



TELEGRAPH NEWS.

LIVERPOOL, Sept. 4. P. M. Cotton easier but not lower. Manchester declines less favorable and cause dullness. Breadstuffs dull; flour easier; corn easier. Wheat provisions generally unchanged. A. 1. Liverpool, has advanced to 67s. 3d.

The annual feast of the cutlers at Sheffield occurred yesterday. Hon. Reverend Johnson, who was present, made an address in response to a toast to the health of the American Minister. After expressing thanks for the honor conferred upon him, he said he came to the country as a messenger of peace. He was glad to recognize everywhere in England strong proof of friendship and which he was certain were reciprocated in his native country.

A summons from the Supreme Court was yesterday served upon the officers of the Operative Bricklayers Protective Union to answer to a charge of conspiracy. The money market continues unsettled on 3 to 5 per cent. on call, and six per cent. on sixty days. Gold closed quiet at 143 1/2.

London, Sept. 5th. The Corn Law inquest on the bodies of the victims of Abercrombie Railway disaster was concluded today. The jury brought in a verdict of Manslaughter against Williams and Jones the brakemen on the goods train for negligence. A prospectus of the new telegraph line to connect Portugal and the United States, under the title of the People's Cable, has been issued.

Advices from Turin announcing that the heir to the Prussian Crown has recently died of cholera. A fire broke out among the shipping in the Southampton Dock. Much valuable property was destroyed. It is impossible to estimate the loss, but will be very heavy. Liverpool, Sept. 5. Afternoon markets generally quiet and unchanged. Lard has advanced to 68s. 6d. To day is observed as a holiday in London consequently no markets reported.

New York, Sept. 6. Gold 144 1/2. Buffalo, Sept. 6.—An exciting boat race took place on Niagara river this afternoon, between Alexander Folsma and Dal. Marvin. The course was five miles up the river against a seven mile current through the rapids and around Bird Island reef and return three and a half miles. Folsma won the race by five seconds, in 18 minutes and 47 seconds.

Woodstock Iron Works.—The Woodstock, Acadia contains the following:—Mr. Best is engaged in making preparations for the resumption of operations at the Iron Works. He has on hand a considerable stock of ore, and has a large quantity of coal at the kilns in Newburgh,—in fact, ample stock for a run of one furnace for a few months. So much, however, has to be done, preparatory to a commencement that it is not probable that the furnace will be in blast before the 1st November next. We trust that these works have now resumed operations never again to be permanently, or otherwise than for a short time, closed. The effect upon the country will be felt this coming winter, in the extension of employment, and an increase in the amount of circulation.

SEIZURE OF A WHISKEY STILL.—On Tuesday last, Thomas Huxford, Esq., Inspector of Island Revenue, proceeded to Long Creek in York County, (22 miles from Eberdeen and 4 miles from the western bank of the St. John river,) where he found a quantity of wort and other indications of the presence of a whiskey still. It was known that for some time past the neighborhood had been supplied with native whiskey by a man named Foley, and the railway contractors were considerably annoyed by the operations of the still. It was equally well known that no revenue was accruing to the Government from that section of the county. Some seven or eight men and three women were found on Foley's premises. After some parley the parties confessed their misdemeanor, produced the apparatus and surrendered it to the Inspector and the Deputy Sheriff (Friel), who accompanied him. We understand they were very leniently dealt with, as they did not appear to thoroughly understand the law on the subject, in all its bearings.—Telegraph.

The oil fever is breaking out again in the Pennsylvania oil districts. One of our merchants, T. T. O'Neil, Esq., returned from England on Saturday last after a pleasant visit to his friends and business acquaintances. Mr. O'Neil's trip to his native country, has improved his health, and he has resumed business with renewed vigor. He has our thanks for a liberal supply of British and American papers. Houlton and Woodstock were united by telegraph line last week. Messages of congratulation were passed between the two places on Wednesday last.

The Woodstock branch Railway was opened for traffic on Monday last. The road is leased, it is reported, to Mr. Osburn, Manager of the main line. The Episcopal Pic Nic will be held at Chaucok on tomorrow, Thursday. A Boat race on the Lake, is to take place. The Officers of the Grand Lodge are to visit the St. George Lodge on Friday evening next.

EASTERN EXTENSION.—On Friday last a locomotive and tender, with a loaded car, went for the first time from the junction to Westchester. The only passengers were, we believe Mr. Ketchum, the contractor of the line, and Mr. Rennie, trackmaster of the E. & N. A. Railway. There was quite a gay time at Westchester in consequence, and the good people of that lively town were much excited over the event, as they well might be.—[Journal.] A Halifax correspondent of the Toronto "Telegraph" having cast doubt in the existence of iron mines in Nova Scotia, the Halifax "Citizen" is constrained to say:—"Perhaps when the Intercolonial railway is completed the editor of the 'Telegraph' may visit Nova Scotia, and after travelling six hundred miles on rails made of Nova Scotia iron, and inspecting the iron and steel works at the Londonderry mines, he may have his own and his correspondent's doubts on this subject removed."

THE NEW DOMINION MONTHLY for September has been received from the publishers, John Duggall & Son, Montreal. This number closes the first year of this enterprise, and its second volume, we are pleased to learn with a success, which will warrant its enterprising publishers in making still further improvements. Its present circulation is 7,500 monthly. There are fourteen original articles in this number, besides editorial and correspondence. The low price for subscribers in \$1 per annum should secure at least ten thousand subscribers.

