Kington, Feb. 16.—(Can. Press.)—Warden Ponsford, of Portsmouth Penitentiary, received official word today that Albert Griggs, who escaped last August with a fellow convict named Milton, the latter being captured at Detroit a few weeks ago, had, under the alias of George Williams, been sentenced to five years in Elmira, N.Y., prison for grand larceny, and that at the expiration of that time he would be surrendered to the authorities of Portsmouth Penitentiary.

INFLUENZA COSTLY TO INSURANCE FIRMS

Federal Report Shows Four Times Deaths During Year as Those Due to War.

Ottawa, Feb. 16.—(By Canadian Press.)—Influenza was more costly to life insurance companies operating in Canada during the year ended March, 1920, than were post-war casualties. This information was given in the annual report of the superintendent of insurance, tabled in the house today by Sir Henry Drayton.

BOLSHEVİK MONEY FOUND ON AN ITALIAN STEAMER

Nantes, Feb. 15.—Police authorities have deposited in the Bank of Italy the 160,000 gold rubles found on board the Italian steamer Ancona when it was searched here yesterday. The money was hidden in the cabin of a Russian commercial mission, and the agent for the steamship company stated the gold was intended to be spent in Great Britain for the purchase of machinery and merchandise for the Russian Soviet government.

FALSE PASSPORT BUREAU DISCOVERED IN BUDAPEST

Budapest, Feb. 16.—On complaint of the United States passport office here that hundreds of Hungarians had obtained visas by means of false documents, a search was made by the local police today arrested several representatives of a bureau that is alleged to have supplied the false papers for a few thousand crowns each. The suspicions of the United States officials had been aroused by the fact that the same signatures were found on many different documents. The holders of such papers have been barred from travelling to the United States.

OBSERVE ANNIVERSARY OF SIR WILFRID'S DEATH

Ottawa, Feb. 16.—Tomorrow is the second anniversary of the death of Rt. Hon. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who passed away in Ottawa on February 17, 1919, at 2:50 in the afternoon. An anniversary high mass and service will be held tomorrow morning for the late liberal chieftain in the Sacred Heart Church.

WILSON WILL SUBMIT AN ITEMIZED REPORT

Washington, Feb. 16.—White House officials announced today that President Wilson before his retirement, March 4, would make a final itemized report showing the disbursements and allotments made by him out of the \$150,000,000 war fund voted him by congress.

The Hague, Jan. 30.—(By Mail.)—The aged sultan of Jokjokarta, one of the two powerful and wealthy potentates of the Dutch East Indies, has decided to abdicate in favor of his eldest son, the crown prince of Jokjokarta, who has been training in European ways. The crown prince has spent months at the court of Queen Wilhelmina, and Dutch officials look forward to his rule over the Mohammedan natives with much favor.

COL. COOPER MAY RESIGN.

Ottawa, Feb. 16.—(By Canadian Press.)—It is rumored here that Col. Cooper, director of the Canadian bureau of information in New York, is likely to resign shortly. No official intimation of his resignation has, however, yet been received.

STRIKE IN SILK MILLS.

Northampton, Mass., Feb. 16.—Two hundred employees of the Leeds plant of the Nonotuck silk mills went on strike today rather than accept a wage cut of 15 per cent.

AIM TO MAINTAIN TREATY OF SEVRES

Venizelos Has Reached Complete Understanding With Greek Government.

Paris, Feb. 16.—Former Premier Venizelos of Greece and the Greek delegation to the conference of the treaty of Sevres with Turkey at the coming conference in London on near eastern questions, it was learned here today. M. Venizelos will co-operate fully with Nikolas Kalogeropoulos, the Greek premier and head of the Greek delegation to the conference. Both of them were in Paris today, and while it is understood they have not met they have exchanged views extensively by means of mutual friends. The agreement of M. Venizelos to co-operate with the Greek government, however, was completed some days ago, before the arrival of M. Kalogeropoulos in Paris.

SHOT HER OWN SON DEAD IN MISTAKE FOR BURGLAR

Cheboygan, Mich., Feb. 16.—Mrs. Ernest Cornell, mother of five children, heard a noise downstairs during the night. Arming herself with a revolver, she descended to the dining room. There she saw a man bending over a silverware drawer. "Hands up," she cried. The burglar darted for the door. Mrs. Cornell fired. The burglar ran as far as the barn and dropped.

