MR. GERMAN'S QUESTIONS Regarding Canadian Niagara Power Company to be Answered on Wednesday.

PEOPLE ASK FOR MOTIVE POWER. Consumption Sanitary Has Some Too Crude—Mr. Hardy Has Something Up His Sleeve.

At the Legislature yesterday afternoon, Mr. German, the member for Welland, displayed somewhat of a disposition to kick over the traces. His 11 questions regarding the Canadian Niagara Power Company were set for that session, and he wanted to ask them. While some petitions were being read, Hon. Mr. Hardy stepped over to Mr. German's desk, and an earnest conversation ensued, the Welland man appearing to be somewhat impatient. When the questions were reached, Mr. German arose, but asked to be excused before the Attorney-General was on his feet requesting that Mr. German wait until next week. Mr. German demurred, and seemed to think he was being set upon. He consented, however, that the matter should come up on Tuesday, but, as that is a Government day, Wednesday was fixed as the date.

THE PEOPLE WANT IT. Just before the House rose, Mr. German handed in petitions from the Village Council of Chippewa, Township of Stamford, Village of Niagara, Town of Niagara Falls and County Council from Welland, asking for immediate power from Niagara Falls. Other petitions that were presented were: Mr. German—From Fort Erie, wanting free markets. Mr. Krebs—Waterloo, asking the Provincial road instructors' supervision of road construction, providing Provincial aid be obtained for payment of such work. Mr. Pettipiece, Lambton, asking for medical men of the county, requesting an infirmary for the better treatment of women at London Asylum. Mr. German—From County Council of Welland and from Fort Erie, for the beautifying of the old Fort land at Fort Erie and making it into a public park. Mr. German—To reduce the number of members of Township Councils from five to three.

MR. GERMAN—FROM COUNTY OF WELLAND, to amend the Jurors' Act, regarding fees of pupils attending High Schools. Col. Matheson asked regarding the reconstruction of the river by-election in West Huron, and the Attorney-General replied that the returning officer would be asked to furnish the names of all who had voted to a further question, Mr. Hardy said he expected to hear from the returning officer in West Huron on Monday. The House adjourned until 3 p.m. Monday.

ASSEMBLY NOTES. Cemeteries in Cities.

Mr. Marter will introduce a bill to amend chapter 215 of the Revised Statutes, entitled, "An Act Respecting Cemetery Companies." The added section is: "No cemetery or burial ground, whether owned by a company, church, vestry, trustees or otherwise, shall be established, extended or enlarged without the consent of the Council. It is also supposed that the act means that no cemetery shall be erected or enlarged in a city or town without the consent of the Council."

THE CONSUMPTION SANITARIUM. Drs. Macdonald, Bryce, Barrick, Playter and Odright, and Mr. D. Alexander, Provincial Secretary, yesterday, to request aid for the construction of a public sanitarium for consumption, at the residence of J. J. Graham, established the department. The department asked for assurance that if such were established the grant would be given pro forma, per diem. The answer was that they should get the grant in concrete terms, and then bring in their request.

THE PRINTING CONTRACT. The feeling in the Opposition is that there will be a fight over the printing contracts. In reply to the question of Mr. Marter, asking if the contracts had been let, it so to whom, the answer is a city, the cause of the delay, Mr. Hardy replied that the contract had not yet been let; it was awarded to the lowest tenderer, but the conditions were not yet completed with. Formerly it was thought the firm had made the mistake; now there is a rumor that the Government do not wish to allow the contractor to print the bills. In reply to this Mr. Matheson will on Monday ask for an order of the House for copies of all correspondence in any way between the Queen's Printer and the heads of departments as to preparation of specifications for contracts for public printing. Also all reports, if any, of expert printers as to details of said specifications and all other correspondence in connection with the letting of the contract or conditions reported from the printer.

REGISTRATION OF NAVIES. A report of the new vaccination scheme has come from Dr. Hodgins, Inspector Provincial Board, that the vaccination of 238 navies in two days during the canal works of the St. Lawrence at Quebec, under the supervision of the laborers took to it quite good-naturedly. Seven of them had that previous and three absolutely refused to undergo the operation. However, they will be compelled to consent to it.

The stamps of 3000 pounds weight each, the heavy stamps have been decided upon, as they have been found to give better results on like properties and are now in general use in Australia and South Africa, and in such mines as the Homestake, Alaska, Mexican and Trendon on this continent. It is expected that this new stamp will be in full operation in August next, crushing over 100 tons a day.

