Destroyed the Flagship. There is no dispute about the fact that the Japanese fleet was destroyed by battleship fire. The great ironclad was sunk shortly after 5 o'clock in the afternoon of Saturday, and for two hours before that period was really in a sinking condition.

Perhaps the most dramatic incident of the battle was the sinking of the armored cruiser Suetani on Sunday morning west of Chappan Bay. The Suetani had been damaged in Saturday's battle by shells and torpedoes on Saturday night, but managed to remain afloat with her mainmast, masts, and funnels, until she was discovered at 9 o'clock on Sunday morning by the Mikasa and Otawa.

The latter is the Russian cruiser, which was sunk in Chempulpo harbor at the beginning of the war. The Varig was a modern cruiser built in Philadelphia in 1888. She was raised from Chempulpo harbor last August by the Japanese, rebuilt and renamed Otawa, and put into action for the first time last Saturday.

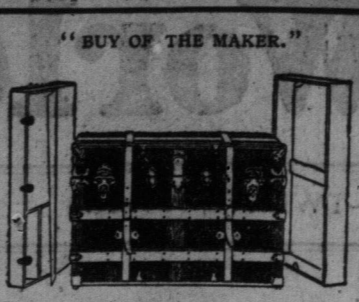

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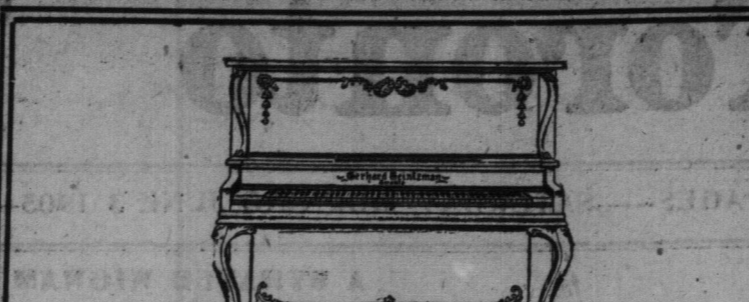

THREE WERE WOUNDED INTO SEA LEST GROANS

Story That 140 Sailors Were Thrown Overboard From Battleship Ore, Whose Crew Fought With Remarkable Bravery— Cruiser Jemchug Was Sunk.

Tokyo, June 2.—It is planned to bring the battleship Ore to Tokushima, where the emperor will visit her. A remarkable story is in circulation concerning the wounded on the Ore. It is said that at the opening of the fight 300 men were killed and wounded and that the groans and shrieks of the wounded exercised so harmful an effect that it was decided to throw the mortally wounded into the sea. One hundred and forty, it is said, were thrown overboard. Those slightly wounded were then fastened to the mast to prevent their interference with the fighting of the ship.

It is impossible to obtain any confirmation of this story, but later reports indicate that the crew of the Ore fought with desperate bravery throughout the day previous to their surrender. The hull of the Ore is shell-marked and many of her guns are smashed and dismantled.

JEMCHUG A GONER

Tokyo, June 2.—Admiral Togo, telegraphing yesterday, says: "The ships sent northward to search for Russian ships returned yesterday. SAVES THEY WERE ENTICED

PREFERRED DEATH

"We launched the boats and embarked 600 of the crew, who were rescued by the Japanese. I, with the navigating officer, determined to share the fate of our ship, which sank. We two were drawn underneath by the suction and whirled about till we lost our breath. "We forgot everything, but were picked up by Japanese fishermen. We had intended to die and floated about in the water, as it seemed, for hours, watching the scene created by the explosion of Japanese shells."

PEOPLE ARE APPALLED

St. Petersburg, June 2.—(2.05 p.m.)—The Russian press this morning is still abounding in reports of the decision of the autocrat to convene the Duma, even the reactionary Svet joining in general cheering. In view of the current rumors it is most significant that the papers which are more or less in the confidence of the government unanimously take the position that the decision of the emperor is a step toward the question of peace or war. The responsibility is now removed from foreign dispatches and the people are appalled at the horrible stories of slaughter on board the Russian ships. The admiral has not yet been able to estimate approximately from the foreign advices the loss of men, but as the ships were over rather than undermanned the total will be greater than the ordinary complement of the vessels would indicate, and probably will exceed 10,000 if only about 4000 were saved.

TALKS OF TREASON

Regiment masses are being celebrated constantly in all churches and chapels for the repose of the souls of the slain, altho the distracted relatives are unable to leave the fate of those dear to them. Ugly stories are circulated in this city of the demoralization and even treachery of the crews of several of the Russian ships during the battle, and it is even said that the crew of the battleship Ore bound their officers and hoisted the white flag. The origin of these stories, which are discredited by all naval men here, cannot be traced, as the only direct information comes from Japan, but they are doubtless based on the trouble among the crew of the Ore before her departure for the far east. She was sunk at her dock before she left Cronstadt and later at Libau the crew were mutinous.