Canada's Italian Trade Shows Enormous Increase

Montreal, Feb. 16.—Canada's trade with Italy for the twelve months ending last November shows an enormous increase over the year 1914. Last year's trade with this country alone was estimated at \$45,000,000. In 1914 it was only \$30,000. These figures were issued this morning by Wendell McL. Clarke, trade commissioner for the Dominion to the Mediterranean countries, whose headquarters are in Milan, Italy. Mr. Clarke has just returned from a visit to the various trading centers in the west, and will return to Italy on March 16.

Price of Bread Lowered By Montreal Merchants

Montreal, Feb. 16.—A reminder of pre-war days is the sensational offer by a chain of stores operating in this city of bread for sale at 2 1/2 cents for a 24-ounce loaf. Other manufacturers are said to be unable to meet the price, and that there is a tendency to raise, rather than lower the price now prevailing.

ACKNOWLEDGE DEBT TO V. STEFANSSON

Privy Council of Canada Issues a Formal Vote of Thanks.

Ottawa, Feb. 16.—(By Canadian Press.)—The privy council of Canada has issued a formal vote of thanks to Vilhjalmar Stefansson, the Arctic explorer, acknowledging for the Canadian government the services which Mr. Stefansson has rendered the nation in exploring uncharted Canadian lands. The statement observes that in three expeditions in the last eleven years the explorer has added greatly to our knowledge of lands already known to exist and has discovered lands of large area previously unknown, thereby extending the boundaries of Canada. "His unique method of living on the country by forage has proved the northern hinterland to be less barren and hostile in climate than was previously believed."

Quote Tributes of Peary.

Referring to the award by the National Geographic Society of Washington, D.C., of the Hubbard Gold Medal to Mr. Stefansson, the statement quotes the tribute paid to the explorer by Rear-Admiral Robert E. Peary, the discoverer of the North Pole, who stated that "Stefansson has added more than 100,000 square miles to the maps of the northern region."

Say Provincial Ministers Not Under Federal Tax

Quebec, Feb. 16.—The government of Quebec has taken measures to determine if the federal parliament has authority to impose its income tax on provincial ministers and public servants. A test case will be made of federal income tax imposed upon Hon. J. E. Caron's salary as provincial minister of agriculture.

HARLEM THE SCENE OF PISTOL BATTLE

Scores of Shots Fired in Argument of Two Negroes, and Three Wounded.

New York, Feb. 16.—Two policemen and a civilian were shot today in a pistol fight with a negro in the heart of the Harlem business district. Scores of shots were fired during the melee, which resulted from an argument between the two negroes over the purchase of a pistol. The two policemen, who were but slightly hurt, aided by reserves and armed merchants, finally cornered the negro, James Bond, and beat him into submission. He was armed with two pistols and did not give up until he had exhausted his supply of ammunition.

COMMONS MAY DISCUSS "NO POLITICS" ORDER

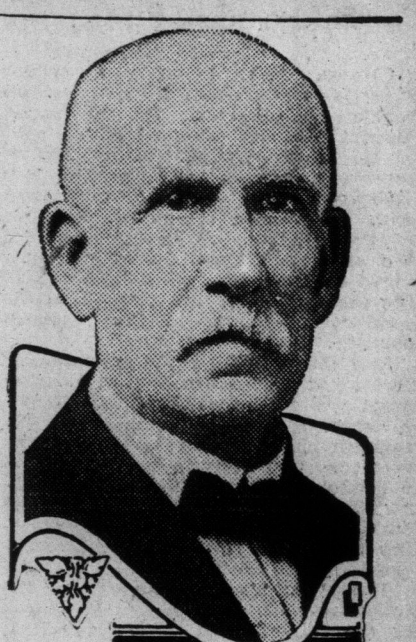
Ottawa, Feb. 16.—(By Canadian Press.)—The view is expressed here that the dispute between the management and employees of the Canadian National Railways arising from President D. B. Hanna's "no politics" order may be the subject of debate in the house of commons during the present session. Altho no definite information has been received as to the next step to be taken, it is thought that the employees would prefer to have their case placed before parliament, possibly by order of the Labor members, to taking immediate drastic action.

Hands All Round—For a Shine.

Mackenzie King and his newspaper friends have started a debate on Ottawa and in the press that every one in Canada wants an election more than anything else, and therefore "hands all round" to that end.

For Mr. King, he knows that it means his extinguishment—something for which he has no desire. And the house knows that. And The Globe knows it. But they want to keep themselves on the stage.

But the country and the people are largely sane, notwithstanding the war and its consequences; and they'd sooner see the country normal again, normal in business, normal in prices, normal in temperament and normal in outlook; and an unnecessary election would not settle things which only increase the unrest. There will be an election in due course. Why worry?

