#### Another Violent Storm.

APPALLING LOSS OF LIFE FROM FISHING VESSELS.

ST. PIERRE, Sept. 4.—Thursday's storm exceeded in violence the cyclone of the previous Sunday. The damage to shipping is incalculable. A large proportion of the fishing fleet is disabled. Some fifty vessels have been wrecked, and many others are in danger. The loss of life is appalling. Jacques's boat, with six men, was wrecked. The vessel's crew were saved. Over thirty vessels are missing, and great anxiety is felt for their safety. The slightest indication of the approach of the storm was given except the rising of a dense black cloud on the eastern sky with loud peals of thunder. Before half an hour had elapsed the wind was at its height and the sea ran mountains high. Dories but a short distance off were unable to reach their vessels.

There is no reason why iron ships should not be built in the Dominion, and if yards were once established for their construction the building of ocean steamships would soon follow.