NEBOGATOFF A TRAITOR

Indignation against Rear-Admiral Nebogatoff is growing. The epithets "coward" and "traitor" are coupled with his name, especially since the receipt of the Tokio despatches showing that he surrendered was not in the heat of battle, but with the land close under his lee, to which his crew could have escaped after the destruction of the ship.

CONSERVATIVE RUSSIANS ARE ALARMED

at the possibility of a revolution in various parts of Russia as a result of the disaster. The conservative press is full of reports of the demoralization of the army and navy, and of the loss of confidence in the government. It is said that many officers and soldiers are deserting, and that there is a general feeling of discontent and unrest throughout the empire.

INDICEMENTS HAVE BEEN VOTED

Chicago, June 2.—Indicements connected with the teamster strike have been voted by the grand jury, and will be returned to-morrow. The names of the men indicted could not be ascertained to-day. It was reported, however, that bills would not be voted in connection with the charges made by President Shea of the Teamsters Union that he was offered \$10,000 to call a strike against Sears, Roebuck & Co. It was found that the statutes of limitation barred any indictments, and that treachery given was largely of hearsay character.

THREE FATAL WORDS... There is something pathetically sad in the Globe's struggle with conflicting emotions. An admission of the fierceness of the strife that is raging in its manly bosom is conveyed in these words:

START PUBLIC OWNERSHIP NOW... The street railway system of Toronto is a most unsatisfactory one. The men who now control and manipulate it are not giving the public a proper service, and they are refusing to let suburban traffic into the city except on conditions that will assist them, and might prejudice the recovery of the franchise by the people.

COULD ANYTHING BE MORE UNWARRANTED? Needless to say Mr. Cochrane's first impulse, when the writs for London and North Oxford were issued, was to wage a cruel war on the authors of coercion. It had already decided on its armor, and was giving its trusty sword a last turn on the grindstone when someone spoke and caused the Globe to pause.

THE WORLD IS SO MUCH CONCERNED IN THE issue of the war between Russia and the United States, that its attendant consequences that the public have hardly taken time to think about the attempted assassination of the King of Spain in Paris. It goes to show, however, that the King, who is becoming more and more of a dangerous occupation, and this applies to it, whether the man filling the office happens to be a president or a czar. It is not at all certain that the intention of the anarchists in Paris was not to destroy the President of the United States as well as the King of Spain, and the safety of President Roosevelt of the United States becomes daily a source of increasing concern to his advisers.

IF TWO BUILDING PROVINCES are threatened with the loss of their educational liberties, and if they expect outsiders to help them they must exercise a stricter censorship over the sayings of their allies. If men like R. B. Bennett at London and George E. Foster at North Oxford will stand up and about "Rifles," "Revolution," and "Coercion" then the worst that can happen to the Northwest is none too good for it. A man is known by the words of his supporters. No good cause would suffer such license of speech. For ourselves we frankly confess that we thought better of the principle of provincial rights, never supposing for an instant that it would allow R. B. Bennett and Hon. George E. Foster to speak to it in such intemperate language. But the deed is done. The Globe has jumped clean out of its harness, and the men to blame for it are the unspeakable monsters who said "Rifles," "Revolution," and likewise "Coercion."

THE PROPOSED BIG BUILDING... Editor World: Will you allow me to express the hope that now that the agitation for a building in which horse shows, cattle shows, dog shows, poultry shows, flower shows, big conventions and winter sports can be held, has been revived, it will go somewhat further than the letter-writing, that it will, in shape, lead to something definite being done. Postmaster Pattison says that the matter has been frequently discussed during the last thirty years. It has, and at times that I am aware of, the building has been proposed, but was not wanted. 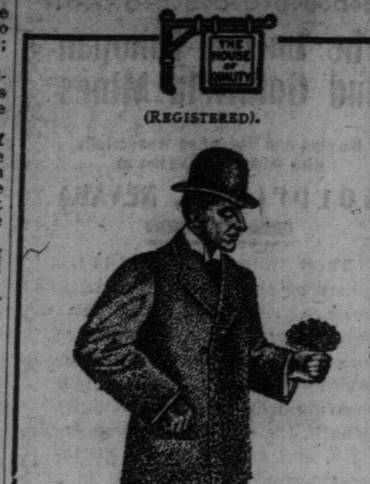
