Spectacular Leadership of The **Russian Commander Brought To Close**

Emperor Now Rules Over Whole Forces on Land and Sea-Most Important Change in Command Since War Opened Except For Retirement of Von Moltke by Kaiser Early in Course of Hostilities

Petrograd, Sept. 8—Grand Duke Nicholas has been transerred to the Caucasus by Emperor Nicholas.

CZAR RULES FORCES ON LAND AND SEA

London, Sept. 8—Emperor Nicholas has assumed command not only of the military but the next forces of Russia. An army order issued and signed by the emperor, is quoted as follows by Renters' correspondent at Petrograd:

"Today I have taken supreme command of all my forces of the sea and land armies operating in the theatre of war.

"With firm faith in the elemency of God and with unshaken assumence of final victory, we shall fulfill our sacred duty to defend our country to the last. We shall not dishonor the Russian land.

MORNING WAR SUMMARY

London, Sept. 7—The news that Emperor Nicholas had placed himself at the head of his army, which he announced in a telegram to Raymond Poincare, president of France, and the visit paid by the French commander-in-chief, General Joffre, to the Italian army, foreshadow, it is believed in military circles here, stirring events on both the eastern and western fronts in which the armies of

Amid the Pripet marshes the German Field Marshal, Mackensen, is working hard for a decisive result. He reports that he has taken two Russian positions.

Still another battle is being fought for the triangle of fortifications further south, of which Rovno and Dubno remain in the hands of the Russians. The Austrians and Russians are facing each other across the Serethriver in Galicia.