Provincial Financing.

The usual difference of view on budgets was in evidence on Monday, when the provincial treasurer, Mr. Smith, made his annual speech, showing deficits for the year of \$302,000.

Mr. Sinclair, a Liberal critic, expanded this amount to more than two and a half million. An old-time critic of financial statistics said it is not the figures that he, but the liars that figure, and the public will be left pretty much to themselves to decide whether the provincial treasurer is correct in his statement or whether Mr. Sinclair has any authority for his contentions.

Whatever may be actually said of the financial conditions of the province, it is certain that the farmers government has lived up to the usual reputations of orties. Oppositions of all varieties never find difficulty in making capital out of their arguments, but it is astonishing in the replacement of the criticized by the critics how easily they fall into the same failures. A few years ago the whole bone of contention in provincial affairs was the expenditure of ten million dollars by the province. This has now reached the sum of over twenty-five million, and there is really less criticism of this large sum than there was of the former figure.

The farmers, as a body, have been usually regarded as frugal in expenditure, but if the provincial government is representative of them, the adjective does not apply, and the new form of political badinage might be: "If there is any money to spend, leave it to the farmers."

We have not much complaint as to the amount to be expended, provided it is distributed in the interests of the province. The good old city of Toronto, however, has usual, is to be called upon to contribute its full quota to the increased revenue. The estimate of two new mills on the dollar on real estate transfers is estimated to bring in a quarter of a million dollars. In imposing this, the honorable Peter will do away with the camouflage going thru the registry offices for years, when the consideration was stated as "one dollar or other consideration." With this remedy applied, Commissioner Forman will be thankful that at last he has been able to get a better basis for making his assessment for taxing purposes.

Business Improving.

Altho there is unemployment abroad and unrest among the unions because of cuts in wages, there are signs that with some adjustments a revival in business is not distant. In Toronto, when we consider the seasonal out-of-work employees, the situation is not so acute as many were led to believe last fall. Many manufacturers experienced difficulties in keeping their works going because of the price changes which were bound to go into effect following the tremendous advances which occurred after the armistice. In the United States it is certain that the prices have been rectified to a large extent, and even in Canada reductions have been made which have established business on a surer foundation than a year ago.

With a world shortage in many necessities, it does not appear possible that there can be any period of business stagnation. Prices of most of the basic commodities are below cost, and this, if nothing else, should be an incentive to manufacturers to stock up and get ready for the revival which is coming along shortly. The automobile business, which received, perhaps, the severest check of all, is already recovering. Several plants in the United States are opening again, and in the big plant at Oshawa, great activity is reported in the belief that with the opening of spring this business will set back to full-time prosperity.

Helping Small Homes.

This year's city council makes no further headway with the housing question than last year, altho there are builders in the council who might give suggestions. It has been pointed out that the homes erected under the former housing commission were beyond the means of poorer citizens; that there should be a program of cheaper dwelling to suit them.

Outside of the city limits there are many homes which have come up from modest beginnings, finally enlarged into dwellings of good appearance. It seems to The World that there might be a method by which men could be advanced small amounts to make the beginnings of a home and with their own labor and the help of their fellows sufficiently finish them for occupation. Even two or three rooms of this kind with some sanitary fittings, would be better than present conditions where family after family are crissed in two or three rooms in the downtown quarters, without any provision for recreation for the children, and certainly not of a character to build up a healthy citizenship.

It is not too late, we think, to get the provincial legislature to give the city power to issue bonds for a reasonable amount to try out a method of this kind. Surely some of the members, and especially Controller Hiltz, who has had a good deal to do with business, ought to be able to develop an idea along this line. The farmers' government are planning to advance money to farmers; why are their labor supporters not asking for some help to workmen to start small homes?

The Arctic Oil Leases.

The government is modifying its rules and regulations in regard to the leasing of all lands in the north-west territories. They propose to keep a substantial interest in that country since the discoveries last fall. They are willing to give leases to the small number of applicants who have been in the country and have staked and filed claims in say about a hundred square miles and have paid in money on account thereof and have made arrangements for drilling. But much stricter rules are being framed for all new prospectors. Nor will any man or concern be allowed to monopolize the territory. Outside of the small territory first staked near Fort Norman, there will be strict limitations higher royalties and a three-fourths reservation for the state of all applications filed since those registered last fall. And the government still reserves the right to increase royalties at any time.

