

THREE FISHING BOATS.

BY REV. JOHN G. LAMBERT. "Cast the net on the right side of the boat and ye shall find."—John xxi. 6. (N.Y.)

Many of you when you were away for your summer holidays were staying at the seaside, and one of your chief pleasures there was to go out in a boat, especially if you had lines and bait so that you could "go a-baiting." I dare say you have noticed, when two of you were fishing from opposite sides of the boat, that a man in the fish came only to the one line; and left the other utterly alone, until you began to think that the right side of the boat must be a better side to fish from than the left.

Last summer I was staying on the shores of Loch Fyne, and often, when I was out in the loch in the evening, I saw a shoal of mackerel or herring passing quite near. Sometimes on one side of the boat the water would be perfectly calm, not a fish to be seen; but on the other it seemed almost to be boiling with the jumping fish.

Now, I want to speak to you for a few minutes about casting the net on the right side of the boat. I wish you to imagine that you are all fishermen, some of the New Testament sort that we are all to be builders, and again that we are all to be travellers.

Let me tell you of three boats in which boys and girls go out to fish. The first I would call the School-boat.

As soon as you are old enough you are put into this boat and launched out upon the wide sea; and your duty in this boat is to catch something, "can you tell me what it is? I think the name of it is Knowledge. You would be very poor and helpless creatures by-and-by in this busy world if you had no knowledge.

But how are you to get this precious thing which is called knowledge? You must cast your net on the right side of the boat. For there is a right side and a wrong side in this school-boat.

Some of the bigger boys have left school now. We never see them going along the road, as they used to do, with large bundles of books. They have given up wearing their school caps and have taken to felt hats; and they start by train every morning along with the city men. And some of you, I know, have just finished your school days, and are looking out at present for something to do.

Well, in this business-boat there is a right side and a wrong side. The wrong side is the side of carelessness, and unpunctuality, and dishonesty. The right side is the very opposite of all these things. And if you cast your net on the right side of the boat, if you listen to the voice of Christ, and do what He tells you, you are certain to succeed. You may not make a great pile of money, nor a rich man; but you will find a blessing upon your labor, and enable you to serve your own generation according to his will.

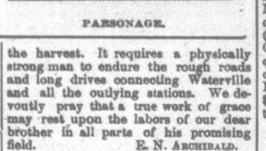
