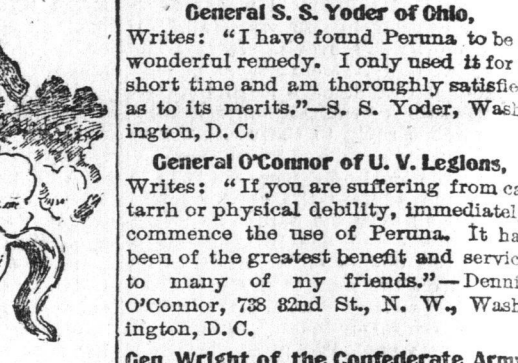

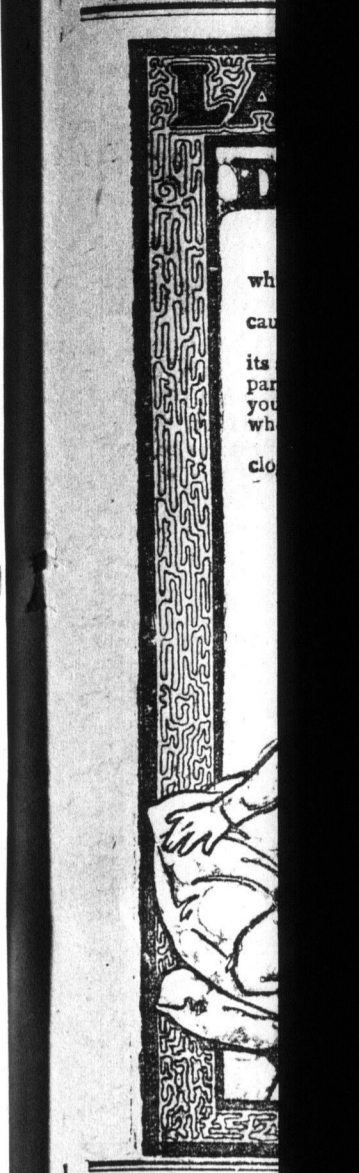
COLONEL HAD A POOR AIM. Fired Three Shots at a Girl But Only Slightly Wounded Her.
