Wm. Scott Pays the Penalty for Killing

CHALLENGE AGAIN

Under American Rules, Which He Declares Obsolete - Willing to Try Under International Rules.

BELFAST, June 14.—In view of the renewal of the rumors that he was preparing again to challenge for the American's cup, Sir Thomas Lipton in an interview today made it quite clear that he had no intention of competing under present conditions.

"No man will build a boat to sail under conditions that are or should be past," Sir Thomas said, "I am always willing to give the Americans the advantage of their own universal rule under which they have had experience in building and sailing, and I am ready to challenge thereunder. But I will not try again under the rule of fifty-six years ago. If I challenge under the international rules governing Europe they would say I had a "pull."





A HUGE EXCAVATOR

The excavation of the New York State barge canal is being done on some sections by machine of unusual capacity. Conspicuous among these is a bridge conveyor, sometimes known as the grab machine. It consists essentially of a cantilever tridge, 428 feet in length and 90 feet in depth, supported on two travelling towers, and a grab bucket of truly Cyclonean dimensions operated from the cantilever. The bucket weighs 17 tons empty, and its jaws when extended are 20 feet apart, and measure 10 feet in width. The capacity of this huge maw is a dozen cubic yards or from 12 to 15 tons at each bite. The jaws crunch together with an ultimate closing power of 137 tons.


Prices of Manitoba and Ontario Brands dentical for First Time.
