

Outport Citizens for Upper House

There are several vacancies in the Legislative Council at present, and The Guardian advocates and recommends the appointment of some resident outport citizens to fill the vacancies.

At the present time all the members of the Legislative Council are residents of one place—St. John's. We are fully cognizant of the opinions of large numbers of city folk that St. John's is "it" in Newfoundland, but really we believe the outport people should assert themselves a little more than they do and let the city folk know that the outports are awake.

We are so self-satisfied and easy-going that we don't seem to worry no matter how things go. And the wonder is that things in Newfoundland are not far worse than they are. We would suggest to our outport contemporaries (not that we think it will have any effect) to join with us in advocating for outport citizens to be appointed to fill the vacancies in the Legislative Council.

We also agree with a city contemporary when it says that Hon. Dr. Skelton should be appointed president of that chamber.

American Battleship Gets Trials

Washington, Feb. 5.—The new monster super-dreadnought U.S.S. Pennsylvania, one of the most powerful battleships afloat, began her trials off the Maine coast.

The Pennsylvania displaces 31,400 tons, is 608 feet over all, 97 feet in breadth and will, if she fulfills her contract agreement, be capable of developing 31 knots. Her main battery consists of twelve 14 inch guns in four turrets, and four submerged torpedo boats.

Germans Perish

It is a sorry spectacle when men lose faith in one another. Only a few days ago a case in point happened. The crew of a British trawler sighted 20 Germans clinging to a wrecked Zeppelin airship floating in the North Sea. The Germans asked to be taken off, but the trawler's crew, knowing themselves to be outnumbered by the Germans, and also knowing the awful brutal crimes perpetrated by them, would not take any chances and left the Germans to their fate.

The trawler's crew however sailed to port and informed the naval authorities who sent ships to search for the Germans, but a storm came on and those on the airship no doubt perished—because the Britishers had no faith in them—could not trust them.

The aircraft was no doubt returning from the air-raid to England, after dropping bombs on undefended towns and killed 61 innocent men, women and children.

**Crimean Veteran's
Ruse**

In the Trenches at 82

A Glasgow correspondent of the Evening Standard relates how a Crimean veteran, one of the "Thin Red Line," managed to get to the trenches in France, and actually, in his 82nd year, take a shot or two at the enemy.

The old pensioner, whose name is Deas, wrote some time ago to the War Office asking permission to visit his son in the trenches, explaining that, as one of the "Thin Red Line," he desired to see for himself what trench warfare was, as compared with the trenches before Sebastopol. Though the War Office was unable to gratify his ambition, Deas was not dismayed, and being acquainted with a doctor who was going to France, he persuaded the medico to take him with him as his servant. As Deas is still erect and hale the doctor ungrudgingly got him to France. Arrived there, he was given a look at his son in the trenches, and was also allowed, to quote his own language, to "smell powder once more and take several pot shots at the enemy."

Newport News, Feb. 4.—Lieut. Berge, commanding the prize ship Appam, talked for the first time to night of his capture and the capture of the trader Pongu, insisting she was the Moewe.

He confirmed the accounts of his capture of seven English vessels and declared he had nothing to say regarding his future plans.

Efforts Unsuccessful

Mrs. Maud Mercer, of this town, made an effort recently to organize a Health Club. She had difficulty at first in securing a place to meet, but the C. of E. Academy was kindly loaned for that purpose.

But in public life a number of things seem to be arranged with as hard as possible. So it is with our public buildings—a building erected out of the money of the taxpayers of the country.

Care of Clothes

Slip Your Garments on a Hanger Instead of a Chair Back

Never leave your suits or dresses lying on a chair or on the bed rail, but put a hanger in them the minute you take them off. It is simply a matter of habit, and it is just as easy to learn to slip a hanger into your coat and put it in the closet at once as it is to throw it on a chair, to hang up later. Creases and wrinkles wear out the cloth, and the only way to keep your clothes free of wrinkles is to hang them up when you remove them.

Shoes, too, retain their shape much longer if they are kept in them. You can always tell the shoes which are neglected by their wrinkled, shaggy look. It is a matter of a moment or two to slip shoe trees into your boots when you take them off, and this will prevent the leather from relaxing.

Footgear, which has the acquaintance with shoe trees usually slips and breaks twice as quickly as the well cared for variety. If you will rub a little vaseline into your shoes when new it will prevent the damp and wet from splitting the leather.

When your untended shoes become worn from the rain do not let them stay wrinkled, but press them with a hot iron before they become dry. By this way, it is a real economy to invest in a good durable raincoat, because it will protect your suits and frocks to a great extent and will actually save you money.

Make Delicious Date Bread

Mix one cupful of warm wheat wash, one fourth cupful of brown sugar, one half teaspoonful of salt and one tablespoonful of butter. Then add one-fourth yeast cake broken in pieces and dissolved in one-fourth cupful of lukewarm water, and two and one-fourth cupfuls of bread flour, once sifted. Toss on a slightly floured board and knead. Return to the mixing bowl to rise for one hour. In the morning cut of dates stoned and put in pieces and two-thirds cupful of chopped English walnut meats. Shaped into a loaf, put in buttered bread pan, cover and again let rise. Bake in a moderate oven fifty minutes.—Woman's Home Companion.

Russian Operations

Petrograd, Jan. 31.—The Russian Caucasian operations are widening facilities to the westward and toward a semi-official opinion on the junction being formed with the British Mesopotamia expedition.

The Russians have advanced, pushing west of Melazbert, where an important town of Khynskala, 50 miles south of Erzerum, has been captured. At the same time progress has been reported in the direction of Van, likewise toward Urmiah, where it is officially announced that the Turks have been repulsed with heavy loss. Erzurum, southeast of the region of Kars, another Russian victory is reported. Although broken, mountainous country, the latter positions are not far removed from the head of the British column in the vicinity of Kut-al-Amar.

