The speed with which we will be able  
to complete the work in less than three

Many Men to be Employed.  
Mr. Stewart would not make any esti-  
mate of the number of men who will be

It is understood that an arrangement  
has been made by which the successful  
bidders for the dry dock will take over  
the franchise granted to the Imperial Dry  
Dock Company. This will enable the  
patriotic citizens who backed this propo-  
sition with their cash to recover some of  
the money expended and will allow the  
new firm to secure the subsidies promised  
to the Imperial Dry Dock Company with-  
out further legislation, as this transfer was  
authorized by an amendment to the pro-  
vincial act in 1907. The subsidy promised  
by the city was \$2,500 a year for forty  
years and this was afterwards changed to  
\$5,000 a year for twenty years. The pro-  
vincial government has also promised sub-  
stantial aid to the undertaking.  
Among the other arrangements which  
have been made for the commencement of  
the construction work here it is said that  
B. Mooney & Sons, of this city, have been  
promised the sub-contract for supplying all  
the granite required for facing the break-  
water and for the other works.

THE FUTURE OF THE RAILWAY ABOUT THE RAILWAY COMPANY.

Electors of Albert Can Read Here Proof of the Federal Government's Faithful and Strenuous Efforts to Take Over the Railroad and the Opposition and Obstruction Offered by Tory Politicians Toward the Railway Company.

Owing to the prolonged obstruction and delay offered by Tory politicians through the Salubury and Albert railway Co., the efforts of the federal government to take over that railroad, have it repaired at once, and operate it as part of the Intercolonial, have been blocked for weeks.

Mr. Sherwood and Mr. P. Raymond, law partner of Francis Hanson, have been promising every day that the agreement would be signed and the transfer made, and they have admitted that the dominant government has shown its good faith in reaching the right compromise in order to hurry through the transfer.

It is still expected that the railroad will be taken over at once but as the Government has become necessary to print all the facts and records in connection with the matter in order that the electors of Albert and Kings counties may read for themselves just exactly what has occurred and see just where the responsibility rests.

It is signed and delivered by his majesty in manner aforesaid, in presence of the Minister of Railways and Canals.

The first proposition made by the government for taking over the road, which was published in The Telegraph, was attacked by Mr. Sherwood, manager of the Salubury and Albert road, except in one or two conditions, which required payment of the old rails to be taken up as new ones.

Following Mr. Sherwood's telegram of acceptance to the Minister of Railways, Mr. Sherwood wrote the following letter to Mr. Osmann, Minister of Railways:

THE AGREEMENT. This indenture made the day of the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and eleven.

Between His Majesty King George the Fifth, represented herein by the minister of Railways and Canals, hereinafter referred to as "The Company,"

On behalf of Mr. Swan I accept your proposition for taking over Salubury and Albert Railway, the terms of which are as follows: modified so that funds realized from sale of old rails may be used towards defraying cost of relaying and general repairs.

Price for value of road: one hundred and twenty thousand (\$120,000) dollars by purchase outright, or a later valuation on the basis of your agreement to the railway.

Whereas the minister of railways and canals for Canada, by his letter to the president of the company of Aug. 9, 1911, proposed on behalf of the government of Canada that the government at the coming session of parliament should introduce legislation to take over the railway of the company at the price of \$120,000.
