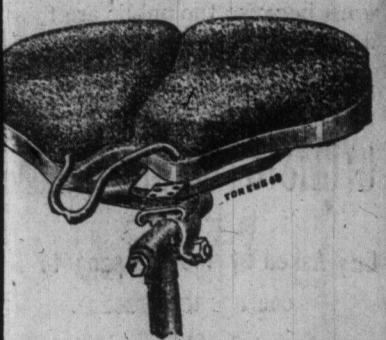
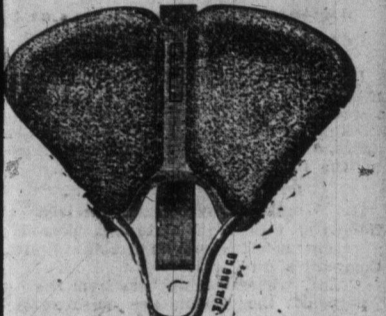


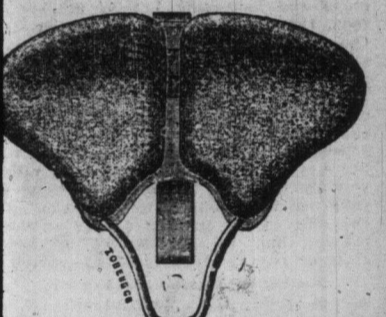

SCHELY'S TACTICS. He Has Direct Evidence That the Whole Cape Verde Fleet is Bottled Up at Santiago.

Off Santiago de Cuba, Saturday, June 6, via Kingston, Jamaica, Monday, June 6, (9 a.m.)—Every effort is being made to cut off Santiago de Cuba's connection with the outside world.

Sunday last, when Commodore Schley found Admiral Cervera's fleet trying to leave the harbor and headed off the attempt, it has been the policy to surround the city and harbor that no assistance, either in supplying arms or ammunition, could reach there.

On Friday afternoon Lieut. Sharp of the Vixen, went to the place of rendezvous and received from the insurgents a map of the harbor, showing the entire Cape Verde fleet, with the exception of the destroyer Terror, inside, and close up to the city, under the protection of the guns mounted on Blanco battery, at the northern extremity of the harbor.

Santiago Reported Taken. Cape Hayti, Hayti, June 9.—(8.40 p.m.)—A man who arrived here to-day in a schooner from Turk's Island, one of the Bahamas, and about 110 miles north of Hayti, said it was reported there on Tuesday that Santiago de Cuba had been taken by the Americans.

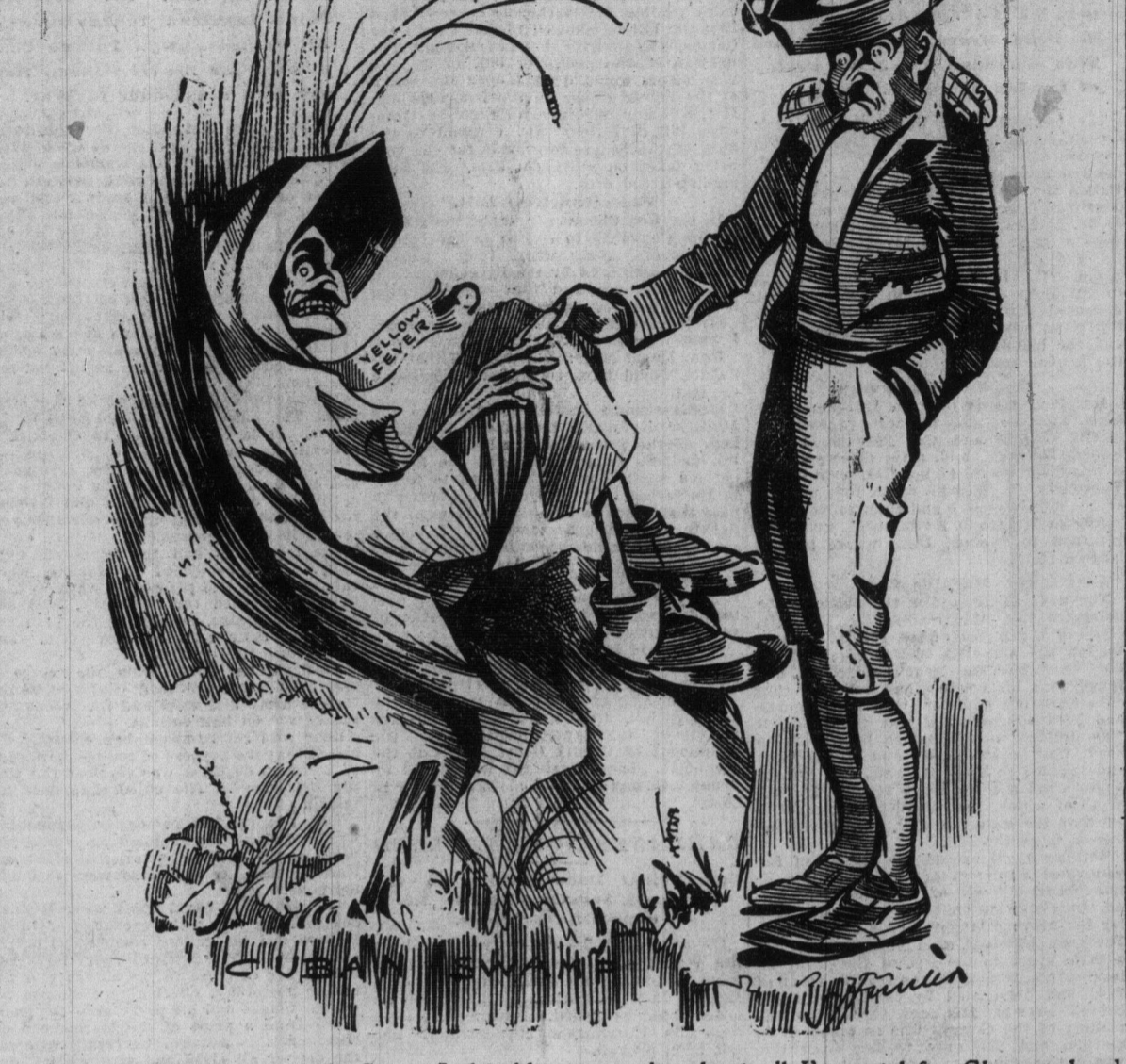

REV. MADRILL DISCIPLINED.

