The German submarine U-29, displaced 800 tons, and was one of the largest and fastest of the German undersea boats. Two weeks ago the largest and fastest of the German undersea boats. Two weeks ago the U-29 made a record raid off the Scilly Islands and in the Channel, being successful in sinking four British steamers and one French steam-er and in damaging three other vessels. The submaring was chassed by patrol boats, but she proved too elu-sive for them, and when steamers tried to ram or escape her they found that the submarine was a much faster boat than her sister craft. The German commander gave the crews of most of the steamers time to leave their vessels, and in some cabes towed the lifeboats of the ships, with the crew, to passing steamers, in which they were taken to port.

GERMANS SINK DUTCH STEAMER.

GERMANS SINK DUTCH STEAMER. Dover, March 25, 11.25 p. m.—The Dutch steamer Medea was sunk off Beachy Head this morning by the German submarine U-28. She carried a carge of eranges, and was beind from Saloniki for London. The Medea was stopped by the submarine and the crew were given fifteen minutes in which to leave the vessel. They did so and the submarine then fired several shots at the steamer, which remained affoat for an hour. The crew rowed in their boats until picked up by a destroyer which brought them to Dover. The trawler Alprecht was attacked by a submarine today. A tor-pedo passed within ten feet of the fishing beat while she was crossing the channel. A British patrol boat chased the submarine, which, how-ever, disappeared.





ITALY NOTIFIED BY RUSSIA TO ACT AT ONCE OR MISS CHANCE OF PROFITING BY AUSTRIA'S DEFEAT

Everything in Readiness For The General Mobilization of the Italian Army--Foreigners are Leaving

Russian journals in inspired articles point out that now is the accepted time for participation in the struggle by countries still remaining neutral -Chances will be lost if Italy delays longer.

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London, Mar. 25, (9.45 p.m.)—A Rome despatch, dated March 24, re-ceived by the Central News, by Indirect route, says: "Everything is in readiness for a general mobilization of the Itali-an army. Seven complete classes are already under the colors. "The departure of Austrian and German families is reported from all parts of Italy; it is estimated that about 3,000 persons of these nat-ionalities have left Rome. Trains from Milan and Venice to the fron-tier are filled with Germans and Austrians and large numbers of Hun-garians have left Venice by steamer for Triests." Tome, Mar. 25, via Paris (4.28 p.m.)—Certain warnings appearing in Russian newspapers after the announcement of the fall of the Aus-trian position at Przemysi, have attracted the close attention of Italian readers. They refer mostly to the "dwindling chances of Austria," and that neutral countries should seize the opportunity now presented to them.

to them. The Birgewia Viedomosti, of Petrograd, says the capture of Przem-yel is as important as would be the fail of Constantinopie. Austria is doomed this paper declares, and she will be obliged to sue for peace. When this happens the intervention of countries now neutral will be most difficult; Austria, even beaten by Russia would still find means to resist Italy and Rumania. So if these latter countries defer action, the cost later of what they desire will be just so much the greater. The Petrograd Courier says the fail of Przemysi means the neu-trals must act now, or never.

"The feeling in Austrian circles," this paper says, "is that the country would rather give Galicia to Russia, and so conclude a peace, than give Trent and part of Istria to Italy for the sake of Italy's neu-trality. Were this done it would remove the nightmare of a Russian invasion of Austria, and leave Austria free to fight to the death against nania and Italy."

Imania and Italy." In conclusion the article the Messaggero says: "The dissolution of Turkey would compel Italy to reach an under-anding with Great Britain concerning her interests in the eastern editorranean; furthermore, the defeat of Austria would make it nec-essary for Italy to act in accord with Russia and Serbia to defend her interests on the Adriatic and in the Balkans. It is our opinion that seutrality, or friendly negotiations, can accomplish nothing."



The fall of Przemysl gives the Russians the practi-cally undisputed mastery of all Galicia except in the region of Cracow, which is a stronghold now occupied by a large Austro-German garrison.
