DEMAND LOCAL LABOR FOR SHIPYARD WORK

Board of Control Sends Wire to Minister of Marine — Union Willing to Let Returned Men Have Jobs, But Draws the Line at Outsiders — Collingwood Workers Already on the Job—Responsibility Now Up to Federal Government.

Hours were spent by the board of control yesterday in an effort to straighten out the tangle that has developed at the Dominion ship yards, where local labor men are determined to oust outside workmen from the plant.

Mayor Church was in communication with Ottawa both by phone and telegraph and the Toronto situation was made clear in a final letter to the minister last night.

Toronto workmen have given the government and city two days to right the situation, after which they will, according to statements made yesterday to the board, take matters in their own hands, but not without first notifying the board.

The tender to complete the two boats at the Dominion yards was awarded by the government to the Collingwood Shipbuilding Co., after an arrangement had been made with the Dominion ship yards, at the foot of Bathurst street, which is now in the hands of the liquidator.

When the board of control met yesterday Mayor Church said he understood men were being brought from Collingwood to work in the shipbuilding plant.

Controller Cameron said the members of the shipbuilders' union were willing to give up their jobs to returned soldiers, but strongly objected to men from Collingwood being engaged on the job.

"There are outsiders taking the jobs," declared Controller Gibbons, "and the situation is serious; trouble may develop."

On motion of Controller Maguire and Controller Cameron a wire was sent to the minister of marine, demanding that only Toronto men be employed on the two ships.

Con. Ramsden said the demand could not be put too strongly. A deputation from the local shipbuilders' union later waited on the board, and when told what had been done H. H. Wright, secretary of the union, said that passing the buck had been the rule for weeks. They wanted action. They were willing to let the returned men have the jobs, but not outsiders.

Mr. Wright presented a list of a couple of dozen names of Collingwood men already on the job. He said that when the big strike was on the local shipbuilders' union stayed on the job and built ships, and now they were walking the streets while those who had struck were getting employment.

"Pull your policemen off the yards and we will deal with the situation quick," said Mr. Wright. Con. Maguire said he did not see why the city should give preference to outsiders. He would be willing to pull the police off.

The board considered the matter sufficiently urgent to get in touch with the minister at once. The mayor directed the meeting to get the minister at Ottawa on the phone.

Mayor Church returned soon to say he had called Manager Barber at the yards, who had said the liquidator was running the business and had authorized the bringing of men from Collingwood. He had then called the liquidator, Mr. Wade, who had declared that he had nothing to do with the staff. The matter was in the hands of the Collingwood Shipbuilding Company.

Mr. Wright said there were a thousand men at the Labor Temple waiting for his report. He would try to keep them quiet for a couple of days to see what Ottawa was going to do, but if the outsiders were not taken off the job by that time he would not be responsible for what might happen at the yards.

Preference to Soldiers. At the afternoon session of the board, Mayor Church announced that he had been in telephone communication with the deputy minister of marine at Ottawa, who had declared that the instructions to the Dominion Shipbuilding Co. were to take on only Toronto men and give preference to the returned men. He was renewing these instructions in a telegram to the yards.

A telegram also came from Ottawa during the afternoon from Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, minister of marine, saying that the instructions were that Toronto men were to be given the preference and that only an official staff was to be brought from Collingwood. The mayor was instructed to write at once to the minister giving him all

Government to make no further grants to the Navy League since their propaganda has not in the best interests of the Dominion, while it was further agreed that a resolution be passed calling upon the government to stop military training of youths in the colleges and public schools, while it was further agreed that constituencies should have the power to recall members of both the federal and provincial houses who disagreed with the party platform after being elected. (Continued From Page 1). This convention stands firmly by its declaration for the abolition of patronage. It strenuously opposes the creation of offices or the vesting of existing offices or a reward for supporters of the government of the day. It is opposed to the principle of combining appointments to office to government supporters. At the same time it feels that individuals should not be denied because of their membership in the U. F. O., from receiving consideration from the U. F. O. candidates, when appointments for public service are being necessarily made.

This convention formally protests against the action of the Ontario government in voting \$50,000 of provincial funds to the U. F. O. for the purpose of assisting in carrying on the propaganda now being conducted by that party.