BRITISH SHIPYARDS ACHIEVED RECORD

618 Vessels of Over Two Million Tons Completed During Last Year.

London, Feb. 16.—All records for the construction of merchant vessels were broken by the yards of Great Britain during 1920, when 618 vessels, of 2,955,834 tons were completed.

The total for 1919 was exceeded by 435,182 tons and the previous record figures of 1914 by 142,371 tons, says Lloyd's register of shipbuilding.

The world's output for 1920 was 1,750 vessels of 5,861,668 tons, against 2,432 vessels of 7,144,549 tons in 1919, and 1,780 vessels of 3,332,382 tons in 1918.

A feature of the year has been the launching of 1,825,000 tons of vessels to be fitted with steam turbines, these figures representing one-third of the total world's output of steel steam tonnage.

The tonnage launched by Japan, Norway and Sweden during 1920 also shows a decrease, but the output of other countries increased in comparison to 1919.

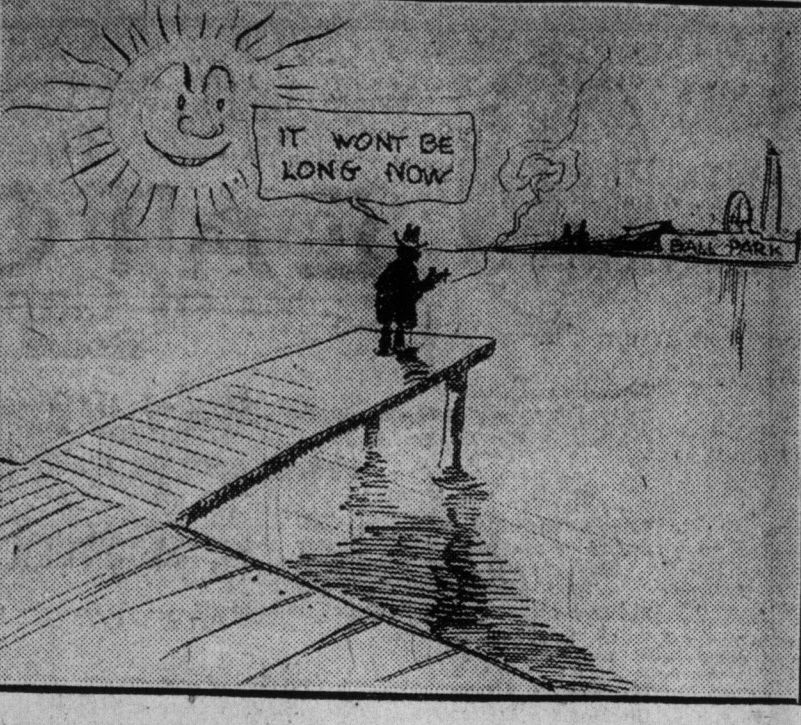

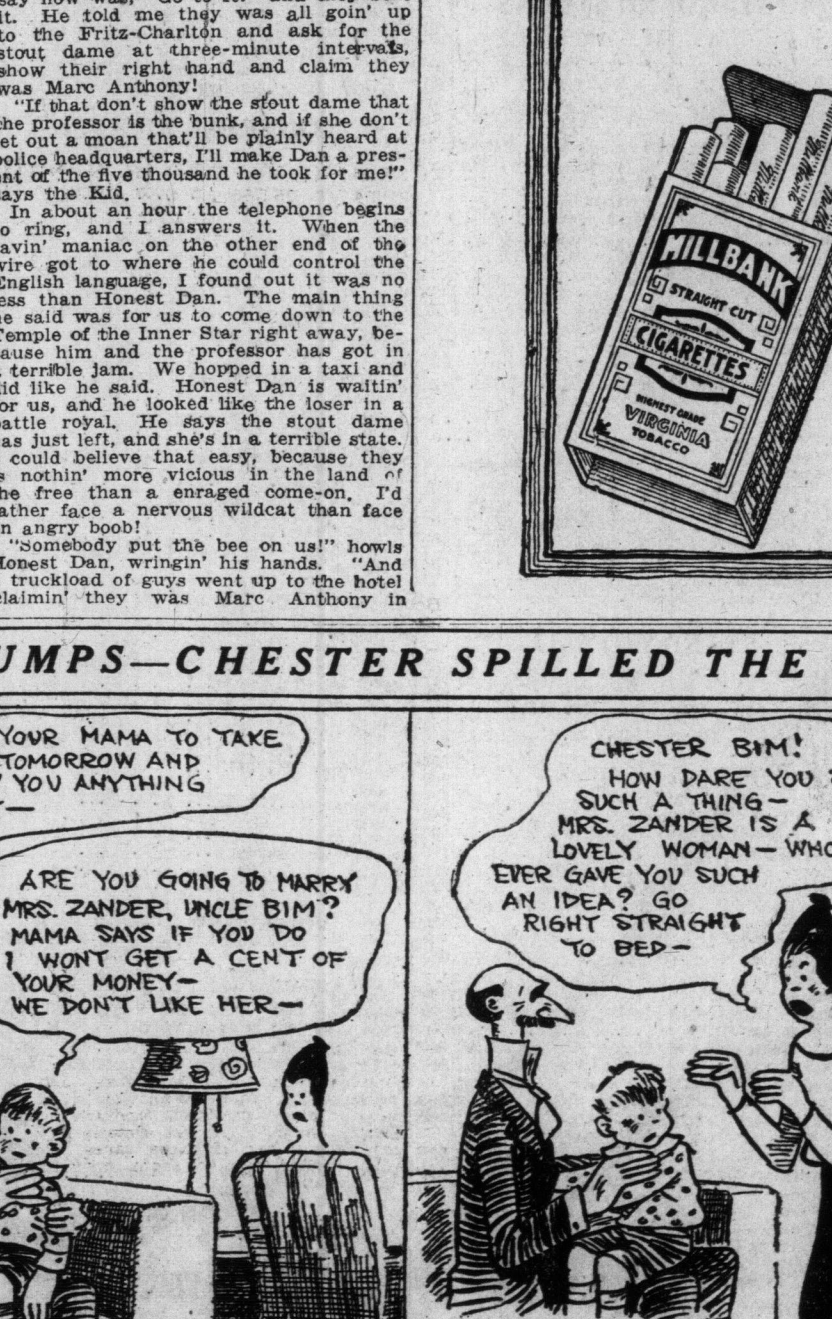

CALL MONEY RELAXES, STOCKS CLOSE STRONG

Earlier in the Day Uncertainty Was Much in Evidence With Public Interest Restricted to Better-Known Investment Issues—Reading Shares Less Conspicuous.

New York, Feb. 16.—The uncertain course of prices during today's sluggish stock market session expressed in greater measure the conflicting views of professional operators. Public interest or spirit was restricted to the better-known investment issues in the transportation division. Reading shares were less conspicuous in the day's narrow movements, but the trend of those issues plainly reflected disappointment at the terms outlined in the company's plan to segregate its coal properties. Heaviness of certain issues, notably Baldwin Locomotive, General Motors, Allied Chemical, South Porto Rico Sugar and several of the equipment, was directly traceable to poor earnings, pressing financial needs and reduced dividends. Oils and food issues continued to be influenced by trade conditions. Some of the former recorded further recessions on additional price cuts, while the latter improved as schedules for refined products were revised upward.

