

FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS GAIN IN STUMPAGE REVENUE

Sixty Per Cent. of the Average Lumber Cut Will Give Nearly \$240,000.00 Stumpage Revenue---This is the Result of Honest Administration by the Surveyor General's Department---Lumbermen are Willing to Pay When They Know All Are Treated Alike---Stumpage Will be Collected On About One Hundred and Ninety Million Feet.

Speaking at the St. John county nomination meeting Tuesday, Mr. Hazen made the statement that, though the timber cut of the province for the past winter was below the average, the stumpage revenue would be above that of any previous year. The highest previous record was last year, and this income was increased by the change dovernment just at the end of the lumber season. Nearly \$10,000 was added to the revenue by correcting the return of the scaler of one operator whose cut had been scaled about one-third what it ought to be. But this year when a fair and honest scale has been applied all over the province by Surveyor General Grimmer there will be a great increase over last year.



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