It is pointed out that the Turks evidently lack a junction, this being indicated by the retreat towards Mush of a large part of their army that was recently reported to have been routed. The evident purpose of the move being to cover Bitlis and Diarbekir.

It is admitted that the recent successes of the Russians in the Caucasus operations thus far are not of great strategic importance, but are regarded as having a notable morale effect upon the Turkish troops.



Letter from Naval Reservist G. W. Thompson
 Malta, Dec. 24th,
 Dear Wife,—It is a long time since I have had the privilege of telling you any news because our letters are censored. Since I left England I have seen a great deal of the world and a lot of the war. I joined my ship at Belfast, Ireland. From there I went to Gibraltar. From Gibraltar I went to the coast of Africa, then to Egypt, Malta, and from there to Mudros in Greece and to the Dardanelles. I shall always remember my first time going in off the Gallipoli shores. I was leaning over one of the big guns not knowing we were so near the Turks when a large shell dropped near the ship's side, right abreast of where I was standing, followed by a rain of shrapnel on our decks. We all got orders to take cover. A few minutes later action was sounded and we rushed to our guns. My gun was on the quarter deck, a 9.2 inch, and soon we were sending great shells among the Turks, firing 7 guns at once, what we call salvo firing.
 Before we were long in action one of our casemate 6-inch guns on the mess deck was knocked in on the deck, but only 2 of the crew were wounded, one chap losing his foot.
 On Aug. 2nd we started to land 60,000 troops at Suvla Bay. Then our greatest fighting began—For 11 days and nights we never got below even at night. One haul from each gun would bring the cocoa from 10 pm. until 3 a.m. We would take turns to lie down on deck to get a nap.
 We had lots of shells and shrapnel flying around us. On Aug. 12th one high explosive shell came on board and exploded killing 9 and wounding 27. I was among the wounded. When I was falling I said to myself, I am shot. It was all fire and smoke, and all I could hear was men shouting and moaning from their wounds. I managed to get on my feet, helped by a comrade, and saw the awful sight of dead and wounded, some with their legs and arms off and others with their eyes blown out, and blood flowing like water on the deck. It was a sight one don't want to see again.
 I had three wounds, one in my head. We were put on a hospital ship and sent to Malta hospital, where I had to go under an operation to have a piece of shell extracted from my head which was resting on the bone.
 I have been through the worst of this war, for as it was often said, The Dardanelles was hell on earth, for all you could see and hear was fire and the thundering of thousands of guns. I have seen hundreds fall on the battle field. In one landing of troops men fell at the rate of 600 per hour until 6,000 lay on the ground.
 This is Christmas Eve and there are lots of decorating going on. Yesterday I made an arch to stand on the marble top of the large square stove in a hall here. Decorations of all kinds were brought here until we had to deny them.
 Give my best respects and love to my parents, children, relations and friends, and receive the same yourself.
 May Britain's banner wave Proudly o'er the true and brave. Keep your hearts with love alight. Happy friendships, memories bright. Gladness reign from shore to shore From this Christmas eve more.

Letter from Naval Reservist G. W. Thompson
 Malta, Dec. 24th,
 Dear Wife,—It is a long time since I have had the privilege of telling you any news because our letters are censored. Since I left England I have seen a great deal of the world and a lot of the war. I joined my ship at Belfast, Ireland. From there I went to Gibraltar. From Gibraltar I went to the coast of Africa, then to Egypt, Malta, and from there to Mudros in Greece and to the Dardanelles. I shall always remember my first time going in off the Gallipoli shores. I was leaning over one of the big guns not knowing we were so near the Turks when a large shell dropped near the ship's side, right abreast of where I was standing, followed by a rain of shrapnel on our decks. We all got orders to take cover. A few minutes later action was sounded and we rushed to our guns. My gun was on the quarter deck, a 9.2 inch, and soon we were sending great shells among the Turks, firing 7 guns at once, what we call salvo firing.
 Before we were long in action one of our casemate 6-inch guns on the mess deck was knocked in on the deck, but only 2 of the crew were wounded, one chap losing his foot.
 On Aug. 2nd we started to land 60,000 troops at Suvla Bay. Then our greatest fighting began—For 11 days and nights we never got below even at night. One haul from each gun would bring the cocoa from 10 pm. until 3 a.m. We would take turns to lie down on deck to get a nap.
 We had lots of shells and shrapnel flying around us. On Aug. 12th one high explosive shell came on board and exploded killing 9 and wounding 27. I was among the wounded. When I was falling I said to myself, I am shot. It was all fire and smoke, and all I could hear was men shouting and moaning from their wounds. I managed to get on my feet, helped by a comrade, and saw the awful sight of dead and wounded, some with their legs and arms off and others with their eyes blown out, and blood flowing like water on the deck. It was a sight one don't want to see again.
 I had three wounds, one in my head. We were put on a hospital ship and sent to Malta hospital, where I had to go under an operation to have a piece of shell extracted from my head which was resting on the bone.
 I have been through the worst of this war, for as it was often said, The Dardanelles was hell on earth, for all you could see and hear was fire and the thundering of thousands of guns. I have seen hundreds fall on the battle field. In one landing of troops men fell at the rate of 600 per hour until 6,000 lay on the ground.
 This is Christmas Eve and there are lots of decorating going on. Yesterday I made an arch to stand on the marble top of the large square stove in a hall here. Decorations of all kinds were brought here until we had to deny them.
 Give my best respects and love to my parents, children, relations and friends, and receive the same yourself.
 May Britain's banner wave Proudly o'er the true and brave. Keep your hearts with love alight. Happy friendships, memories bright. Gladness reign from shore to shore From this Christmas eve more.
