect a drawbridge or not, and the dimensions of such drawbridge.

3. That the Fee payable on the second reading of any private or local bill shall be paid only in the House in which such bill originates, but the disbursements for printing such bill shall be paid in each House.

4.—That it shall be the duty of parties seeking the interference of the Legislature in any private or local matter, to file with the Clerk of each House the evidence of their having complied with the Rules and Standing Orders thereof; and that in default of such proof being so furnished as aforesaid, it shall be competent to the Clerk to report in regard to such matter "that the Rules and Standing Orders have not been complied with."

REGULATIONS AND RATES.

LETTERS.

*Canada.*—On Letters not exceeding  $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. in weight, transmitted by Post between any two places in Canada, the rate is an uniform charge of *Three Pence* currency : pre-payment being optional.

For every additional weight of  $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., or any fraction excess of less than  $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., then is charged an additional rate of 3d., thus :

Pre-payment of these rates is optional. Letters to be forwarded by British Steamer from Boston must be specially so addressed.

On Letters deposited at an office for delivery in the same place, called Drop or Box Letters, the rate is  $\frac{1}{2}$ d. each.

*Great Britain or Ireland.*—The single Packet rate on Letters between Canada and Great Britain is as follows:—By British (Cunard) Mail Steamer, from New York or Boston, 10d. currency (8d. sterling); by Canadian Mail Steamers from Quebec,  $7\frac{1}{2}$ d. cy. (6d. sterling.) The scale of rating is, for a Letter not exceeding  $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., one rate of Postage, and an additional rate for every  $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.

Letters addressed to Non-Commissioned Officers, Soldiers, or Seamen, serving in Her Majesty's Forces, may be forwarded from Canada, via Quebec and Halifax, or by Canadian Mail Steamer from Quebec, on payment of 1d. at the time of posting, provided that the letter does not exceed  $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. in weight, for, if above that weight, letters so addressed are liable to the ordinary Postage rates.

Letters for the above British Colonies are subject to a rate of 1s. 5d. currency, per half ounce, when sent by British (Cunard) Mail Packet via Boston or New York; and to a rate of 1s. 3d. cy., when sent by Canadian Mail Steamers.

Upon Letters for those places marked thus \* prepayment is compulsory.

*France.*—Letters for France and Algeria, 1s. cy. per  $\frac{1}{4}$  oz., by Cunard Line, and 10d. if by Canadian Mail Steamer. Prepayment optional.

*United States.*—Letters posted at any Office in Canada, addressed to any place in the United States, except California and Oregon, are to be rated at an uniform rate of 6d. per  $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.

The Postage Rate on Letters passing between Canada and California and Oregon, is 9d. per  $\frac{1}{2}$  ounce.

The scale for computing the charge upon Letters weighing over  $\frac{1}{2}$  an ounce is the same as that for Letters passing within the Province.

Prepayment of Letters passing between Canada and any place within the United States, including California and Oregon, is optional, except as regards Letters intended for Registration.

The fee for Registration on Letters between Canada and the United States is 3d., and Letters intended for Registration must have their full Postage to destination prepaid.

Canada Postage Stamps are taken in the United States, and United States Postage Stamps are taken in Canada, as evidence of prepayment.

*Stamps*, of the denomination of  $\frac{1}{2}$ d., 3d., 6d., 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ d. and 10d., for the prepayment of Letters, can be purchased at the different Post Offices.

*Registration.*—Letters containing valuables will not be recorded by the Post Office, unless handed in for Registration, with payment of 1d. as Registration fee.

*Newspapers.*—Newspapers, when posted, must be so put up as to shew clearly that the wrapper covers Newspaper matter only. No marks or signs to serve the purpose of written communication is permitted, either on the paper itself or on the cover, nor any writing other than the address to which it is sent and the name of the sender. If these conditions are not complied with, the Newspaper will be liable to same rate as for a letter.

Transient Newspapers posted in Canada (including all Newspapers *not* sent from the Office of Publication to regular subscribers,) when addressed to any place in Canada, or British North America, the United Kingdom, the United States or elsewhere, must in all cases



be prepaid by  $\frac{1}{2}$ d. postage stamp, otherwise they cannot be forwarded.

No Canadian Postage is levied on Newspapers printed and published within the Province when addressed from the Office of Publication.

