Miramichi Advance. CHATHAM, SEPTEMBER 29, 1881. "Advance" Scientific Miscellany.

Experiments have been made in Paris with a new kind of military telegraph, which consists simply in reading large letters by a telescope. It is hoped to succeed at 60 miles distance.

A Neapolitan gardener, after years of experiment has produced a camellia with a delicate perfume, and thinks it probable that those flowers may in the near future be so cultivated as to rival the rose in fragrance.

Marble is generally considered to be a very rich material. A remarkable case, however, is given by M. Guibord, in which a marble slab at one side of a door in the Alhambra of Grenada has been bent considerably out of shape by superincumbent weight, without breaking. The slab is ten feet high, nine inches broad and two inches thick.

Astronomers expect the reappearance before long of a remarkable variable star, which was observed in 945, 1264 and 1572. This star was seen at its last appearance by Tycho Brahe, who reported that it became suddenly so brilliant as to be seen at noon, then gradually faded away, and was lost to view in about sixteen months after it was first observed.

A singular effect upon plants by the wind was lately witnessed in the district about Colmar. The air was still during the night and morning, the temperature being about sixty-four degrees Fahr., the time July 26th. At ten o'clock in the morning, a southeast wind began to blow, increasing in violence, and the temperature rose to eighty-four degrees. Its effect was like that of a spring frost on the flowers and tender leaves of many plants. In twenty minutes some flowers were completely browned. The phenomenon does not appear to have been due to dryness of the wind.

In a lecture delivered some time ago, Prof. L. W. Peck, to illustrate the explosiveness of a mixture of dust and air said: "If a large log of wood were ignited, it might be a week before being entirely consumed. Split it up into cord wood, and pile it up loosely, and it would burn in a couple of hours. Again, split it up into kindling wood, pile it up loosely, and perhaps it would burn in less than an hour. Cut it up into shavings and allow a strong wind to throw them in the air or in any way separate the chips comparatively well kept from each other, and the log would, perhaps, be consumed in two or three minutes; or, finally, grind it up into a fine dust or powder, blow it in such a manner that each particle is surrounded by air, and it would burn in less than a second."

M. Trompeau has lately made numerous experiments with head-gear, in its relation to heat from the sun. He reaches these conclusions, which may serve as useful hints: 1. Head-coverings of conical and rounded form are cooler than those of flat shape; the helmet is accordingly preferable to the kepi in hot climates. 2. A thick body, formed of a substance which conducts heat badly, protects effectually against the sun's rays. 3. No metal should be used in the construction of head-gear. 4. A good ventilation, obtained by means of lateral air-holes at the top, and a gallery at the base, isolating the head, causes a very sensible lowering of the interior temperature. A head-cover of bad construction may be made cool by good ventilation.

In his address before the British Association of Science at its recent fifty-first annual meeting, Sir John Lubbock, the president, said: "Summing up the principal results which have been attained in the last half-century, we may mention (over and over the accumulation of facts) the theory of evolution, the antiquity of man, and the far greater antiquity of the physical forces and the conservation of energy; spectrum analysis and its application to celestial physics; and the higher algebra and the modern geometry; lastly, the innumerable applications of science to practical life--as, for instance, in photography, the locomotive engine, the electric telegraph, the spectroscopic, and, most recently, the electric light and the telephone."

Seemingly, whose observations have been confirmed by Stoney and Sir W. Thomson, calculates that each molecule of hydrogen measures, at the most, not more than the fifty-millionth of an inch in diameter--a minuscule of which we can form absolutely no conception. With the most powerful microscopes, lines ruled on glass the ninety-thousandth of an inch apart can be perceived, although confusion of the lines begins at the seventy-four-thousandth of an inch, rendering distinct vision beyond that limit impossible with any instrument now known. Sorely believes that a length of one eighty-thousandth of an inch would contain from five hundred to two thousand molecules--say, five hundred in albumen and two thousand in water. It appears, therefore, that the smallest spore of organic matter clearly visible in the most powerful microscopes would contain many millions of molecules of albumen or water.
