

FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS GAIN IN STUMPAGE REVENUE

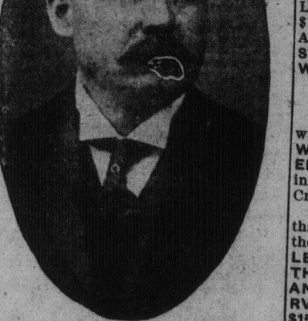
Sixty Per Cent. of the Average Lumber Cut Will Give Nearly \$240,000.00 Stumpage Revenue—This is the Result of Honest Administration by the Surveyor General's Department—Lumbermen are Willing to Pay When They Know All Are Treated Alike—Stumpage Will be Collected On About One Hundred and Ninety Million Feet.

Speaking at the St. John county nomination meeting Tuesday, Mr. Hazen made the statement that, though the timber cut of the province for the past winter, was below the average, the stumpage revenue would be above that of any previous year.

BOY THIEVES LIKELY BE SENT UP FOR TRIAL

In the police court yesterday, Joseph Murphy, Henry Williams and Thomas Moore were each fined \$4 or two months in jail for drunkenness; and John Johnston and Thomas Davis were fined \$8 or two months in jail at hard labor for the same offence.

Bartholomew Grogan and William F. Rogers, the two sixteen-year-old Bostonians who were arrested Tuesday morning and charged with robbing the poor boxes in the Cathedral and St. John the Baptist church on Monday, are likely to be sent up for trial when McCormack's restaurant on Prince William street on the same day and robbing the poor boxes in St. Peter's Cathedral on Tuesday, were before the police magistrate yesterday, when their preliminary examinations were held. The evidence against them was very damning, and they will undoubtedly be sent up for trial when examination is finished. It is possible that they will then elect to become tried under the Speedy Trials Act.

Mr. P. M. Burns, sexton of the Cathedral was the first to give evidence. He stated that he went to the cathedral at 9 o'clock on Monday morning, and everything was all right. About seven o'clock in the evening, he received a telephone message from Bishop Casey, and he went to the Cathedral and found that the poor boxes, his desk, and the safe had been tampered with.

The drawers of the roller top desk were all open and the papers containing the names of the donors scattered about. The key of the safe was missing. The safe was open and all the books and papers which were in it were lying on the floor. Forty cents in coppers were stolen, and also a quantity of mutilated and foreign coins. Witness identified some of the coins taken from prisoners, and also the key of the safe.

Warren F. P. Fox, Medical Officer of the poor boxes, described the condition of the poor boxes, and also the distribution boxes all made of iron, and fastened to the wall. One was removed from the wall, but the lock was not broken. The two drawers of the lock had been removed, and the lock was broken of a fourth box.

Mr. Philip Fitzpatrick, undertaker, was the next witness. He saw the two drawers in the rear side door, during the heavy downpour of rain on Monday. They went down Richmond street at a lively gait, and were dressed in the exception of a change of headwear.

Mrs. McCormack, the proprietress of the restaurant on Prince William Street, was the last witness, and her evidence was very direct. The two lads, whom she positively identified, had come into her restaurant and ordered their lunch, saying that they would pay in coppers, and proceeded to count out the 20c. While witness was in the kitchen preparing the lunch she heard the door slam, and went to the front door, and found the two drawers lying on the floor in front of the door. She saw the two boys hurrying towards Prince street, and on returning, found the cash drawer on the floor minus the contents. This finished yesterday's session and proceeded to court.

Yesterday afternoon Florence Davidson, charged with vagrancy, was in the police court. She belongs to the Prince Edward Island, she said, and Amelia Francis at the Halifax Exhibition last year, and this was how she happened to be in the home. Queried by His Honor, she said that she belonged to the Church of England, her father was a Baptist and her mother a Presbyterian. The magistrate was about to sentence her to nine months in jail, when she asked that she be allowed to go to the Salvation Army Home. She was remanded until the official of the home could be communicated with to find out if she would be accepted. If so, she will be allowed to serve her term there.