Publishers of Newspapers, &c., may forward, enclosed in their Publications, accounts for subscription and receipts for the same, free of charge.

*Periodicals, Magazines and other Printed Matter.*—Periodicals printed in this Province other than Newspapers, when specially devoted to Religious and general Education, to Agriculture, to Temperance, or to any branch of Science, and addressed directly from the Office of Publication, are to be transmitted from the Post Office where mailed to any other Post Office in this Province free of postage.

Periodicals other than such as are exempt under the preceding clause, will be liable to the existing rates of charge, namely, if not exceeding 3 oz. in weight,  $\frac{1}{2}$ d.—if over 3 oz. 2d.

Transient Periodicals posted in Canada must be prepaid by postage-stamp. This class will include all Periodicals of whatever description posted otherwise than from the Office of Publication.

Periodicals when sent in packets to one address, within the limits of 4 lbs. to each packet, pass at the rate of 3d.  $\text{3 } \frac{1}{2}$  lbs. Printed Circulars, Prices Current or Hand Bills, and other printed matter of a like description, and Books bound or unbound, passing as above, are charged a rate of  $\frac{1}{2}$ d.  $\text{3 } \frac{1}{2}$  ounce or fraction of an ounce, whether sent singly or in packets, to one address, under the limit of four pounds per packet.

Prepayment of the foregoing rates on Periodicals and Circulars and all other printed matter is optional, except when addressed to the United States or British West Indies, and in such case the charges must be prepaid. On all such printed matter received from the United States or British West Indies, the Canada rate always remains to be collected by the delivering Postmaster in this Province.

Circulars and other Printed Papers must be sent unsealed to pass as such, and Pamphlets, Periodicals, Magazines, Books, &c., must be put in covers open at the ends or sides, so that the character of the matter may be seen, and are subject to the same restrictions as to the presence of writing, which are hereinbefore detailed as applying to Newspapers.

*Book Post with England.*—A Book Packet may contain any number of separate books, publications, works of literature or art, almanacs, maps or prints, printed letters, and any quantity of paper, vellum or parchment (to the exclusion of written letters whether sealed or open), and the books, map, paper, &c. may either be written, printed or plain, or any mixture of the three, and may be either British, Colonial or Foreign.

The name and address of the sender, or anything else not in the nature of a letter, may also be written or printed upon the envelope or cover of the packet, in addition to the name and address of the person to whom forwarded.

All legitimate binding, mounting or covering of the same, or a portion thereof, will be allowed as part of the packet, whether such binding, &c., be loose or attached, as also rollers, in the case of prints and maps, and whatever may be necessary for the safe transmission of literary or artistic matter, or usually appertains thereto, and the postage is to be rated upon the gross weight of the packet.

The following conditions must be carefully observed, as prescribed by the Imperial Post Office :—

Every Book Packet must be either without a cover or in a cover open at the ends or sides.

It must not contain any letter, open or sealed, or any sealed enclosure whatever.

No Packet must exceed two feet in length, breadth or thickness.

The Postage of Book Packets must be paid in advance.

Printed Votes and Proceedings of the Imperial Parliament and Colonial Legislatures are subject to the above charges and regulations, when sent by Book Post between Canada and the United Kingdom.

All Book Post matter intended to be sent, under these regulations, from Canada to the United Kingdom must be forwarded by the Canadian Line of Steamers.

## DECIMAL CURRENCY.

By an Act of the last Session of the Provincial Parliament (20 Vic., cap. 18), it is enacted that all accounts be rendered to the Government or any Public Office or Department in this Province, in Dollars and Cents, and that this Act shall take effect on and after the 31st day of December, 1857.

Consequent upon the above enactment will be the general adoption of the decimal system in all operations of trade, and as some confusion is likely to arise in reducing Pence into Dollars and Cents, or *vice versa*, we give the following rules :

*Rule 1*—Add a cipher to any given number of Pence and divide by 6, and the result is in Cents. Example : 3s. 8d. or 44 Pence : add a cipher gives 440, divided by 6, and the result is 73 2-6ths, say 73 cents answer.

*Rule 2*—Multiply any given number of Cents by 6 and cut off the last figure, which is tenths of a penny. Example : 73 cents multiplied by 6 gives 438, equal to 43 pence and 8-10ths, say 44 pence, or 3s. 8d. answer.