Committee Recommends That His Name Be Struck Off the Roll

Of the Congregational Union—Report of the Special Committee—Will Be Heard in His Defence This Morning—Rev. J. W. Pedley of London Elected Chairman.

The Congregational Union opened their second day of business yesterday, with the election of a chairman for 1893. Two candidates presented themselves, Rev. J. W. Sir Mackenzie Would Like to See How the Franchise Bill Fares.

Ottawa, June 9.—(Special.)—Senator Drummond, when the grant to Montreal harbor was being discussed in committee of the Senate yesterday, moved to strike out the clause granting \$700,000 for the dock, the amendment was lost on a vote of 14 to 20.

When the plebiscite bill came up for a third reading Sir Mackenzie asked that the bill be allowed to stand until the Commons dealt with the franchise bill. The passage of the plebiscite bill, in its present shape, would depend upon the action of the Lower House on the franchise bill.

In the Red Chamber to-night the refusal of the Commons to concur in the Senate amendment, which he moved, was read by the Speaker. Hon. David Mills proposed that the resolution be taken into consideration to-morrow night.

Sir Mackenzie would like to see how the franchise bill, the business of the Senate will be concluded. It was a matter for consideration how the Senate could amend the plebiscite bill, so that the dropping of the clause providing for the privilege of the Government of being able to take a vote on the important question of plebiscite.

Hon. David Mills has notice that he will to-morrow morning at 11 o'clock, in a committee, the document declared, had found that his conduct had not been that of a Christian minister; that his language had been so extravagant at times that it was difficult to distinguish it from falsehood; that he was selfish and over-bearing; and inclined to apply the rule, "in for an eye and a tooth for a tooth." In face of all of which, the committee recommended that the name of Rev. Mr. Madrill be struck from the roll.

Nothing could exceed the gravity of the accusations against the members of this modern "bull of excommunication."

Communication between the insurgents and the Spaniards is being cut off.

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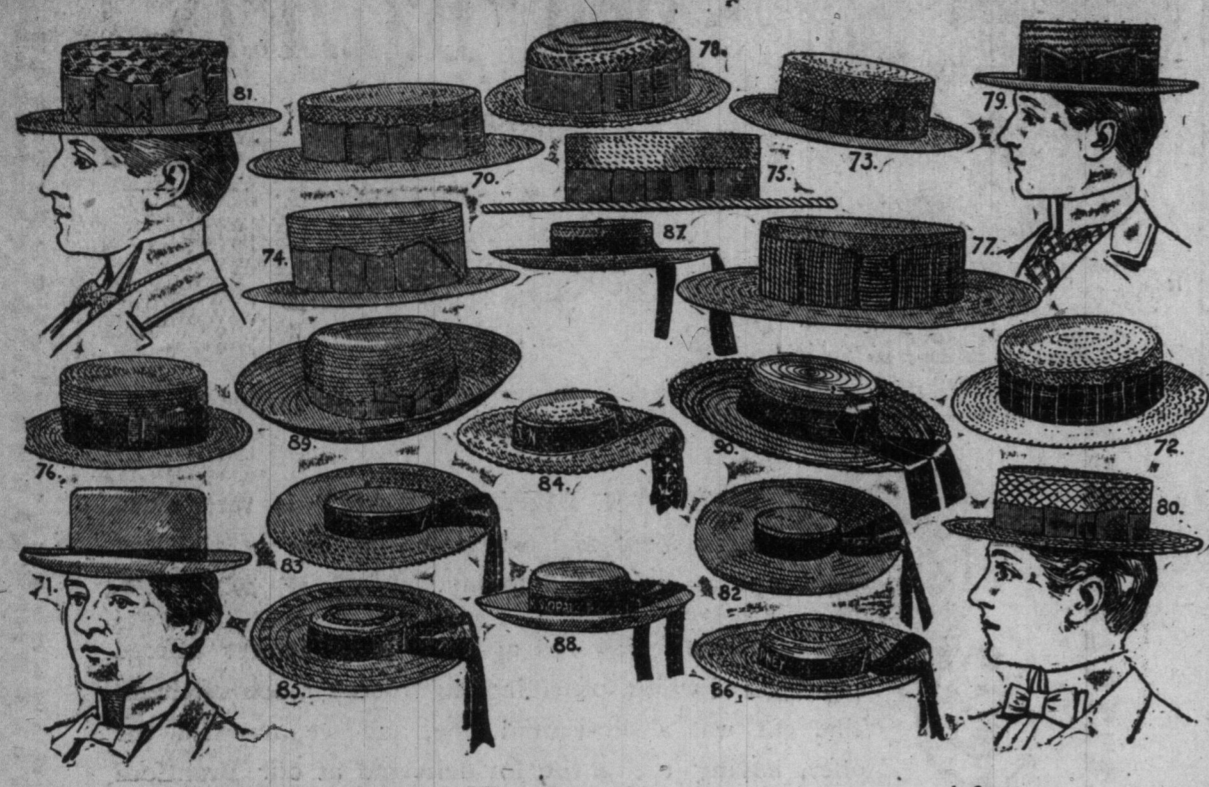