CEMENT WAS STRONGER DESPITE THE STATEMENT

The Toronto stock market is in a waiting position following the concentrated movement of a week ago. Prices of the fractions were then put up with a vim that was thought sufficient to widen the outside speculative and investment fields. The result was not quite achieved and the market is now settling on the basis of the new values. In the case of the cement, the Montreal failure, the weakness in papers and the collapse in oil steamers are the earmarks of a bull campaign, and the market in a general way has been pretty well liquidated or prices would not stand up as well as they do.

The morning market was quite active, and perhaps the surprise of the day was the strength of cement, which, after selling freely at 87, ran up three points before the close to 90. The Mackay statement had no apparent influence as the shares were selling at around received levels, and it seems nothing but a cheaper money market would act as a bull factor again with considerable sales as high as 18,750. Steel Corporation held firm, and Steel of Canada was stronger. Paper stocks with Abitibi in prominence, developed a further weakness and was down to 46, and Spanish River common to 47. Steamers was steadier yesterday, and there was less activity in the fraction the only feature was Porto Rico, which brought 46 on sales of 300 shares.

Cement Up at Montreal; Paper Stocks Are Weak

Montreal, Feb. 16.—Strength in Cement and weakness in paper stocks were the features of today's trading on the local stock exchange. The former was up 3 1/2 points net, to 90, at which it closed. Other substantial gains in the afternoon point jump of Loyall, to 74, the first gain since Feb. 11, and a 14-point gain for Montreal Tramways, to 140. 1 1/2 for B. C. Fishing, to 47. In the papers, Abitibi was down 2 1/2, to 47; Spanish common lost 2 1/4 points, to 46, and the preferred was down 1/2 point, to 88. Laurentide lost a point, to 80, and St. Maurice Paper, recently inactive, was down a point, to 31 1/2.