Hiawatha Mine. The first annual meeting of the Hiawatha Gold Mining Company of Ontario was held at the office of the Company, No. 1 Toronto-street, to receive the report of the directors for the past year. A number of the shareholders were present, and seemed to be well pleased with the main shaft, which is being conducted, and also the future policy as laid down.

burning building by Assistant Chief Davis. Several of the men on the Board of Trade building were badly frightened lest the flames would spread. Many put their books and valuables in their pockets and fled. The tower of the British America building in a time caught fire, but was quickly extinguished by the firemen. The various caretakers lost no time in removing their valuables to a safe distance. Expressmen did a good business, carrying books from the different offices. The British America clerks who had done excellent work on the roof, were provided with a sumptuous dinner by the company. The following clerks on the staff of the British America Assurance company were in the building, fighting the fire from the roof for hours, with the company's own stand pipe and hose, several being frost-bitten by the extreme cold which they were subjected to. It was only through the heroic efforts that the building was saved. F. Barnard (the caretaker) and his son, G. W. Graham, J. McVittie, S. Banks, G. Mathers, F. Milroy, W. H. Gaud and J. G. Stewart, H. H. Snow and J. A. Kirkpatrick. The P.K. Telegraph company's wires were badly interrupted by the fire, and for a time the service was paralyzed, but gangs of men were put to work selecting the wires that were to be cut, and the evening communication with all points was restored by 11 o'clock. The fire men returned to resume business at once. Mr. J. G. Kent, a partner, was looking back at 12 o'clock. At last night's fire two days after, Mr. Kent says there is a large quantity of goods in the custom house, but the firm will be able to get all orders on Monday.

Incidents and Notes.

William Graham, one of the British America Assurance clerks, heroically crept down a ladder from the British America building to the burning roof below, and closed an open fire door, thus saving the safety of the company's building. CHICAGO WHEAT OFF A CENT

Still Another Sharp Decline in Speculative Futures.

Liverpool Market a Penny Lower and the Continent Reported Little Demand - Argentine Shipments Large - Local Grain, Produce and Live Stock Notes.

Friday Evening, Feb. 10.

Spot wheat at Liverpool to-day declined 1/4 cent, and futures closed 3/4 to 1/2 below yesterday's final figures. Paris wheat closed unchanged to 20 centimes higher than yesterday's closing figures. Antwerp market was reported dead.

The heaviness of the trans-Atlantic markets caused Chicago wheat prices to drop again today. The May option declined 1/2 and the July option 1/4 cent per bushel, and the close was near the bottom figures for the day. There is much talk of damage by the present, extremely cold wave to the American wheat which is most bare of snow in some States.

Liverpool market declined 1/4 cent per bushel for spot and 1/2 for futures, and Chicago wheat closed 3/4 to 1/2 per bushel lower than yesterday.

Receipts of grain at Chicago to-day: Wheat 71, corn 454, oats 584.

Wheat receipts at Duluth and Minneapolis to-day, 278 cars, against 421 the same day a year ago.

Argentine wheat shipments the past week have totalled 87,000 bushels, as compared with 82,000 bushels the previous week. Blaine shipments, 22,000 bushels.

Wheat receipts at Liverpool the past three days, 274,000 bushels, including 211,000 bushels of Argentine. Corn, same time, 67,000 bushels.

Peas declined 1/4 cent at Liverpool. Lard declined 1/4 cent at Chicago.

The Chicago Daily Bulletin says that the Board of Trade there will receive its foreign market reports from George Broadbill of the Liverpool Corn Trade News after Feb. 15.

Cables to Chicago say that European stocks of wheat are small, except Government stocks in South Russia. San Francisco wires that drought continues there, with freezing weather, and deferred futures had advanced 40 per cent in two or three days.

France-Official French crop reports make condition of wheat in 13 departments very good in 47 departments, good in 7 departments, fairly good. Acreage larger in 32 departments, 17 smaller and 43 unchanged.

United States-Washington Agricultural Department reports that the officials in charge of the climate and crop service have collected information as to condition of winter wheat, which indicates that notwithstanding the comparatively little protection to the plant, the general condition at the end of January was satisfactory, but fears are expressed as to effects of severe frost, then experienced in some sections.

Argentina-The data is renewed that Argentina has a surplus of 50,000,000 bushels of wheat.

Situation in India. Broomball cables that rain is much needed in the Punjab district. The Punjab is the most important wheat-producing district in India. Its acreage forming about one-third of the whole wheat crop there. The acreage under wheat in the Punjab this season is reported 7,502,300 acres, or 9 per cent less than last year. In the North-west Provinces and Oudh, the next largest wheat-producing provinces, it is reported 10 per cent above average, which means an increase of nearly 500,000 acres. In the next important district, the Central Provinces, the acreage is about the same as last year. In the next important district, the Bombay Presidency, the acreage is about the same as last year.

Wheat in Northwest States. A Minneapolis despatch says: "On Feb. 11

country elevator stocks in Minnesota South and North Dakota were 6,400,000 bushels. Much of this will come to terminals before April 1.
