



Guns Mounted on the Wings.

These "hush hush" craft vary from wonderful scout machines that will operate from the decks of the queerlooking aircraft-carriers with which the navy is now equipped, to Dreadnoughts of the air, manned by a crew of seven, able to remain at sea for two or three days, and carrying bombs, torpedoes and several machine-guns. In the latest types of aerial Dreadnoughts machine-guns are fitted in the wings. This gives the gunners a complete field in which to operate. There is no "blind spot," and attacking planes will not be able to "sit on the tail" of the flying ship with immunity from attack.

Other wonder craft are also being

Other wonder craft are also being built. There is a five-seater which is intended primarily for coast defense work. It will be able to take a hand in warding off either sea or air craft. Because of that it has not been designed on specialist lines. It will carry out reconnaissance work, swoop down when traveling at nearly three miles a minute, and fire torpedoes or drop bombs on battleships or other seacraft. In several of these new machines it is intended to fit the new 1,000-h.p. Napler Cub engine, the most powerful aero motor that has yet been actually and successfully flown. An engine that will develop 3,000-h.p. and having only 12 cylinders, has recently been the subject of experimental bench tests.

Fears Disaster Because of Religious Issue Raised in Convention.

The nomination of John W. Davis and Charles W. Bryan has split Tammany, says the New York-Herald Tribune. Two of the most important figures in Tamamny Hall, Senator James J. Walker, majority leader of the states senate, and Representative John J. O'Connor, who hails from the home district of the late Charles F. Murphy, did not attend the night session of the Democratic convention when the brother of William Jennings Bryan was nominated for vice-president.

Representative O'Connor, who was taken under Mr. Murphy's protecting wing after his graduation from Harvard, protested against any of New York's votes being cast for Davis, shouting on the convention floor:

"Remember the telephone rate raise!"

IN 14TH POSITION

Cuthbert was 13th in Marathon-Canada Fourth in 1,600 Metres Relay.

Canada's two Marathoners, Victor MacAuley of Windsor, N. S., and John Cuthbert, the young Guelph Scotchman, did very well in the blue ribbon event on Sunday at Paris when they finished fourteenth and thirteenth, respectively, out of the 58 who completed the gruelling 26-miles course. Cuthbert had cramps and was compelled to walk a mile for a cup of hot coffee at St. Ouen but later pulled back into the race in 17th position which he reduced to 13th. MacAuley also developed trouble six miles out, but a glass of milk at each station helped him to finish fourteenth.

Canada's hopes in the wrestling tournament died Sunday with the elimination of Stockton and Chilcott by two United States grapplers.

In the 1,600 metres relay race, Canada finished fourth. While no definite word has been received here yet, it is understood that "Billy" Maynes, St. John's entry, was in this race. The United States won this event in 2 minutes, 16 seconds—a world's record. Sweden was second and Great Britain was third. France was fifth and Italy sixth.

Chief interest today was centred in the marathon. This was manifested not only by the crowd of 25,000 in the stadium, which sent the band of 58 runners off late in the afternoon and nearly three hours later acclaimed as the conquering hero the sturdy Finn, Stenroos as he strode first through the portal, but also along the 26 miles of roadside, where probably one hundred thousand more saw the great struggle. Over the first half of the winding hill and dale journey to the little

hill and dale journey to the little French village of Pontoise and return French village of Pontoise and return the lead changed several times, the glory of the old Greek marathon runners being revived in the first kilometres by Kranis, whi set the pace until he was succeeded first, for a short distance by De Mar, United States and then by Verger, of France, who gained the plaudit of his countrymen lining the course, until the ultimate victory of Stepross, who took the lead at the Finnish star, running smoothly and apparently without great strain on his powers, despite the heat which nearly equalled that of yesterday, added to his

Through crowded lanes, over the ast stages of the journey, never slackning his pace, whether on upgrade, over side paths or the cobblestones of the village streets, Stenroos was vocieriously greeted, but except to a familiar shout from some countrymen, he seemed oblivious to everything but keeping a straight course and a steady bace.

While practically half the field had dropped out in the closing half of the race, and others were barely able to keep going, Stenroos came into the stadium track running strongly, and, after breaking the tape, raced around the field to acknowledge his countrymen's greetings before trotting to his quarters.





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