That, in the opinion of this convention, no increase in seasonal indemnity, voted by the provincial legislature or Dominion parliament, should become effective until confirmed by a legislature or parliament fresh from the people. Further, that this convention recommends that all U. F. O. candidates for the legislature be pledged to oppose any increase in the present indemnity, and that U. F. O. candidates for the commons be pledged to vote for a reduction of the federal indemnity to the figure existing prior to this year.

That the government of the province be urged to appoint a commission to determine the cost of producing the principal commodities produced for sale on farms devoted to mixed farming in the presentative county of Ontario, and to report thereon to the legislature.

That this convention urges the creation of a rural credit co-operative banking system, and that it recommends that the U. F. O. be urged to support the organization of a provincial long distance telephone service.

Whereas it is common practice, the moment candidates are nominated for the legislature or commons, for appeals to be made to him for subscriptions to all sorts of institutions, societies, clubs, churches and charitable organizations.

Resolved that this convention desires to express its deep pleasure in receiving the message so admirably delivered by our fellow-members of French origin, emphasizing the fact that the great movement transcends the divide of race and language and purposes to establish the good will of all who by and love the soil of Canada.

SHOT JEWELER, ROBBED SALESMEN

Daring Hold-Up in New York District Watched by Police.

New York, Dec. 16.—Entering an office building at Fifth avenue near 45th street, in which hundreds of persons were working, three masked robbers today shot and killed Edwin W. Andrews, head of a jewelry concern, held up two travelling salesmen who entered the office at that moment, and escaped with their sample cases which contained valuable jewels.

Today's robbery, occurring on top of the sensational holdup of four guests in the Hotel Astor last night, and while the police department is waving, took place within the restricted district in which detectives had been ordered during the Christmas shopping season to arrest on sight all known criminals.

A heavy guard was thrown about the building immediately after the hold up. Elevator men said the thieves had not used the lifts in their escape, and the police thought they might still be hiding in the building. A search for them was started.

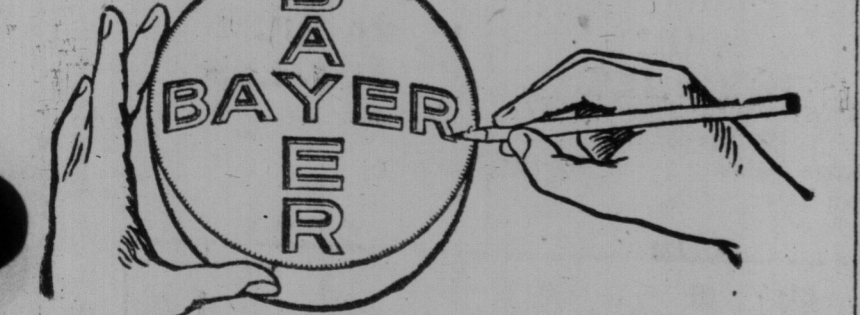

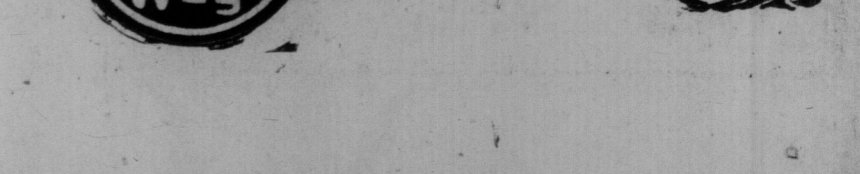

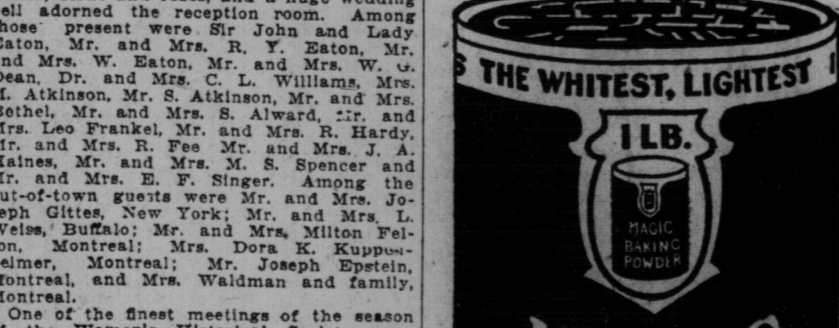
