





The buyer bought the load for \$1.02 per bushel, but when the wheat was being unloaded it was found that the quality of a considerable portion of the load was away below the sample. Upon this ground Mr. McIntosh refused to accept the wheat, except at a price of 80c per bushel, all, as he contended, it was worth. The suit for the amount was begun by Mr. White, and Judge Morson, on the hearing of the case, refused to receive evidence as to the quality of the wheat, but declared that the plaintiff had given no undertaking that the remainder of the wheat was to be up to the grade of the sample. The buyer, he held, has bought the load in bulk.




