WESTERN INDEPENDENCE.

It is not so easy in the West as in Eastern Canada to bring a party revolter into line. When Premier McBride of British Columbia made a railway contract which two of his cabinet colleagues considered improvident they left the government promptly and gave their reasons to the public. Whether the government was right or wrong is not the question. These ministers thought lit was wrong and refused to endorse the programme.

The Premier of Alberta has met the same experience. One of his colleagues objects to a railway contract made by his chief. This minister's office is vacant and he will probably be supported by a dozen members of his party. The effect of this protest is a considerable modification of the contract, which may reconcile some of the ministers. If none of them are satisfied the Rutherford administration is doomed.

We saw the like when Mr. Augers resigned his seat in the Bowell administration, and when Mr. Blair retired from the Laurier ministry. But in the last few years at Ottawa, there have been many occasions when ministers were not satisfied, and when private membered supporting the government are known to have protected.




