Among her many costumes the following are a few: The first is an Italian peasant dress composed of red Chlna silk skirt, trimmed with vari-coloreal ribbon; a chemisette of blue China sllk with a yellow silk bodico confining it to the figure. The next is an evening dress of Leavy yellow Ottoman silk, trimined elaborately with very wide duchesee and Rouon point lace, the duchesse flounces being lertooned with thy yellow reses. A jaunty hat of blaek lace trimmed with crush roses helps to made up this very fetching little costume. The sixth is a burlesque costume, Miss Jarbean being in gray and whito from head to foot. The bodice is of grey and white wide strined silk, heavily emhossed with real silver threads. There is very wide fringe at the bottom of the waist and trunks composed of steel and silver. A long crepe cape hângs gracefully at the hack, caught with stecl and silver ornaments, a high Medici collar, a hat trimmed with gray and white plumes, a pair of grey silk tights and slippers to match, make a tout ensemble raroly to be surpassed.
