GERMAN LIE NAILED

BY WHITE STAR LINE

to Ram German Submar-

Liverpool, Sept. 13.-The White Star Line made the following statement to the Canadian Press with regard to the German Government's explanation of the torpedoing of the Arabic: "The German excuse contained in the note published Saturday is just as audacious as the previous one just as audacious as the previous one and is absolutely unsupported by facts. A great point is made of a supposed attempt on the part of the Arabic to ram the submarine, but everyone knows that a course must frequently be changed in the channel and any change of such a kind could not possibly have been taken by the Germans to mean an attempt to ram.

"There is not the slightest question that the Arabic did not try to ram, for the simple reason that the submarine was not seen by Captain Finch. Moreover, the Arabic did not try to escape, the only precaution taken being to put the helm hard over directly the torpedo was seen."

There need be no doubt that Germany intends to annex both Belgium and Poland, and to keep Alsace and Lorraine. She will not be allowed to keep either Belgium or Poland, and France will have the other two.


