Maddened By Hunger And Illness Many Japanese Resort To Suicide

Osaka, Sept. 11—An Eastern News Agency despatch to the Osaka Asahi from Tokio says that many of the hundreds of refugees gathered in Ueno Park, Tokio, have committed suicide as a result of hunger and exposure. Most of the refugees are exhausted and only a few are able to walk and these are fleeing to Nippori, where tens of thousands of other refugees are collected. A large number of women and children are reported to be lying helpless near the Nippori Railway station, unable to continue their flight.

Jugo-Slavia in line with the demands made for a settlement setting Sept. 15 as the date for a reply, even employing forceful means if necessary to end what she regards as an intolerable situation imperilling peace.

Rome, Sept. 11.—It was announced in a semi-official statement today that Italy is not prepared to consider any mediation or arbitration of her differences with Jugo-Slavia with regard to the status of Fiume, since the question is held to be one for direct settlement between the two countries.

Fire Danger In Ont.

Is Closely Watched

Toronto, Sept. 11.—Every precaution against the possible recurrence of the Northern Ontario holacaust of last October which cost many lives and did damage estimated at over \$6,000,000 is being taken this year by the Ontario government. The Department of Forests intends that the fire patrols will continue this year until every prestige of danger is passed, even if such a policy should involve retaining the services of the fire rangers until well on into October. At present almost 1,200 fire rangers are patrolling the Ontario woods.





Department of Agriculture Gives Advice to Housewives for Fall Preserving.

Fall Preserving.

The approach of the Fall canning and preserving season has induced the United States Department of Agriculture to issue pamphlets of information for the benefit of those preparing fruits and vegetables for Winter use. Many hundreds of thousands of housewives know how to preserve food so that it will remain in excellent condition for a long time, but there are many who are not capable of testing containers so that blemishes in them may not cause the preserved food to spoil. A study of the various receptacles for preserved food has convinced the experts of the department that for home use glass jars are more economical than tin, because they can be used repeatedly and, with care, will last for a long time. But the rubber rings must be new each season. It does not pay- to use them a second time since the spoilage frequently resulting much more than offsets the cost of new rubbers.

"It must be remembered," say the experts, "that modern methods of canning constitute a much more severe test for endurance of rubbers than does the "open-kettle" procedure, since the rubber now has to withstand moist heat for a number of hours in canning some garden products."

Stress is laid on the necessity of having the rubber rings of first rate quality. They may be tested, it is explained, "by inserting forefingers and stretching the ring. Van Fleet, managing editor, was given \$2,000, Henry C. Schaffner, treasurer, \$1,000 and James C. Woods, circulation manager, \$1,000.

Trinity Baptist Church, of which Mr. Harding was a trustee, was left \$2,000 and St. Paul's Episconal Church, which stands next to the Star offlice, was given \$1,000.

The sum of \$25,000 was left to the Marion Park Commission, "to be applied in the creation of some permanent improvement to be determined by the commission and to be erected in any one of the three parks in Marion," Residue to Brothers and Sisters.

All the residue of the estate is left to Mr. Harding, three sisters, Mrs. Carolyny Ortaw of Washington, Mrs. Charity M. Remsberg of St. Anne, Calif, and Miss Abjuil Harding of Marion, and to his brother, Dr. George T. Harding, Tr., of Columbus, "share and sisters.

The book also contains a list of the Canadian Trade Commissioners and British Consuls. The produce export section gives an extended list of exporters of fruits, dairy products, live stock, eggs, poultry, fish, grain, hay, potatoes and seeds. It is not a complete list, but of much value. There is also a list of forty leading industries, showing cost of materials and gross value.

The Trade Index is a very comprehensive book of nearly 900 pages, and should prove of great value in connection with the extension of Canadian trade. It is supplemented by the services of the Commercial Intelligence Lepartment of the Association, which maintains a monthly revision of information schedules for the benefit of all enquirers.

the invention of two residents of Milwaukee, Christopher Latham Sholes and Carlos Glidden who began their invention labors in 1867, but it was six years before they were able to produce a machine which was deemed sufficiently perfected for manufacture. In the meantime an interest in the enterprise had been purchased by James Densmore, a practical man whose confidence in the future of the machine was unbounded, and it was his invincible faith which encouraged Sholes to persevere in his enterprise. Early in 1873 Densmore brought the inventors model to the gun works of E. Remington & Sons, at Ilion, N. Y., and succeeded in persuading the Remingtons to undertake its manufacture. The actual manufacture began on September 12th of the same year, the fiftieth anniversary of which date is to be commemorated in the approaching celebration. The first completed machines were ready for sale early in the following year.

The new machine, however, had a long road to travel before the world became convinced that it was a real necessity in modern business. Mark Twain, one of the first purchasers, called it a "curiosity breeding little joker." The average person objected to the idea of paying \$125 for a writing implement when pens could be bought for a penny, and to convince the world that the new invention was worth its price as a time and labor saver was a toilsome work of educa-

cluding not only correspondence, but form, tabular and statistical work. The typewriter accounting machines are also used for every variety of combined writing and adding. The latter day use of the typewriter has transcended the business field and the portable typewriters have attained an equal popularity with the personal user. Geographically the employment of the typewriter is just as extensive, for it is in every day use for the writing of over one hundred languages, and is familiar sight in every corner of the civilized world. Everywhere and for every purpose where thought is recorded in written language it has made itself indispensable to human needs.

As truly as Abraham Lincoln struck the shackles from the negro slaves, so truly did Sholes emancipate both business and womanhood from their former limitations. This two-fold service ren-



London, Sept. 11.—Senator George Lynch-Staunton K. C., Hamilto Ont., in the course of a letter to the Morning Post dwells on the bad condition of trade in Great Britain areasy unless England can open marke

The total apple crop in this province will not be over 40 per cent. of that of last year. In the lower St. John River district the crop is estimated at from 30 per cent. to 40 per cent. of the 1922 crop. Early varieties such as Astrachaan, Dudley, Duchess, Wealthy, Transparent and Alexander, are estimated at 50 per cent. of 1922, while late varieties such as Bishop Pippin, Spies, Ben Davis, McIntosh and Fameuse will not exceed 30 per cent. of last year. The fruit is not as large as usual but it is quite clean. In the St. John Valley from Westfield to Fredericton the crop will not exceed 40 per cent. of 1922. Duchess, Dudley and Wealthy vary from 50 per cent. to 80 per cent. Alexander, Wolf River and Fameuse are over 20 per cent., McIntosh 30 per cent., but Bishop Pippin will be a full crop. The fruit is medium in size generally clean and of good color. Pears and plums are almost a total failure.

Nova Scotia.

The apple grop conditions in Nova Scotia still continue favorable but there has been a considerable development of apple spot and the Aphis and Green Apple Bug have done some injury. The estimates now therefore place the grop at about 1,600,000 barrels or 200,000 barrels less than one month ago. The fruit is ripening 10 days later than last year, but is coloring fairly well. The present indications are that the apples will be smaller this year although the weather now is favorable for growth. A heavy wind on August 22nd destroyed probably 60,000 barrels with Duchess, Gravenstein, Blenheims, Fallawater and Starks suffering the most.





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