Gen. Butler, of New Orleans notoriety with some officials, have been visiting Prince Edward Island, with a view it is reported of obtaining a right to the fishing grounds, and to adopt a Reciprocity Treaty with the Island. It is probable he will find that the Dominion or Imperial Government must first be consulted, before any arrangement is entered into. We may be in error, but this looks like a side wind blow at Confederation.

The "Order of Precedence" regulations are becoming more and more distasteful to the people of the Maritime Provinces; indeed they are looked upon with disgust. We have no State Church in the Dominion, nor is there any desire for one, the bare idea of such a grading to all classes. The only precedence that will be tolerated is of integrity, talent, and honest worth.

Stephen H. Phillips, formerly of Salem, and one Attorney General of Massachusetts, now holds the same office in the Sandwich Islands; gets \$10,000 in gold a year—equal to \$15,000 here—and is a member, ex officio, of the Legislature.—[Prairie Farmer.] A section of the tunnel in process of construction under the Chicago river at Washington street ended in last night from the effects of the heavy rain, breaking the water pipe on the temporary railroad bridge on West Water st. An immense derrick and engine went down in the ruins. The loss is estimated by the contractors at \$25,000.

THRILLING INCIDENT AT NIAGARA FALLS. We learn by a gentleman who came up from Niagara Falls this morning that a startling incident occurred there yesterday afternoon.—A little girl, while sitting upon the railing of the bridge leading from the main land to Goat Island, lost her balance and fell into the rapids. Instantly a young man named Moulton, who resides at Auburn, plunged in to rescue the child. Grasping the little one and keeping her above water, both were swept on toward the precipice and destruction seemed inevitable. But Moulton, being an expert swimmer, struggled manfully with the rushing torrent and succeeded in reaching the shore, only about fifteen feet from the brink of the cataract. It was a most humane and daring act.—[Buffalo Commercial.]

New York, Sept. 7. Gold firm and steady at 144 1/2. London, Sept. 7. Murphy of Manchester, the noted publicist of Rome, whose violent speeches had often been attended with rioting, has offered himself as one of the candidates to represent that City in the house of Commons at the coming election. This makes the sixth candidate for Manchester.

A meeting was held in the interest of Murphy. It is estimated that there were six thousand persons present. Speeches were made advocating his claims, and denouncing the conduct of the Magistrates towards him in the matter of the Ashton riots in May last. While the speaking was going on, the meeting was attacked by a mob of Irish Catholics who charged upon the platform and dispersed the speakers. A general fight ensued, and lasted nearly an hour. The police at last succeeded in quelling the riot and arresting several of the ringleaders. The city was greatly excited. There are reports of disorder during the night and Monday.

THE TRIPLE MURDER AT BELLE RIVER, CANADA.—The following particulars are given of the murder which occurred at Belle River, Canada, on Saturday night last, and which was followed by the destruction of two mills by fire: "A watchman employed in a mill owned by one Van Allen first discovered the Willett Mill on fire, previous to which he had heard three or four pistol shots. He ran to alarm the people, and while going his mill was set on fire. Each mill, with machinery and stock, was destroyed. Cost, about \$15,000; no insurance. On examining the ruins of the latter (Van Allen's) mill, the bodies of Mr. Van Allen (one of the owners), his wife and grand son were found. Mr. Van Allen was 69 years of age and his wife about fifty years; the grandson was 17 years of age. Beside the corpses was found a revolver. The victim had had legal difficulty with one of his partners, and they were making arrangements for a dissolution. They had a fierce dispute on Saturday; the partner (Chisholm), it is said, was trying to wrest the property from the old man. On Saturday, Van Allen had drawn \$500 in silver from his banker, and no traces of this money can be found. It is, therefore, supposed to have been the immediate cause of his murder. Three persons are suspected, and one of them, Capt. Emory Rotash, has been arrested."

New York, Sept. 7.—O'Connell and Wormald both English roughs, have arranged for a prize fight within six weeks for a \$1000.00 stake. Over one hundred Custom House officials have been discharged this week. A portion of the Chinese visitors have arrived here. The Haytian gubnet Galates, with a cargo of war material will sail this week for Hayti.

GOVERNMENT HOUSE, OTTAWA, Thursday, 19th August, 1868. His Excellency the Governor General in Council. WHEREAS by an Act passed in the 29th year of Her Majesty's reign, intitled: "An Act to provide against the introduction and spreading of disorders affecting certain animals," authority is given to the Governor in Council to take such measures as may appear to be necessary in order to prevent the introduction of contagious or infectious disorders affecting cattle and other animals, and to check such disorders from spreading; and whereas a contagious disease or epidemic, affecting Horned Cattle, prevails in many parts of the United States of America, and is increasing and extending its ravages; and whereas it is expedient in order to prevent the introduction of the same into the Province of Quebec and Ontario, heretofore constituting the Province of Canada, that the importation of Horned Cattle from the United States of America, should be prohibited: His Excellency in Council, on the recommendation of the Honourable the Minister of Customs and under the authority given by the said Act, has been pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered that from and after the date hereof, and until this order shall have been altered or revoked, the importation from the United States of America, or introduction thereinto into the Province of Quebec and Ontario, heretofore constituting the Province of Canada, or into any part thereof, of Horned Cattle be and the same is hereby prohibited.
