THE PORTS OF ST. JOHN AND HALIFAX.

An article entitled "Halifax or St. John-Which?" appearing in the October number of the Busy East, reprinted from the Canadian Century, has been the subject of some justifiable criticism on account of misleading and Century, may have many qualifications as a journalist, at he has yet to learn that when he sets out to make Some of the statements made regarding the port of St.

After enumerating certain of the advantages of St.
John as a port Mr. Bellasis goes on to refer to a number
of "serious drawbacks" which may be dealt with briefly.
He says "the entrance to the Bay of Fundy" is not as
easily navigable as it should be," and that there are
"shows and sands which necessitate constant dredging."
Where did this writer obtain his information? No dredgturn has been done at the entrance of the Bay of Fundy ing has been done at the entrance of the Bay of Fundy nor outside Partridge Island. There is plenty of deep water for ships of any draft and no occasion for dredging. He then proceeds to discuss the tides. "St. John," we are told, "suffers all the disabilities of a phenomenally

we are tout, suriers all the dissoluties of a phenomenally tidal port." And also that "a FORTY foot rise and fall naturally creates all sorts of difficulties in the way of currents and tide rips which necessitate very great care in pilotage." Where, we may ask again, did this writer obtain his information. The tide of the property o 20 to 28 feet with a mean of 24 feet. Why this exaggeration? He also refers to the danger to ships if they miss a tide waiting in the Bay in company with other ship-bing. The Canadian taxpayer whose money will be invested in one or the other should make certain that the choice is properly conducted by experts; that his money goes into the right port; and that the choice is not made on the same principle as the sites for the wharves beloved of the sea-going frogs."

Mr. Bellasis is eveidently not familiar with the report of the Transportation Commission submitted to the Dominion Government some years ago, and which emphasized in the strongest terms the importance of steady and continued development of all the great national ports to meet the growing demand of Canadian trade; neither can he be aware that at the last session of Parliament the Government announced that they endorsed the principle laid down in the Commission's report and that every effort would be made to provide increased facilities at all the national ports to cope with the Dominion's ever expanding trade. It is only necessary to refer to the programme of construction outlined for the ports of Montreal, Quebec, Halifax and St. John to show the absurdity of this writer's contention.

"Of course there might, eventually, be some sort I compromise. St. John, for instance, might be sereloped as a freight port, and Halifax as a landing face for mails, passengers and perishable goods. Or here might be sufficient prospect of immediate trade a justify developing both ports simultaneously, here are questions for experts to answer; transportation experts, men who know what kind of port anadian traffic demands, and Canadians should see not experts answer them, and not politicians, descrimental engineers or enthusiasts from either of the titles or Provinces concerned."

There will be no occasion for "some sort of commise." It is clearly recognized that the situation calls the development of both ports. How the Canadian is will be divided up is a matter which may safely be to the future. St. John possesses a certain advantant in the shorter railway hauf which has been recognized the transportation companies. That advantage she tool lose. For the coming winter season the number

of sailings constitute a record. The construction of a new grain elevator on the West Side by the Canadian Pacific Railway, and the extensive developments on both sides of the harbor provide additional evidence that the progress of the Winter Port is assured. Halifax also has advantages in the shorter sea route, and with the further development of her terminal facilities traffic to the Sister City will steadily increase. Nothing is to be gained by fividious comparisons. Both cities may well rest content in the promise of the future without regard to the foolish question "Halifax or St. John—Which?"

### THE PANAMA CANAL; A NEW SOLUTION.

In the Nineteenth Century Mr. J. Ellis Barker, a well known English writer, proposes a way of settling the Panama Canal difficulty which, he thinks, should prove satisfactory to both Great Britain and the United States. A summary of his proposal given by the Toronto News is instructive. It is stated that before the construction of the waterway was begun a United States Government Commission, headed by Admiral Walker, reported that "a canal not neutral, to be defended by the United States, whether by fortifications on land or by the navy at sea, would be a source of weakness" to the Republic. The Commission, therefore, advised that the canal should be removed from the operations of war by making it neutral. Taking up this idea of neutrality, Mr. Barker proposes that the waterway be controlled and policed by the United States and defended by both the United States and Great Britain. Seemingly this course was in the minds of the Anglo-American negotiators of the Clayton-Bulwer Ireaty, which began with these significant words: "The United States and Her Britannic Majesty being desirous of consolidating the relations of amilty which so happily subsist between them, etc." Under the present arrangement the Panamar of the Angle American regotiators are the present arrangement. In this Great Britain might take the initiative. The cost of working, maintaining and deepening the canal might perhaps be shared by the United States and the British Empire, which are most interested in the undertaking. They could act as trustees for the rest of the world. Such a solution would implement the spirit of the Clayton-Republic an easy way out of its present violation of a sacred international engagement, and it would promote the alliance of the two great Anglo-Saxon nations as guarantors of civilization and the world's peace. At least this is the attractive contention of the English writer,




